Aristotle believed that the best way to understand something was to understand its purpose. He radically identified the nature of something with its goal or final cause. He held that plants and animals are perfect examples of this, because they have a nature in the sense of something internal, he calls it their internal causal principle, which explains how the thing comes into being and behaves (Phys. II.1.192b32-3). An acorn, he notes, has an inherent tendency to grow into an oak tree, so that the tree exists by nature rather than by chance. All things, therefore, will move in every way possible towards the realisation of their end cause. For human beings our ultimate good or happiness consists in perfection, the full attainment of our natural end. Aristotle's theory, which was developed in the 4th Century before Christ, resonates perfectly with our Christian beliefs and, for that matter, with what Catholic education intends. Fulfilling potential, realising goals, achieving everything possible, becoming the best person you can be is the heart of education and formation. It is what we do in St Kieran's College.

Those who populate the grounds here spend formative years finding out what lies at the heart of their nature. What is their purpose? Where is their goal? Student days are intended to serve that purpose. They are the environment in which that nature can flourish and what an environment we have!

Message from the President

This year, as the Record documents, saw again an array of talent and achievements. We won a hurling "grand slam" taking the honours in the Juvenile, Junior and Senior Championships - with the senior team winning our 21st Colleges All-Ireland. We won a soccer All-Ireland and the team then represented our country proudly wearing the black and white of our tradition again coming out on top of the competition. Our athletic and many other sporting successes, our academic achievements, our contribution to the diocese and to many others in a spirit of giving and volunteering shows the nature that lies at our core emerging and finding fulfilment.

St Kieran's hosts Christian Unity Prayer

Each year Christian Churches come together to reflect on this calling, to pray together and to continue the dialogue that marks our relationship. Traditionally the week of prayer is celebrated between 18-25 January, between the feasts of St Peter and St Paul. However in the southern hemisphere, where January is more a time for holidays, churches often find other days to celebrate it, for example around Pentecost, which is also a symbolic date for unity since it is the day when God gifted the Holy Spirit to those who follow him.

This year St Kieran's College hosted an evening of prayer and conversation for the main Christian Churches in our Diocese. Gathered at the prayer was Bishop Séamus Freeman, Bishop Michael Burrows (Church of Ireland) and Rev. Paul Maxwell (Methodist). Rev. Maxwell preached the homily and after a short prayer service Rev. Dr Ryan, as President of the College, invited those gathered to a reception and an opportunity for dialogue in the College sitting rooms.

Now this magisterium is not above the Word of God, but serves it, teaching only what has been handed on, listening to it devoutly, guarding it conscientiously, and explaining it faithfully, by divine commission and with the help of the Holy Spirit

This is what the document Dei Verbum from the Second Vatican Council, on Divine Revelation, tells us about the role of the Church in handing on the faith. It is clear the task of the magisterium is only to hand on that which it received. There is a reason for this - that which is entrusted into their care is something really precious...

To hand on the which they received...

This, in fact, would not be a bad job description for anyone charged with the care of St Kieran's, its staff, its pupils and its tradition. We are a College with an immense and proud history. Since 1782 we have been doing education and anyone in a position of leadership here would certainly have to be cognisant of the burden of responsibility they hold in passing it on intact to the next generation having faithfully guarded it and its precious image and history. A lesser man would just protect, save, conserve, ensure that it is not damaged - afraid of the responsibility he has been given. But that man is not John Curtis.. Noone here could doubt that the Kieran's he today hands back to us is vastly the better for having being in his care for these past eleven and a half years.

It is all but impossible to find the words, with a fullness of meaning, to do John's time here the justice it deserves - hence why I am seeking refuge in borrowing the words of the Council.

For me this is an apt description of the manner in which John has

carried himself here during his time. In spite of his immense reputation as an educationalist and leader, in spite of his obvious ability, massive intellect, deeply reflective nature, this job, his days here in St Kieran's were never, not even in passing, about him or his career, or his name: the perfect servant of education and tradition John has always made others, the staff, the students, and this place as the focus of attention. As a servant of St Kieran's John had the uncanny knack of supplying the vision then prompting, encouraging, supporting and nudging others to realise that vision while he stepped back and smiled quietly to himself.

Listening to it devoutly

It is easy in management to have ideas, to have a vision, to have a drive. These are the staple characteristics of those in leadership - but immense leaders can do it differently. John listened devoutly. John listened deeply. Be that to parents, students, any member of the staff, and the musings from a delusional cleric over coffee - no matter if the words were spoken in joy or in pain, in anger or in peace, with a vision or to conserve - no matter what we had to say - about ourselves, about the job, and even on occasion about others John wisely, calmly and unhurriedly listened with a deep concern so that we would be heard. This is real leadership.

Guarding it conscientiously It is a self evident tautology, to say that John Curtis cared. He guarded St Kieran's with all the love and protection of a father for a child; Sunday afternoons, Tuesday nights, Saturday mornings - on any random day at any hour John's car would be seen parked up in the grounds as he worked away, or simply dropped in to check all was still here. But John's real genius is not that he guarded the building but that he guarded that which made this building so imposing and so impressive - those people who populate its grounds. Staff and students and parents were the real focus of John's care and attention. One hundred percent of the time he was thinking of others here guarding us conscientiously: many a career he shaped with a gentle suggestion; a classroom he saved with a gentle hand. Literally anything he could do for one of us - John did.

and explaining it faithfully This is the test of any teacher explaining it all. John has faithfully done that here for the past eleven years. Keeping all of the partners of this school community onside by explaining all that was happening - honestly and openly. If there were occasions that you felt he knew more than you - you are probably right!! but in so far as he could and saving the dignity and nature of all involved John endeavoured to be open about what he was doing or what decisions had to be made. It is testimony to the man that he has lead here for eleven years - making decisions that impacted on us all, for the betterment of education and our students, and occasionally ourselves, without ever alienating anvone.

