I have, therefore, a debt of gratitude to the students and their Council, the parents and their Association, the School and College staff and management, my colleagues on the Board of Management, my fellow Trustees, Bishop Séamus our Patron and all those who make this great institution work tirelessly to continually improve - in doing it we most truly live out it's Christian ethos... thank you.

## Mr Joe Lambe



On February 3rd. 2015 we heard of the sad passing of our friend, Joe Lambe, after a short illness in his late 'eighties. Thus ended a connection with St Kieran's College which spanned many decades.

Joe had been a student there in the 'forties, returned to teach mathematics in the second half of the 'fifties and after a career break in the 'sixties when he studied psychology in the U.S., he returned to his teaching post in 1970 and remained there until his retirement in 1993.

I did not have the pleasure of being in Joe's class in the 'fifties, a class where corporal punishment was unheard of, by the way. However, I came under his influence in a newly formed movement for the promotion of all things Gaelic in St Kieran's. It was set up by Fr Kieran Darcy and was called "Comhlucht Chiarain", Joe's enthusiasm for this movement was balanced by his own efforts in a very different area of student activity. Recognising the reality of the life we would encounter on leaving the Spartan ways of boarding school, he set about teaching us ballroom dancing! A brave and very practical decision in its day.

Later, in the 'seventies, when I joined him on the staff, I got to know another side of the man, his reluctance to be easily beaten in a game of golf. Ever helpful and encouraging with those who played with him, he was nevertheless in the habit of making sure of his chip and putt while the opponent was left trying not to three putt... I should know! He reached a very respectable seven handicap at that time although never a big hitter.

Before his retirement he set about learning German and even tested himself by sitting the Leaving Cert German exam where he did very respectably, of course. In more recent years I saw him out with Keep Kilkenny Beautiful, collecting litter along the ring road. It reminded me of his once famous definition of litter as "matter out of context".

He will be remembered by those who knew him as very cultured and cerebral. We were told that his class back in the 'forties were the cleverest group ever to pass through St Kieran's and I can well believe it. He had a genuine love for all things artistic, especially music.

His children, Canice, Joyce and Claire will be consoled to remember that he is now with their beloved mother Maisie, who passed away some years earlier.

In the death of Mgr Tommy Maher St Kieran's College has lost one of our great past pupils, a legendary former staff member as an inspiring teacher of maths, and a former President. Mgr Tommy served here from 1964 until 1983 and was President of St Kieran's College from 1973 to 1983. Conscious of his contribution to St Kieran's College, his desire that students would each achieve the best that was possible for them in the classroom or on the field of play, and his love of, and dedication to, the game of hurling we invited the Chairman of Kilkenny County Board, Ned Quinn, to prepare a piece on Tommy. We are honoured to have it in the College Record this year to recall Fr Tommy.

## Mgr Tommy Maher

It is both a great privilege and deeply humbling for me as the current Chairman of Kilkenny GAA County Board to have been invited by St Kieran's College to pay tribute to Monsignor Tommy Maher who during his life has made such a enormous contribution to the College, to the Parish of Mullinavat and to Kilkenny Hurling.

All will have their own particular memories of Fr Tommy and the positive influence that he was as a teacher and subsequently as President of St Kieran's College and of his time as Parish Priest of Mullinavat where his footprint continues to be visible every day. I should say that the care, loyalty and support shown to him during his latter time in that parish spoke far more eloquently of the regard people had for him than any words could possibly do.

Hurling was a major part of Fr Tommy's life. He was an outstanding hurler himself and was a member of the 1946 Kilkenny All-Ireland Senior hurling final panel and but for his vocation to the priesthood he would have been part of Kilkenny All-Ireland winning team of 1947.

Despite having to call time on his playing career at a relatively young age

the then young priest continued his involvement in the game and went on to become one of the most visionary and successful coaches of all time. He was instrumental along with Donie Nealon, Tipperary; Dessie Ferguson, Dublin; John Hanly, Clare; and Ned Power, Waterford in setting up the first ever Hurling Coaches courses initially in Gormanstown and subsequently in St Kieran's College. These were the forerunners to the Coaching Courses that are available today and that continue to offer so much to our game.

His achievements with St Kieran's College, with Kilkenny and the Mullinavat team, whom he coached to Junior Co-Championship honours in 1984 (their first such title in almost 40 years) are legendary.

With St Kieran's he re-established the College amongst hurling's elite and his legacy there is that they are now top of the second level schools National Roll of Honour.

Of course, it was his role as coach to the Kilkenny team that brought him to national prominence. It is difficult now to realise the fallow period that Kilkenny hurling was experiencing when the then Co Secretary, the late Paddy Grace, invited him to take on the role in 1957. Suffice to say only one All-Ireland, that of 1947, had been won in the previous 16 years. What was to follow then, and what has followed since, could not have been foreseen but there can be no doubt but that the All-Ireland victory achieved in 1957, his first year in charge was seminal in changing the course of our County's hurling history. Further All-Ireland successes followed in '63, '67, '69, '72, '74 and '75 before Fr Tommy relinquished his position.

