ALL-KILKENNY CROKE CUP FINAL

And so the day of history has finally arrived; a first all-Kilkenny clash in the final of the prestigious Croke Cup. This is a game that has captured the imagination of a city, county and, indeed, country. It made sense to move the game to Nowlan Park and credit to everyone involved in that process, not least the two teams competing in the Buggy Cup final. By now, however, there is a danger that St Kieran's and Kilkenny CBS might know each other too well! The schools are pitched close together and while Kieran's have enjoyed a glorious history, CBS have definitely held the upper hand in recent times. There was a time when CBS teams were possibly beaten before they played their great rivals, but that day has long since passed. There has been a shift in power, as evidenced in the recent Leinster Colleges final where Kilkenny CBS came out on top by six points.

Still, that was a flattering margin, truth be told. And St Kieran's have since demonstrated that they are emphatically back on track by beating a highly-fancied Árd Scoil Rís side by seven points, 4–10 – 2–12 in the semi-final. That was an emphatic result, inspired by Tadhg O'Dwyer and Robbie Donnelly who both managed 1–3 each. Conor O'Carroll and Conor Murphy also weighed in with good scores. But it says a lot that they had seven different scorers on the sheet – that's a great achievement for any college side.

On the other side of the draw, Kilkenny CBS were

extremely comfortable against Scoil na Tríonóide Naofa and won by five points thanks to a first-half goal brace from Andrew Gaffney. CBS held their opponents to just two points from play, so whether their defence — or the Kieran's attack — prevails today will decide this game. We're going for CBS, but only after a cracking game of hurling with much more than local bragging rights at stake. What an occasion it is for the Mullen family – Kevin is on the CBS squad and his brother Darren is in the Kieran's panel. It might be a day for neutral colours for the extended clan!

The clash of Coláiste Phobail Rosc Cré and Cross and Passion College Ballycastle in the Buggy Cup final should also be a belter. The Tipp side beat St Mary's College Galway 1-14 - 1-7 to set up the final against CPS who beat St Fergal's College, Rathdowney 1-10 - 0-9. Ballycastle are a serious force to be reckoned with and a power of work has been invested into hurling at the school over the past seven years especially. They had to work for every score against last season's Vocational Schools champions and beating them is some scalp. Cormac McClafferty, Shea Hunter, Ciarán Butler, Ryan McCambridge and TT Butler are their lead performers.

Roscrea suffered a fright and trailed St Mary's by a point in their semi-final before romping home, but they face a serious test this afternoon. We go for Ballycastle – by a whisker.

CROSS AND PASSION COLLEGE

Cross and Passion won their first Ulster Colleges Mageean title in 1978 and since then went on to collect seven senior colleges titles in Ulster. The most successful group were in 2009 and '10; they went on to win back-to-back All-Ireland Colleges 'B' titles. A number of that group backboned the Antrim U21 team that reached last year's All-Ireland final with Ciarán Clarke and Stephen McAfee winning U21 All Stars for 2013. Cross and Passion are situated in the heart of north Antrim and have been the most successful school in the area, winning numerous 'A' colleges titles at all levels in Ulster. They have been a real hurling nursery to Antrim over the years supplying many greats such as All Stars Dessie Donnelly, Paul McKillen and Olcan McFetridge. More recently Antrim stars such Neal McAuley and Cormac Donnelly have all represented Cross and Passion with distinction. Last year's Mageean Cup team captain Eoghan Campbell starred for Antrim in their recent narrow Allianz Hurling League defeat to Cork.

This year's team includes team captain Ryan McCambridge who is currently on the Antrim senior panel and made his Allianz Hurling League debut this year. Three of the team have won Ulster Colleges All Star awards - McCambridge,

Cormac McClafferty and Conor Christie. Conor Christie recently won the Ulster U19 Cross Country Championship and will represent Ireland in April.

The team is managed by Joe Cassidy (former Derry and Bellaghy footballer) and coached by Loughgiel star and Ulster club hurler-of-the-year for the past two seasons Eddie McCloskey, Alex Campbell (Antrim minor hurling coach) and Oran Kearney.

An interesting footnote is that captain Ryan McCambridge marked his coach Eddie McCloskey in last October's Antrim senior county final when Loughgiel beat rivals Ruairí Óg, Cushendall.

A few other members of staff of note – former All Star Paul "Humpy" McKillen is the caretaker of the school and in 2008 he coached the junior camogie team in the school to the All-Ireland "A" junior camogie title beating St Brigid's, Loughrea. He was assisted by Elaine Dowds (science teacher) who has captained both Antrim and Ulster in camogie

Ciarán Herron also teaches PE in the school. Ciarán is a former Antrim senior hurler and was an All Star replacement in 2003. Current Derry senior football star – Seán Leo McGoldrick recently started in the school.