John, you are a man of immense ability, with an intelligence I have rarely encountered, and a reflective personality with a depth that is unusual, you have a vision that infects those around you. Keep the rumour of God alive

It is the task of the Adult Faith development group, located in St Kieran's College, to keep the rumour of God alive. Thankfully, and obviously, this work is not the sole responsibility of this group: word about God, and the word of God, is shared in our parishes, schools, homes and by a great variety of groups in our diocese. It is, however, the responsibility of the Faith Development group to ensure that these groups are supported and encouraged. It is also the task of this group to resource, equip and help the people of our diocese deepen their faith. It is a task that we take seriously.

The members of the faith development group, Eadaoin Maher, Fr Kieran O'Shea, Olivia Maher, Michael Hogan, Declan Murphy, Derek Dooley and Fr Dermot Ryan along with Martina Lawlor, who runs the office in St Kieran's College, work to facilitate various ways to help people, parishes and groups to deepen their understanding of God. Each year the Faith Development group uses a mixture of some tradition, some tried and some new ways of furthering this objective.

Part of the staple diet of offerings of the Faith Development group is the provision each year of training for the Extraordinary Ministers of the Eucharist of our parishes. The group offer this in three locations around the diocese during the weeks of Lent. At the end of this training nearly 500 people were commissioned or recommissioned in their parishes on Holy Thursday. It is wonderful to see so many willing to serve in our communities. The Group, this year, also began the process of offering similar training for Ministers of the Word. At the request of Bishop Séamus it is hoped that these too would be commissioned for a period of time and prepared so as to best serve in their ministry in our parishes.

The Jubilee of Mercy provided the group with a wonderful opportunity to explore the mercy of God and how it is that people can understand it and experience it in their lives. As a result of this several lectures and days of reflection have been offered centred on this topic, with speakers from various backgrounds opening it to our diocese. The group has also embraced the offering of the Vatican office charged with the promotion of the year of mercy who have invited people to volunteer in Rome during this year to assist with pilgrims. As this piece is being written the first four successful applicants are having flights offered to them by the Faith development group so that, without cost to them, they can experience the Jubilee of Mercy in Rome and return to Ossory to share their experience. In fact more than this the AFD group has arranged a pilgrimage to Rome for later in the Summer. It was hoped that by offering this in December its forty pilgrimage places might be starting to fill by June thankfully, and in a way that shows the popularity of this great Jubilee of Mercy, over fifty places were taken and bookings closed by the end of January. Much more is still planned for the year of mercy, and work in under way with some of the deanery councils in the preparation of local pilgrimages so that we all can share in this experience together.

The Ossory Times magazine, which was first floated by the Faith Development Group as a pilot idea to share news is now in its fourth year of production. It is growing with every offering. It is offered for sale in all parishes for just €2 and is therefore accessible to all. This publication is intended to carry news from around the diocese so as to share with each other much of what we are doing. It also offers more educational pieces on aspects of the faith. In exploring its pages you see a diocese that is alive and active. The people of Ossory are doing lots to keep the rumour of God alive and it is wonderful that we support that and share that good news.

This year saw the creation of the diocesan retreat team too under the auspices of the Faith Development group. The new retreat team, which is documents elsewhere in the Record is a wonderful new beginning for the College in welcoming people into the Chapel and rooms on nights throughout the year. The theme chosen for reflection this year was, obviously, mercy. From all feedback received the nights were a great success. The retreat team are now well settled in their role and as this year winds down they are already planing the evenings, and some day retreats, for next year.

The Faith Development Group by now has its usual activities and they are continually offered: the Advent and Lenten daily texts; the Advent and Lenten scripture "Thought for the day" booklets, Sunday Scripture Reflection sheets, Mercy Prayer Cards, the Diocesan hurling and camogie Blitz.

Based in the College this group does all it can to support people in their faith and to help them explore it. If you have ideas or suggestions please let us know. We always welcome them...

Liberal Studies at St Kieran's

The Liberal Studies Group offers a programme of lectures and cultural activities covering literature, music, poetry & art history. It has 120 members and a substantial waiting list. Classes run from September to April on Monday and Tuesday mornings. Lecturers are experienced in their field and include a published poet, college lecturers and established artists.

The theme for this year was Family. Lecturers included Francis Tansey, speaking of his family of paintings and his methodology. Niamh O'Sullivan spoke eloquently on the *ante-bellum* families of the southern US states and the slave families who served them. Novels on this theme were

The Power & The Glory, The Joy Luck Club, Edith Frome & Honeydew. Poetry and novels were chosen by Mark Roper, our resident literature lecturer. Prof. Harry spoke of the Bach and Mozart families (both composers also being examined in the 2015 and 2016 Kilkenny Arts Week Sean Kissane programmes). from IMMA gave two illustrated lectures on The Rising - A New Family. Other lecturers included Dr James Heaney, John McKenna, John Kirwan - all experts in their fields.

Christmas lunch in Lyrath House Hotel was attended by 75 members with an illustrated talk by local archeologist Coilin O'Driscoill on the excavations and current renovation of St Mary's Church in Kilkenny. To commemorate the centenary, a spring trip included the 1916 Freedom Trail in Dublin and a visit to "Juno and The Paycock" at the Gate Theatre. An end of term trip was organised to Castletown & Carton Houses, homes of some of the Anglo-Irish ascendancy families.

Parish Evenings in St Kieran's

This year saw a new venture begin in St Kieran's as the host of the parish evenings. The Parish evenings are an experience for parishioners to come together away from their daily lives to spend time in prayer. The evenings bring neighbours and friends together to pray, reflect and meditate in the beautiful historic surroundings which is St Kieran's College.

During the evening we listen to the word of God, give praise through music and song as well as receive Jesus in the Eucharist. There is during the course of the evening an opportunity to receive the sacrament of confession for those who wish to do so and before the journey home, a cup of tea and a chat is shared.

This year saw parishes from all over the diocese experience through their parish evening, the theme of 'Mercy'.