What has followed since in Kilkenny GAA owes much to his work as Coach over that period of time. He revolutionised the approach to coaching and training teams and it can hardly be a coincidence that each of our successful County Team Managers in the intervening years – Pat Henderson, Eddie Keher, Ollie Walsh and now Brian Cody – all played on teams that he coached.

Fr Tommy will always be remembered as one who contributed so much to hurling and to the class room in St Kieran's College, to the parish of Mullinavat and to Kilkenny hurling in particular. What a legacy to leave behind.

### JOHN QUANE

June 2014 saw the retirement from the teaching staff of John Quane. John's connection with St Kieran's goes back to 1967 when he came to the school as a boarder from his home in Pallasgreen in Co. Limerick. John had a high profile in his student days as an all-round sportsman, featuring on the schools' athletics and hurling teams. In 1972 he featured on a Leinster winning Colleges team with teammates such as Billy Fitzpatrick, who would later go on to captain Kilkenny to win the 1975 All-Ireland, and the legendary Brian Cody.

Having spent a further year in St Munchin's in Limerick, John went on to study Physical Education in Thomond in Limerick where he graduated in 1977. John went on to have spells of teaching in a number of schools in Dublin and Wicklow and also managed to qualify as a career guidance teacher in 1983 after a year's study in UCD.

1988 saw John return to his Alma Mater to teach both Career Guidance and PE. Throughout his time in St Kieran's, John has taken a full and active part in every aspect of college life and was always willing to give up his time for extra-curricular activities. He forged a strong partnership with Tom Hogan in hurling where between 1998-2001 they won 4 successive Leinster Juvenile titles. That same pairing then went on to win 4 successive Leinster Senior titles between '02 and '05, winning

the ultimate prize of the All-Ireland Colleges title in '03 and '04. These Croke Cup victories were particularly memorable for John as his son Jamie played in both finals.

John's involvement in extracurricular activities also saw him take on such diverse activities as managing soccer teams, looking after the school handballers, and at one stage, directing a school musical titled 'Our Day Out' which was a co-production with the Presentation Secondary School. On top of all these activities he still managed to find time to study for a Masters in Education in Trinity College which he was awarded in 1993.

John's colourful attire and personality will be remembered fondly by the students as will his role as the slightly less than lethal centre forward on the staff soccer team against the students at lunch time. Never short of an opinion on any topic, his engaging personality and presence in the staffroom will be missed by all. On behalf of the St Kieran's College Community we wish himself and his wife Dervilla a long and happy retirement.

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Something very subtle happened to our faith around the time of the Second Vatican Council. We no longer thought of faith as merely the ability to assent to a series of propositions such as "I believe in God" and "I believe in a God who made the world" but now we started to talk about God in more personalist terms. Our God was a friend, counsellor and companion. This was wonderful and it offered a new phase in our relationship with him but it also brought difficulties. It is, ironically, easier to assent to a God of the propositions than it is to get to know him as a friend or person. People and friends are, after all, complicated. Making this God known to people is the task of Adult Faith Development (AFD) here in Ossory.

This group of Eadaoin Maher, Declan Murphy, Derek Dooley, Kieran O'Shea, Olivia Maher, Michael Hogan and Dermot Ryan along with Martina Lawlor, who staffs the AFD office in St Kieran's, tries to facilitate various ways to help people, parishes and groups to deepen their understanding of God; and it is the various ways that is most operative in this sentence. Each year the AFD group tries some tested and some new approaches to help further their objective.

This year the group arranged the training for the Extraordinary Ministers of the Eucharist. This training took place during Lent in three locations around the diocese over three nights. The first night led by Fr Oliver Maher focused on service and the calling of the Christian to ministry; the second led by Sr Anna Corcoran explored the role of the Eucharistic Minister in bringing communion to people in homes, hospitals and various situations along with the Sunday Mass; while the last night led by Mr Ken Maher was entirely practical allowing people the chance to practice the distribution of communion and approaching the altar etc. At the suggestion of one parish the group also added a Saturday morning session when all this was covered in one sitting to allow those away from home in College to train to serve in their parishes. The fact that 450 were commissioned or recommissioned in their parishes on Holy Thursday shows the importance of this work.