TWO TRIBES GO TO WAR

'It is no exaggeration to say that the main interest of the average student of St. Kieran's, outside his work, is hurling: he plays it, if he can; in any case he thinks about it, talks about it, dreams about it. Almost standard equipment for the new boy entering the college is a hurley, and almost his first act after arriving is to get on the playing field to try his skill with the other newcomers. There he finds, happily, that there is no better cure for home-sickness than the clash of the ash and the smack of the leather.'

The above quote stands out like a badge of honour on the St Kieran's website. It tells you all you need to know about the school's love of hurling. With 17 All-Ireland titles under their belts, they are the market leaders when it comes to the game at this level. In September 2009, when Kilkenny achieved the historic four-in-a-row, 15 past pupils of St Kieran's were on the field - including Eoin Kelly of Tipperary. That achievement was unprecedented and unlikely to ever be repeated.


Their standing in the game will never be challenged but their current dominance has been threatened and even ended. Indeed, the recent grip on Leinster Colleges hurling has been by Kilkenny CBS - and not Kieran's.

A definite shift in the respective fortunes of the schools has been identified, especially in the race for provincial honours. And while Kieran's have the folklore CBS have enjoyed their own piece of history lately - back-to-back senior titles following a comprehensive victory over Kieran's at the start of March. The Cosgrave Cup and Corn ui Dhuill currently reside on James's Street for the first time in the same year and today's senior hurling squad includes five of the current junior panel that qualified for a third All-Ireland colleges senior final in a row.

"We are at a great place," says former student and current CBS manager Niall Tyrrell.


"There has been a serious amount of work put in





by a lot of people and the interest here is huge. When I was at school you might only draw from the city clubs, the furthest a student might travel to CBS was two miles. Now, however, lads are coming from 20 miles away to be with us. There is no problem keeping lads grounded either as they just want to keep the run going. We waited a long time, but this progression is just great for everyone. It's good for Kilkenny too because Kieran's are still right up there and it will just ensure that the future health of hurling in this county is as strong as ever in the years ahead." There are also a number of past students such as Dick O'Hara, John Marnell, Joe Hennessey, James McGarry, Dan O'Neill, John Hoyne and Michael Walsh who have had outstanding careers and many of those will be in attendance today to witness what they hope will be another slice of history.

There will also be a flock of famous Kieran's



past-players. The list is endless, from Eoin Kelly to Henry Shefflin. One of those will surely be Brian Carroll, the Offaly hurler, who also attended the college.

"I got to see the respect that Kilkenny have for the game of hurling and I learned a huge amount there," Carroll said in a new book called Fields of Fire - The Inside Story of Hurling's Great Renaissance, due for release in May 2014. "Every lad you played with was a county hurler so your standards were lifted. You were taught an approach to the game which was a religion there. What I learned at the school has never left me."

Something has to give today, but one thing's for sure the legacy of Kieran's will not be affected if they lose, nor will the glowing future potential of CBS should they not lift the cup this afternoon.

ST KIERAN'S COLLEGE

St Kieran's College is a school with a long and proud history. As Ireland's oldest Catholic Secondary School, it continues to live out its proud tradition of academic and sporting excellence. In fact, the first recorded hurling match for the school, according to the College archives, was against Newbridge College, in 1906. Since then, the game of hurling in St Kieran's has gone from strength to strength. Numerous inter-county stars have passed through its gates and worn the black and white with pride. Notable past pupils include Nickey Rackard, Eddie Keher, Ted Carroll, DJ Carey, Henry Shefflin, Eoin Kelly, Nicky Brennan and Brian Cody to name a few. The College currently holds a record 52 Leinster Colleges Senior Hurling titles and a record 18 All-Ireland Colleges Senior Hurling titles.

Many of the current panel members are no strangers to hurling traditions. James Maher, captain of the team, follows in his father's footsteps today as his father also captained St Kieran's in 1990. Noel Maher won three All-Ireland titles with the College and James' mother Gillian (Dillon) also played Camogie for Kilkenny. Other players coming from great hurling backgrounds include Jack Keoghan, son of Kilkenny senior hurler Liam, Conor Browne, son of Kilkenny Camogie star

Angela Downey; Niall Walsh, son of Kilkenny senior hurler Pat, Daniel O'Connor, son of Wexford hurler James; Shane Walsh, brother of current Kilkenny hurling stars Pádraig and Tommy, and Brian Cody, from Ballyhale, is a nephew of Henry Shefflin. Some members of the panel also have brothers who have won Colleges All-Irelands with St Kieran's. Enda Morrissey, brother of Seán, and Michael Donnelly, brother of Robbie, both won two Colleges All-Ireland medals with Kieran's in 2010 and '11.

This year, Liam Smith, Ken Maher and Ger Flood,

who are all members of the James Stephens hurling club, manage the panel. All in St Kieran's are looking forward to seeing the two Kilkenny teams in the All-Ireland Colleges final today.