Pope Francis Inaugurated this year, from 8th of December 2015, the feast of the Immaculate Conception, until the 20th of November 2016, the feast of Christ the King as a year of mercy and this was then chosen as the theme for the parish evenings for this year.

In experiencing the theme of mercy the parish evenings invite closer reflection on the meaning of mercy, mercy in the Old and New Testaments as well as our experience of mercy in our relationship with God and our relationships with others. Those who come on the parish evenings are invited to bring various symbols representing their Parish. Water from a local well, children's art, the local teams' jersey and a chalice from the parish church all represent parts of who we are as parish.

The first part of the evening involves listening to the word of God, reflecting on the gospel and through meditation and becoming still an opportunity to allow God to speak to us. The second part of the evening held in the college chapel begins as gifts are carried to the altar representing all who are part of the parish and all their intentions. The Eucharist which Pope Francis describes as "not a prize for the perfect but a powerful medicine and nourishment for the weak" is then celebrated in a spirit of thanksgiving.

The parish evenings allow parishioners an opportunity to return to daily life with a deeper sense of the presence of God among them and together with neighbours and friends they can continue to share the good news with others. Parish evenings have a long tradition in our Diocese and with a new retreat team formed and a new home in St Kieran's it is hoped that this tradition will continue into the future.



Certificate in Theological Studies







Declan Murphy B.A.Th., M.A. Course Director Certificate In Theological Studies.

Participants on the the Certificate in Theological Studies from across the diocese of Ossory have just completed the programme for this year. This course is intended for people with an interest in understanding the thinking behind the teachings of the church and the writings of scripture. It is, according to the students on the programme, both accessible to those new to theology and stimulating in its delivery and content. Those taking the course have learned about Old and New Testament scripture in a meaningful way and how it can be connected to their daily lives. Issues around how we live and should live our lives are addressed in an interesting and challenging way in Moral Theology. The Mass and the Sacraments take on a whole new meaning after completing an engaging module on liturgy and sacraments. The origins of church teaching in prayers such as the creed are traced through the teaching councils of the church over the centuries. Finally the course brings people through an exploration and discussion on the Church and our role in it.

The programme is informed by the teachings of Pope Francis and in that context it is a welcomed part of the overall move to greater participation in adult religious education in order to open the way for greater involvement in the local parish community.

Next year we intend to offer additional input, focusing the learning of the existing programme on parish leadership and participation in parish ministry. We will offer skills training in group facilitation, to help course participants to understand the basic principles behind working with groups. From the module on Church, there will be support around the area of parish pastoral councils and their formation. There will also be training to support those working with ministers of the Word through the development of greater insights into the way scripture is used across the year and in special liturgies. The liturgical module will focus its theory on helping participants to enhance the integrity of the celebration of the sacraments through a better understanding of liturgy. In this way course participants will be enabled to support those involved in both the ministry of the Word and ministry of the Eucharist.

While we hope that these additions will enhance the experience of participants and lead to the enrichment of ministry in parish, the course will also be of interest to those wishing to develop their own personal faith journey through greater insight and reflection.

The Ossory Diocesan Forum

When the Forum began in 2004 the people of the diocese articulated a strong desire to see the Church move towards becoming more fully "the people of God". While some doubted that change could or would happen, the majority believed that priests and people working together under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, could bring a new vibrancy to the Church in our time.

A network of pastoral councils was established at parish, deanery and diocesan level so that good channels of communication would enable wideranging consultation and involvement of all in the life of the local church. These pastoral councils continue to provide an invaluable means of making it possible for priests, religious and lay people to be effectively co-responsible for the life of the church in our diocese.

A good example of how this can work has been the development of



a Diocesan Pastoral Plan. The Plan was asked for by members of Pastoral Councils following a thorough review by them of their own work. People considered that a Diocesan Plan was needed to give focus and direction to the work of all pastoral groups in the diocese. The Plan is now official as it has been ratified by Bishop Freeman.

The latest and very encouraging development has been the employment by the Diocese of a Plan Coordinator. Starting later in the Summer Ms Gemma Mulligan, a native of the diocese who now lives in Tullaroan parish, has been appointed to this role by Bishop Séamus Freeman. Gemma brings with her immense experience in this type of work and a great energy for the task at hand. It is truly wonderful to see the pastoral plan come to life in her appointment. We look forward to having a dedicated person to encourage and lead us all in becoming a church that is continually more vibrant and alive.

Kilkenny Archives at St Kieran's College

During the course of the past year three local collections of archives have been vested in Kilkenny Archives Ltd, which has been located in St Kieran's College, since 2010, as guests and under the patronage of the President and Trustees.

The papers of Margaret Tynan, Kilkenny's first Lady Mayor, a post she held on eight different occasions, were the first to arrive.. During her political life Margaret was involved in many key issues: poverty in the community, Rights for Women, Keep Kilkenny Beautiful, the acquisition of the KDW complex, including Butler House for the city of Kilkenny, which led to the establishment of The Kilkenny Civic Trust, the founding of the Watergate Theatre with ongoing financial support from the Kilkenny Civic Trust and many other ventures.

Then came the family papers Mr & Mrs Adrian Bligh of Circular Road. Both were natives of Kilkenny city and during the course of their long lives were involved in many community



based activities, so their papers for the most part reflect this involvement. In the collection we have local theatre material (Ossory Players) and political material as Adrian was for many years in the 1930s an active supporter of Fianna Fail. The Kilkenny Art Gallery Society is also represented in this holding.

Lastly we received the papers of Kilkenny dentist, historian, wife and mother, Katherine M. Lanigan, née Harte, who was born in Kilkenny in December 1909, the third child of James Harte (solicitor)and his wife Mary A. Harte, née Birch. Kitty is today best remembered for her book Kilkenny: its architecture and history (1977) which she co-wrote with Gerald Tyler of the KWD. Amongst the Lanigan Collection are near 2,000 slides and photographs, many of them of the city and its environs, which were used for this magisterial book, which is still in print. The Lanigan collection of images with the earlier Lawrence and Crawford collections means that here in Kilkenny we have a full photographic record of the city and its environs from c. 1890 to the 1970s.