The AFD group also took advantage of some significant moments in the Church year to focus its work. At Christmas a candle and accompanying prayer card was offered to parishes as a means to draw attention in homes around the diocese to the infant Lord during the hectic festive days. It was wonderful to know that over 2,000 candles made it to parishes and homes throughout the diocese - hopefully stirring people to a simple prayer or short reflective moment on the real significance of these days. On St Patrick's Day we often think of those who have travelled from home and acting upon the suggestion of Thomastown Parish Council the AFD group produced simple prayer cards that were offered free to parishes in 2015. The wonderful idea from Thomastown was to post these to people away from home so as to let them know they are being thought of during our National feast day. Over 5,000 cards were sent out to the parishes and many of these no doubt made it to all corners of our world. During Catholic Schools week the group produced simple bookmarks for the teachers of our schools. With so many Catholic primary and secondary schools in the diocese being led by such wonderful teachers and ancillary staff the group thought it opportune to celebrate that fact and offered a simple prayer for teachers on this bookmark. It was posted to all parishes to distribute and many commented very favourably on the idea to the office.

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In a welcome development this year the AFD group, under the leadership of Derek Dooley, was involved in forming five people to be able to work with parishes in training and planning with their pastoral councils. These people, Diarmuid Healy, Kathleen Maher, Eilish Costello, Paschal Grace, Pat Bacon, were sourced from the Diocesan Forum thereby displaying the collaboration that takes place between the groups of the diocese who are all working towards the same goal. The new initiative means that there will be always a team of people in each deanery available to work with Parish Councils in their own parishes.

The Ossory Times magazine is now in its third year and going from strength to strength. Each quarterly edition has well over fifty pages of full colour news and articles from around the diocese. It is offered for sale in all parishes at just €2 to be accessible to all. The founding idea of the publication was to produce something that would not only carry news from around the diocese and the church universal but also would include educational articles on various aspects of our faith. It clearly does that. Flicking through its pages you see a diocese that is alive and active - a faith with flesh on it as it is lived in the people and parishes of our diocese. We are fortunate to have people so committed to the faith in Ossory and is wonderful to share the news of that, and the ideas that it offers, with each other.

The AFD group has also now developed its staple diet of regular offerings to people and parishes. Throughout Advent and Lent a daily text message was sent to those who subscribed. This took the form of a thought for the day which was taken from scripture, the office of readings, or a Church documents along with a little "to do" for the day. In this venture alone over 2,000 people from around the diocese were journeying together during these liturgical seasons. Moreover, thanks to the collaboration of Fr Chris Hayden of Ferns diocese the AFD group produced and offered free in all parishes scripture reflection sheets on Sundays during the year. These sheets guided individuals and groups in reflecting

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on the Sunday Gospel during the week be that at home or at work.

The Thought for the Day booklet which is now in its second year was also a great success. These little booklets carried a piece of scripture and a short reflection prompting the reader to do or reflect on something each of the days of Advent and Lent. Fr Kieran O'Shea had worked on this for the past number of years with some of the graduates of the Certificate in Theology. This year he passed the mantle as Michael Hogan and Cathal Cullen took up the challenge to work on compiling these booklets. They certainly faced up to the challenge: over 1000 of these booklets were distributed throughout the diocese twice in the year and people have already asked for more of the same next year we will certainly hope to oblige.

Another of the staples now is the Diocesan Blitz in May. It was once again wonderful to see so many children and their families come to the College to enjoy a day's hurling and camogie. It is probably the first time that each of them get to hurl for the pride of their parish wearing their club colours - for many it wont be the last. How fitting it is that among their first medals is a Diocesan one - their parish teams will, as we all know, continue to be such a part of their lives in the years ahead. Once again we were very fortunate to have Brian Cody and Angela Downey along to meet the players and witness the skills - and many of the county hurling stars dropped in to present medals. Over 50 clubs from the diocese were represented. The pitches so used to the tradition Black and White of St Kieran's were on this day awash with club colours from near and far.

Like any relationship getting to know God is a life long process. This is both challenge and opportunity for the AFD group in St Kieran's as they continue to explore ways, those various ways, to help people know God. If you have ideas or suggestions please let us know. We always welcome them...





## **OSSORY DIOCESAN FORUM**

One of the most significant undertakings of the Forum in the past year was the work that was done on the development of a draft Pastoral Plan for the Diocese of Ossory. The origins of this Plan can be traced to the "Listening Sessions" that were held throughout the Diocese in May 2010. Many gatherings, meetings and reflections later in 2013, when the three Deanery Pastoral Councils and the Diocesan Pastoral Council were coming to the end of their term of office, a comprehensive evaluation of the previous four years was undertaken. The main proposal that came from this process was that a Diocesan Pastoral Plan be developed to give focus and direction to the work of all pastoral groups in the Diocese. This became the priority for the new Diocesan Pastoral Council that took office in January 2014.