An exciting new venture took place in St Kieran's College this year with the launch of the 'Michael Rice St Kieran's College Coaching Academy'. This is a coaching course for hurling managers and coaches.

Michael, who is an Economics and Irish teacher in the school, collaborated with the President of the college, Fr Dermot Ryan in putting this course together and bringing it to fruition. A number of weekends ran throughout the summer of 2015 and February 2016. This course is quite unique in that coaches get the opportunity to hear from players and professionals who are instrumental in the present game. It is a programme that combines the most effective modern coaching techniques with a thorough grounding in the traditions of the game. And where better to provide this course than the famed hurling fields of St Kieran's College. Coaches can learn from the experiences of All-Ireland winners and All-Stars including Tommy Walsh, David Herity, Brian Hogan, Richie Hogan, Richie Power, Michael Rice and others. All-Ireland winning coach, Martin Fogarty, gives an overall

view of his experience in coaching club and county. Various discipline experts that include physiotherapist, Dr Clare Lodge, strength and conditioning coach Seán Kelly, dietitian Lorna O'Neill and sports psychologist Shane O'Sullivan give their insights in how best to prepare your team both physically and mentally. This leads to a nice mix of on field learning with the players and classroom based theory with the professionals.

Coaches have come from many different counties throughout the country such as Cork, Galway, Offaly, Laois, Tipperary, Antrim, Tyrone, Derry, Dublin and Kilkenny. Another distinctive element of this course is that the participants can stay on the grounds of St Kieran's College with meals being provided throughout the day. This has proven to be extremely popular amongst the coaches as being on campus allows them to move easily between the pitches, the gym and the lecture hall. Also, the coaches are not only learning from the presenters but from each other as they share their thoughts and ideas amongst the group. Numbers are limited to ensure that peer learning can take place and also to give everyone the opportunity to ask questions and get the maximum out of the weekends. Another feature which is very enjoyable is 'The Legends Talk'. Two former greats in Henry Shefflin and Eddie Brennan gave very honest accounts of the highs and lows of their careers during the courses last year.

Maynooth University's Kilkenny Campus

Maynooth University has been running flexible programmes at its Kilkenny Campus, based at St. Kieran's College, for over nineteen years. Originally, the programmes were mainly aimed at mature students (those aged 21 and over) and since 2013 there has been an increasing focus on the new First Arts programme which is open to mature students and school leavers alike.

Over the years, over 1,600 students

of the Campus were awarded with qualifications ranging across the full spectrum from Level 5 certificate to PhD. Last year alone, two of those who commenced their academic studies on the part-time BA in Local Studies at the campus completed PhDs in History: Dr. Pat Bracken from Thurles and Dr. Richard Hyland from Clonmoran, just outside Kilkenny; Richard is himself a past-pupil of St. Kieran's College. The Department of Adult and Community Education at Maynooth University has provided a home for the Campus since its establishment, and the ethos of that Department with its emphasis on the transformational power of education, and the creation of a supportive learning environment has informed and guided the campus through its ongoing development.



First Arts at Maynooth University's Kilkenny Campus is thriving

In September 2015 the third group of First Arts students began their studies at Kilkenny Campus. Just under ninety students both from the local area and further afield are studying the first year of their Bachelor of Arts degree in Kilkenny (CAO Code MH901).

This full time programme which has attracted both Leaving Certificate and mature students, offers the option of studying four subjects out of a choice of eight. Some of the most popular subjects from the main Campus are on offer including English, History, Sociology, Philosophy, Anthropology and Economics, and St. Patrick's College Maynooth is also offering Theology. The 2016-2017 academic year will also see the introduction of Law as a subject choice. On successful completion of their first year at Kilkenny Campus, students will transfer to the main campus, continuing with two of their first year subjects, to complete the Honours BA with Maynooth University (MH101), or the Bachelor of Arts and Theology with St. Patrick's College, Maynooth (MU001) if continuing with Theology.

Many students from the local area find the financial benefits of living at home for their first year of college very beneficial. Others from further afield find the smaller numbers on campus very attractive, and opt for Kilkenny as an easier transition from second-level to university. For others, the opportunity to have the first year of their University experience in the



vibrant city of Kilkenny has been a selling point, and it has also brought revenue in to the city as many students lodge with local families.

Over the past two years, St. Kieran's College, where the University's Kilkenny Campus is located, have made student accommodation available for MH901 students, adding to the appeal of the Kilkenny offering.

Kilkenny students have been performing strongly in academic terms compared to their counterparts on the main campus and they have benefitted greatly from the smaller class sizes, student focused learning environment and the vibrant campus community. They themselves have given very positive feedback on their experience and have transitioned very well into their second year on the main Maynooth University Campus. Students have commented that "we are eased into college life in a friendly environment and we get to know everyone really well", and "smaller classes are better, the lecturers know your name".

The current group of First Year students are also seeing the benefits of the smaller campus experience in their feedback to date. Like their predecessors, they have performed



on a par academically with their counterparts on the main campus and they have also formed strong bonds of friendship with each other that they will take with them into their second year. The students have been active in the extracurricular areas of their college experience also, organising soccer matches against the first year team from the main campus and taking part in inter-cultural awareness day to name but a few. One of our students regularly represents the university in inter-varsity golf competitions, and we even have a few hurlers in the group!

I often wonder if anything changes in St Kieran's. Every year these pages chronicle the magnificent achievements of our fellow students, traditional events such as St Kieran's Day and the awards night; but at the front there will always be a picture of an incoming First Year group, and at the back a picture of the departing Sixth Year group. It would seem that for an outsider looking in that we are all just passing through; and indeed we are but with each year group being different and every student being unique, gradually you will realise that change is the only constant here in St Kieran's. In that same vein, I thank Ms Keyes for allowing me to leave a mark on our time here in the school and to enlighten you to the story behind the 2016 Sixth Year signatures.

At this year's St Kieran's day mass Fr Ryan reminded us of our six year 'term of office'. What can we, as St Kieran's students, contribute to the school during our short six years in office here? As students however, there are many more things that we will remember our 'term of office' for than just contributions. When reflecting on the past six years, it probably won't be the sporting wins or academic results but rather the friendships, the camaraderie, the positive atmosphere and of course the enjoyment that will stand out in our minds. It is hard to believe that six years have passed since we first set foot in this school but yet we have learned so much, discovered talents that we never knew we had

and have done things that we never thought we could do. It is therefore no surprise that my tenure here is laden with nostalgia and fond experiences.

Long before my time in St Kieran's I had always marvelled at the iconic stature of this school. The spacious campus, the Hogwarts-like building and of course the appetite for success in all its endeavours rendered it verv attractive when I was thinking about my second level education. I can still remember vividly taking a right turn onto the College Road on my first trip to St Kieran's. Walking through the arch for the first time, wearing the famous black jumper was most certainly a surreal feeling. All the famous alumni had departed the school and now I was one of the lucky few entrusted with the mantle of being a St Kieran's College student. Inside we met Mr Maher, Mr Smith, Fr Ryan and Mgr Kennedy, flanked by cairdeas students. There was definitely an emotive quality to the speeches that day, the message being that it was something special to become a St Kieran's student and the onus was on us to keep this famous tradition alive. Things that we now take for granted such as moving from class to class and navigating around the school seemed so foreign to us on that special day. Looking back on my first year here I, like every one of my classmates, was preoccupied with what now seems like trivial things.

The sprint to the now departed chicken roll stand at the 11 o'clock break, the necessity to buy every single item that the budding Transition Year entrepreneurs were selling and

a ferocious game of wall ball during lunch times stand out; but are, of course, a fundamental element to the rite of passage here in St Kieran's. What I soon also noticed as a First Year student was the myth of St Kieran's just being a hurling nursery debunked. Opportunities were presented to us in choir, athletics, debating, soccer and many other fields. Personally I was drawn in by the freedom of the lunchtime run, punctuated by a charismatic Mr O'Keeffe. Tearing around the Castle Park at lunch time seemed much more enjoyable than the pressurised environment of the hurling trials. Unbeknownst to us however was the prospect of study and exams and the challenge of Halloween exams; our first set of exams in the school and a far cry from the usual Friday morning spelling test that we were accustomed to, was a thundering shock to the system. On the morning of those exams, not a single student seemed to be outside playing hurling and Hall 33 was tense, filled with 140 panicking souls getting some 'first' minute revision in.

Second Year saw the departure of Jim, 'the chicken roll man' and a void remained in the school before the canteen was opened a few years later. One student in our year however had the presence of mind to start up his own enterprise – an underground shop! This proved to be very popular but was unfortunately shut down by Mr Smith. With the increasing emphasis on the academic element of school life in Second Year, festivities such as St Kieran's Day became the focal point of

the year. In Second Year, paint balling was generally the activity of choice. Pre - combat rivalry resulted in many of us students trying to come up with a plan to target a few of the teachers, some even had invested in extra bullets in a quest to reign supreme. I can't recall if we succeeded in doing so but it is positive days like those that I for one will certainly remember St Kieran's for.

The dynamic of school life changed in Third Year however with the Junior Cert looming in the background. We were no longer the minnows of the school and things began to get more serious. Although it seemed critically important at the time, and to certain extents it still is, the Junior Cert now constitutes for us just another stepping stone, a landmark on the learning curve. Most will remember the exams for the great, sunny weather that we were deprived of at that time, but it is through sacrifices, akin to that, that make us all stronger. Again, in what seemed like the relentless pace of secondary school, the exams were finished before we even had realised it and we had finally reached the odyssey that is Transition Year. Transition Year was probably the highlight of my time in St Kieran's and a chance to 'get outside the comfort zone' as I have heard many teachers say in the last few years. I don't think there was

anything more uncomfortable than standing up and making a speech in Mr O'Neill's class and then watching the video recording of the speech, with the class straight after it. Despite that hardship (and embarrassment!), it was a thoroughly enjoyable year however, a chance to get a breath of fresh air both literally and metaphorically given the arduous nature of State Exams Long walks along rivers and up mountains, were a frequent occurrence along with work experience, enrichment programmes and of course the Gaisce weekend: 25km kayaking from Leighlinbridge to St Mullins for the weekend along the Barrow, which was nothing short of gruelling. Some may question the point in transition year, but when embraced it is certainly as effective as any amount of time spent in the books, in creating a more rounded individual.

After the excitement of Transition Year, Fifth Year was most certainly a shock to the system. The Leaving Cert was no longer some faraway prospect in the future, but a reality. For some, it was a chance to be a member of the Cairdeas team. As in King Lear 'the wheel hath come full circle' and we were now helping those filling shoes that we had left not so long ago and maintaining the wonderful ethos of the school through pastoral care. It

> could we appreciate the hard work of the school to cater for the needs of every student. Thinking of Fifth year, it wouldn't seem right if I didn't include the word 'shock' the in same sentence, as we were finally in the position where our study would influence our ability to

succeed in the Leaving Certificate. Now as the Leaving Cert beckons, school life represents a new landscape. I have watched the news in early June for many years now as commentators discuss the likelihood of certain

This Leaving Cert year has undoubtedly been very memorable; especially on the extracurricular front. The achievement of the Senior Hurling Team capturing their third All-Ireland in-a-row cannot be underestimated. It is however a testament to all the members of this fraternity and exemplifies the willingness of everyone here to go beyond the call of duty and contribute to school life. The syneray of these contributions however are what truly makes St Kieran' unique. Most will remember this victory this year but we must also remember Mr Darmody and Mr Forrest organising a hurling league after school for us in First Year, acting as a mould for this success years later. Being a member of the cross country team finally stepping up on the All Ireland podium after six years of trying was very sweet and finally made us feel we had done something to the same tune as our hurling counterparts! Likewise moments such as Liam Wallace putting the hair on the back of our neck standing during Proclamation day and the performances of the music department in the carols and the music festival will be equally cherished.

As our time here draws to a close, part of me can't believe that I am writing this. Leaving St Kieran's was always a long distant prospect and now the time has come for our group photo to become immortalised on the walls of St Kieran's. Looking back on our 'term of office', I think it is clear that we contributed our fair share in all domains of school life to the 'snowball' of tradition in St Kieran's that just keeps on getting bigger. This would simply not have been possible however if it wasn't for the trojan work of the teaching staff to which we will be forever indebted to. Fellow class mates I wish you the best of luck in future life and of course in the next few weeks. As I write this during Irish oral season it simply would not be possible to finish this piece without the inclusion of a seanfhocal - "Mol an óige agus tiocfaidh sí!

The Fifth Year Agricultural Science class along with Mr Darmody, Ms Moran and Ms Wemyss also went to Kildalton on March 3rd.

It is necessary to do a farm visit as part of the fulfilment of the practical component of the course. On the farm, we visited the different enterprises. We got to see a ewe yeaning. The dairy herd were housed on the day due to the very wet spring. Milk protein levels had plummeted to 3.04%, which is partly attributable to feeding low digestible silage. The beef cows were calving and they had just completed a caesarean section on one cow.

Health and safety was emphasised at all the stands that we visited. We were warned to

- slow down on the farm,
- never take risks,
- beware of concentration levels and tiredness
- always have an escape route from animals,
- never turn your back on an animal,
 - have all machinery in

proper working order,

- have bulls ringed and chained,
- keep all slurry agitation points closed and to beware of the lethal poisonous gas hydrogen suphide when agitating

We then had to write up a report for our project coursework on the farm visit. This will make up 25% of our practical work in the subject and will be examined by an external examiner in May 2017.

The All-Ireland Final of the IASTA (Irish Agricultural Science Teachers Association) table quiz was held in the Abbeyleix Manor Hotel on Thursday April 7th. Paddy Gannon hosted a sugar feast in Ballyragget to jump start the grey matter! Questions came from the Leaving Certificate Agricultural Science Course. Topics asked were based on animal and plant physiology, microbiology, genetics, soil science, ecology, botany, zoology, crop and animal husbandry. It was an opportunity to get all these topics revised for the practical and theory exam.

Thirty teams from all over the country competed in the final. Two teams from St Kieran's College qualified for the final. Tommy Allen, Michael Cody, Cian Drennan and Paul Luttrell obtained an impressive 49 points out of 64. Eamon Forristal, John Hession, Paddy Gannon and Sean Maher were just one point off the tie breaker for first place. They were awarded third place, after some controversial questions! Overall the night was very enjoyable and we got to work on our debating skills!





The Fifth Year Agricultural Science class along with Mr Darmody and Mr Heffernan went to a soils workshop in Kildalton on Thursday November 12th.

2015 was the International Year of Soils and so it was fitting to carry out field experiments to assess soil quality. We examined the ped structure (soil paricles coming together) of a poached soil and we could clearly see that even just with minimal poaching it disrupts the drainage capacity of a soil.

We also did a field study to estimate the number of earthworms in one hectare of soil, soil sampling techniques, soil flocculation and soil

cation exchange capacity experiments. Overall, it was an excellent learning experience to put theory into practice. Soil science is a major component of the leaving certificate agricultural science syllabus and it is always questioned in the terminal exam.

Sean Kelly's visit to St Kieran's College

On Thursday the 27th of November, the M.E.P. Sean Kelly came into 3A4 to talk to our class about Ireland in the EU and what is like to be an M.E.P. for our C.S.P.E. action project which is about raising awareness of Ireland in the EU. We are also doing a poster campaign and a first year quiz on the European Union.

Sean Kelly is from Kerry and is a member of Fine Gael. He is one of the eleven Irish M.E.P.s, and one of four representing our constituency of Ireland South. He began with talking about his past, before he was an M.E.P. He was a teacher in St. Brendan's College in Co. Kerry. In 2003, he was elected as President of the G.A.A. He remembered handing the Liam McCarthy Cup to the O'Connor twin brothers when Cork won the All Ireland Hurling Final in 2005 after defeating Galway. After he had finished with his G.A.A. career, he ran for Fine Gael in the European Parliament elections in 2009.

He spoke about his work as an M.E.P. One week every month the 751 M.E.P.s meet in the European Parliament's head office in Strasbourg. He spoke about how they vote and what it is like to travel back and forth every month. Starting from his house in Kerry, he wakes up at 5:30am, he leaves and drives to Dublin for his flight. Once he arrives he waits for other M.E.P.s to arrive and they all take a 3.5 hour drive, on a bus, to Strasbourg. Once in the building they talk about several different topics, and over the week, hundreds of votes are taken as the M.E.P.s vote on several topics. After he had finished speaking about the parliament and how it functions, he spoke about his recent and future visits to different places.

Both Thomas MacDonagh and Francis Sheehy Skeffington were part of the teaching staff of St Kieran's in the early years of the last century. They were extraordinary men, MacDonagh was a teacher, a poet, a playwright, a trade unionist and a leader of the rising. Skeffington, a journalist, a pacifist, a feminist, a vegetarian and a teetotaller was a victim of the violence.

We decided that we would like to focus not just on the rising but on their vision and hope for the Ireland of the future, the Ireland of today Hence a competition focusing on the theme of Ireland. It is a poetry competition entitled Young Kilkenny Voices. We asked the First Year students from all the schools in Kilkenny to write creatively on the theme of Ireland and they did so in huge numbers.

When Thomas MacDonagh died he was commemorated by a poem written by his friend Francis Ledwidge, who would die in 1917 on the western front fighting for king and empire as part of the Enniskillen Fusiliers. It is a short poem in which the cow is an allegory for Ireland

Five thousand copies were distributed around O'Connell Street and Dublin City Centre as part of the 1916 commemorations.

majestic stonework features hidden from view, for now at least.

My friends arrive and we begin our warm up. The cold air against my face hits me as I run down the steep hill. The sound is terrific. Ten pairs of feet hitting the ground each with a crunch, breaking the frosted blades of grass. As we pass by more and more trees we are reminded that not everyone is a native. The foreign trees, stick out like a sore thumb. They have tried so hard all summer to fit in but in the end their leaves betray them, stubbornly holding on through the brutal cold months.

Although winter in the Castle Park is beautiful the memories of this place that I will look back on, when I am old or exiled, will be of spring and summer.

The first hint that spring has returned is given to us by the snowdrops. The earth, still thawing out from its hard three month freeze, is no match for these resilient buds. Their flowers, small white droplets brings hope back to many. Looking just like a tiny pieces of snow they are a taunt to the winter which is now dead and gone.

A new sound invades this space. This time it originates from the gravelly path that patrols the perimeter of the park. It is the sound of New Year's resolutions as men and women flock to try and burn off some of that unnecessary fat or train for that marathon they always wanted to complete. An inspiring picture was taken last year and appeared on Facebook. It was a view from the top of the castle and panned out to show off her great wall. In the distance, a train of two hundred men, women and children can be seen running across the courtyard on their weekly Parkrun race. Behind them lies the large expanse of grass, wet with the heavy dewfall and slowly regaining the bright green that summer had temporarily robbed.

Summer is my overall favourite time in the park. Magic drifts through the air as people of all ages take advantage of the beauty of the place. The sun is shining and I lie down on the grass with my friends after another tough workout. The smell of summer is strong and a faint buzz can be heard from the tractor mowing in a distant part of the field. The grass itself is beautiful now, like a smooth golf course running seamlessly up and down the hills. Lying here I listen to the excitement and laughter of children. For some of them it is their first time to visit the park since winter's end.

As I walk towards the car with my shoes in my hands and my feet on natures' carpet I pause. I am back at the bench. I look out across the sward spreading out to my right. A variety of trees stand at the fringes of the bright grass. Copper coloured leaves, dark green shoots and sparkling yellow branches surrounding the calm green sea. The birds, more of them now, chirp in a happier tone. They pounce and bound after insects in the soft ground. Squirrels out of hiding after months can be seen scurrying up trees fleeing hidden dangers. Dogs scamper after balls and frisbees and sticks.

In the distance under the cloudless sky I can see the faraway hill of Castlewarren. Closer still the Hogwarts style tower in St. Canice's hospital. Behind me the Castle stands restored to its elegant glory, the stonework clean and impressive as ever.

Mam beeps the car horn and I realise it's time to go. I cannot wait to get back again.

However from the warm up it was evident that Malahide were clearly not expecting much of a challenge from St Kieran's. This assumption on their behalf would prove unfounded as we took control of the game from the outset to deliver what was probably the team's most complete performance of the year as we won handsomely on a score of 3-9 to 0-7.

St Mary's Edenderry awaited St Kieran's in the final that was played in Hawkfield in Kildare on a crisp and cold morning in January. The game began at a blistering pace as Jack Sheridan swept home an early goal to rock St Mary's. St Mary's responded in a slow but methodical fashion as the first half wore on stretching out to a 4 point lead as the whistle approached. Their possession game and point taking ability was causing the Kieran's defence significant problems, but another St Kieran's goal by Rian Edwards reduced the lead to a minimum just on the stroke of half time. Despite not displaying our full ability in the first half the mood was good at half time and with some inspiring words from Mr Windle the team resolved to take the game to St Mary's in the second half. St Kieran's again goaled early in the second half but was finding it difficult to gain point scoring opportunities against a disciplined defence. St Mary's however were finding it easy to raise the white flag and some of their score taking in this regard was exemplary. As the game was heading towards a close St Kieran's launched everything forward

trying to regain parity and despite two goals from Peter O'Donoghue it proved to be not enough to catch St Mary's on this occasion who added three goals of their own in the final minutes to ensure their victory.

Great credit is due to this panel of players for their commitment to Juvenile football this year. Every player played his part in winning one of the most competitive championships in schools competitions. A special word of mention must also go to TY helpers Ruari Breen, Eoin Kenneally, Kyran O'Sullivan and David O'Connor whose help was invaluable all year.

After lifting the Fr Cosgrave Cup we then focused on our next game which was against Ard Scoil Rís of Limerick. They were Munster Champions so we were sure we would be in for a battle. It was a great win for everyone on the team, our managers Mr Finan, Mr Ruth and Mr Ryan.



The 2015/16 season started off with Kieran's going for three in a row All Ireland titles. There were plenty of players still available from last year's panel and a new face in management with Mr Walsh coming into the set-up with Mr Smith and Mr Maher who were in their fourth year over the senior team. Trials started in October and a panel of 37 was chosen.

The League started off just before the Halloween holidays with comfortable wins over St Brendan's of Birr and Good Counsel and a one point victory over Dublin South in UCD with plenty of past pupils in attendance including Billy Ryan, Sean Brennan, Bill Lahart, Tom Phelan and last year's captain Sean Morrissey. The team qualified for the league semi final against Coláiste Eoin of Dublin where they won on a scoreline of 1-18 to 0-14. The league final was two weeks later in Fenagh against Dublin North in which Kieran's came out victorious 4-12 to 1-14.

The League was over so now it was time to move on to championship. Over the Christmas holidays, Kieran's played a challenge against Ard Scoil Rís on Heywood's astro turf pitch due to the horrible weather in the country at the time. After Christmas they also played challenge matches against the Tipperary minors and WIT. They were due to face either St Brendan's of Birr or Borris VS on January 31st. However the game between Birr and Borris ended in a draw after extra time so the first round was put back a week to February 7th which was tough on the Sixth Year players as it was the week before the mocks.

The first round of the Leinster championship started on February 7th on a freezing wet day in Fenagh. The





team were without many key players such as Joe Connolly, Joe Cuddihy, Edmond Delaney due to injuries and illness. Borris started off the better team going 0-4 to 0-1 ahead until a goal from Sean Carey levelled it 1-1 to 0-4. Adrian Mullen pointed to put us in the lead 1-2 to 0-4. However Borris kept fighting and went into the lead at half time 0-8 to 1-3. The second half started off much better as Kieran's went into a four-point lead after 46 minutes. However, Borris didn't stop playing and with just three minutes left they had scored a goal and a point to leave just a point between the teams. To make matters worse, Kieran's were down to 14 men when substitute Eoin O'Shea was dismissed. Kieran's just about held on and won 1-10 to 1-9 but there were no celebrations just relief after the final whistle.

The Leinster semi final happened a week later on February 14th at the same venue Fenagh on a better day for the team as the mocks were over and the midterm was starting. Before the team left for Fenagh on the bus from the school, An Taoiseach Enda Kenny was paying a visit to the school also earlier that day. The team improved hugely with Joe Connolly, Joe Cuddihy and Edmond Delaney back in the frey but unfortunately without Dylan Jordan who had sustained an injury to his collarbone. At half time they lead 0-7 to 0-5 and in the second half Martin Keoghan helped sweep in a loose ball to put Kieran's into a five point lead 1-8 to 0-6. However Dublin came straight back with a goal from a 20 metre free that opened up the contest again 1-8 to 1-6. But Kieran's showed why they were All-Ireland Champions when Edmond Delaney won the puckout and rattled the net from 25 metres. The game was decided shortly after when Joe Connolly and Joe Cuddihy worked the ball from the right wing to set up Sean Carey who finished to the net towards the left upright. Kieran's were now into the Leinster final against their arch rivals Kilkenny CBS.

Before the Leinster final they played another challenge against the Cork minors over the midterm in Dunmore and training intensified through that week and the weeks leading up to the final. The Leinster final took place on February 27th in Nowlan Park. The atmosphere was electric with great vocal enthusiastic support from both schools in an attendance of 1,931. CBS started off well going 0-5 to 0-1 in the lead with it taking 12 minutes for Kieran's to score. Six minutes later Kieran's took the lead when Tommy Walsh cleared the ball forward towards Adrian Mullen who caught it on the '40'. He took past his marker Shane Mahony and scored a well-worked goal into the bottom right corner. The teams went in level 1-3 to 0-6 at half time. The second half saw CBS go into the lead 0-9 to 1-4 ten minutes into it.



Mullen hit back with a point but in the 41st minute Martin Keoghan received a handpass from Edmond Delaney who ran with force and determination and made the CBS net shake, 2-5 to 0-9. Kieran's widened the gap going past the three-quarter mark going five points ahead with less than five minutes left and they were down to 14 men when captain Tommy Walsh was sent off in the second half for a second yellow. However, two minutes later CBS scored a scrambled goal from joint captain Marc Drennan to put only two points between the teams 2-10 to 1-11. But Kieran's finshed the better team with points from Sean Carey and Adrian Mullen to seal Leinster title no. 54 on a final score of 2-12 to 1-11.

The All Ireland Semi Final took place on the 12th of March in Clonmel Sportsground against Our Lady's Templemore who were beaten in the Harty Cup Final by Ard Scoil Rís. Kieran's had the better start going 1-1 to 0-0 up due to a goal from Colum Prendiville. With 20 minutes gone, Kieran's had a seven point lead 1-8 to 0-4 but it was shortened to four when Templemore got four of the last five scores in the first half. At half time Kieran's were up by four 1-9 to 0-8. In the second half, Templemore started in a determined style putting two points between the teams 1-9 to 0-10. It took 13 minutes for Kieran's to open their account in the second half thanks to a Sean Carev point. The lead could have been more when Kieran's were awarded a penalty in the 45th minute when Colum Prendiville was hauled down. The penalty was saved and the Tipp side were fired up from that save and were on the attack bringing the deficit from six points to two. Kieran's then stepped on the gas in the second half and pulled away. In the 52nd minute, Sean Carey provided a brilliant offload to set up Joe Cuddihy for a superb goal with a clinical finish. Kieran's booked their place in the All-Ireland Final against Ard Scoil Rís of Limerick on a scoreline of 2-16 to 0-13.

The team preparations were increased as the team trained over the Easter Holidays and even paid a visit to Thurles. The final took place on the Easter Bank Holiday Monday in Semple Stadium. Like last year, the team were greeted to a heart-warming tribute from the Kieran's supporters outside Hayes Hotel while on the bus to the



stadium with banners of support. The match was delayed because the match before it had gone to extra time.

The match began and Ard Scoil started off well going 0-6 to 0-4 ahead in the opening guarter but by the 19th minute Kieran's drew level 0-6 a-piece. Then three minutes later, Joe Cuddihy pounced on to a breaking ball and ran straight for the goal. He was hooked but he rattled the Ard Scoil net by pulling on the ball putting Kieran's in the lead 1-6 to 0-6. At the Interval Kieran's went in ahead 1-8 to 0-7. In the second half, Ard Scoil started with a bang scoring a goal after 25 seconds. But Kieran's did not let them back into the game and kept their composure. Into the last quarter of the game Kieran's went comfortably ahead 1-12 to 1-7. However the Limerick men bounced back into the game bringing the margin back to two with four points and Kieran's replying with one from Edward Moylan to make it 1-13 to 1-11 with eight minutes remaining. When the 60th minute came it was just a one point game 1-14 to 1-13. Then Joe Connolly got the insurance point to go two ahead and settle it. The final whistle blew and title no. 21 and the three in a row was achieved. Captain Tommy Walsh lifted the Croke Cup to mark another great year for the senior hurling team. A special word of thanks goes out to Mr Smith, Mr Maher and Mr Walsh for their work with the team throughout the year. For the remaining players who are still available next year we extend our best wishes as they go on their quest for four in a row for the first time ever.