Between the end of 2014 and the beginning of 2015 the Council of Priests, the Deanery Pastoral Councils and the priests of the Diocese have had an opportunity to consider the draft plan and make their own suggestions. A draft Diocesan Pastoral Plan, addressing such areas as

- Co-Responsibility for the Mission of the Diocese,
- Reimagining Parish Leadership in the Light of Today's Reality,
- Pastoral Care of Priests,
- Liturgy,
- Young People,
- Child Safeguarding,
- Communication,
- Outreach
- Nourishing Faith

was recently presented to and accepted by Bishop Freeman.

The experience of the Deanery Pastoral Council meetings in Kilkenny, Mullinavat and Ballyragget where lay people, priests and religious came together to consider the Plan were a good example of what the Forum seeks to promote: "an effective, collaborative Church" in action. (Forum Constitution, p.3).



## **Kilkenny Liberal Studies Group**

## **Certificate in Theological Studies**

With a noticeable, and welcome, increase in lay involvement in our parishes in various ways, Baptismal teams, Parish Councils, Liturgy groups and in many other areas, the diocese must do all it can to encourage and support people to feel equipped to take on these leadership roles. Precisely for this St Kieran's College began it's Certificate in Theology a number of years ago. This course is formative as well as informative - helping people prepare for, and supporting them in, their service in our parishes. Dear Potential Student,

I decided to write you a letter in the hope of encouraging you to consider participating in the Certificate in Theological Studies at St Kieran's College. I would have appreciated such a letter because returning to education is daunting. Finding a work-life-family-studies balance is challenging. However, having completed this part-time course in one year, (which is actually just 100 hundred hours from September to May), I feel proud to now have a third level qualification to my name.

If I had read this before applying last year I would have liked to know about the type of person who might do this course. So, I'm Pat from Waterford and I've just turned 40. I'm married to a very supportive Kilkenny woman who recently gave birth to a little boy, and our eldest son is making his first Holy Communion this year. It's a busy house!! We reached a point where we wanted to give something back to the Church-well we have a lot to be thankful for. So we recently got involved in the children's Liturgy group in our parish. Thankfully it's going really well and we're enjoying the experience. However I wished to feel better equipped to answer the inevitable questions that children will ask and so I found the perfect course.

This programme is accredited by St Patrick's College Maynooth as a Level 7 Certificate in Theological Studies. The course provides a general theological education and the theological background needed for lay involvement and leadership roles at parish and diocesan level. The 6 modules include the Old and New Testaments; Moral Theology; Church History; Sacraments and Liturgy; and Ecclesiology. The lectures are interesting with notes for reference and the lecturers are experts in their respective disciplines. The library and administration staff are extremely helpful and it really helps having someone who has previously done the course to answer any queries. The course director is a frequent visitor which is very encouraging and highlights how much they care and their desire for learning to occur.

I am happy to recommend this course to you. It is a learning and social outlet with like-minded people with whom you get to share a "cuppa" with each evening. There is plenty of learning support and remember there's strength in numbers. The course is an opportunity to enrich your understanding of your faith and that of others in your community by encouraging further involvement in your parish. Finally, I urge you to consider doing something for yourself. Completing the course provides a wonderful sense of achievement. I wish you well.

# Maynooth University's Kilkenny Campus

Maynooth University has been running flexible programmes at its Kilkenny Campus based at St Kieran's College for over eighteen years. Up to a year ago, the programmes were mainly aimed at mature students (those aged 21 and over) and since 2013 there has been an increasing focus on the new First Arts programme which is open to mature students and school leavers alike.

Over the years, over 1,450 students of the Campus were awarded with qualifications ranging across the full spectrum from Level 5 certificate to PhD. This year alone, two of those who commenced their academic studies on the part-time BA in Local Studies at the campus completed PhDs in History: Dr. Pat Bracken from Thurles and Dr. Richard Hyland from Clonmoran, just outside Kilkenny; Richard is himself a past-pupil of St Kieran's College.

The Department of Adult and Community Education at Maynooth University has provided a home for the Campus since its establishment, and the ethos of that Department with its emphasis on the transformational power of education, and the creation of a supportive learning environment has informed and guided the campus through its ongoing development.



## First Arts at Maynooth University's Kilkenny Campus is thriving

In September 2014 the second group of First Arts students started at Kilkenny Campus. Just under seventy students both from the local area and further afield are studying the first year of their Bachelor of Arts degree in Kilkenny (CAO Code MH901), an increase of approximately 40% from the previous year.

This full time programme which has attracted Leaving Certificate and mature students alike offers the option of studying three subjects out of a choice of eight. Some of the most popular subjects from the main Campus are on offer including English, History, Sociology, Geography, Philosophy, Anthropology and Economics, and St Patrick's College Maynooth is also offering Theology. On successful completion of their first year at Kilkenny Campus, students will transfer to the main campus to complete the Honours BA with Maynooth University (MH101), or the Bachelor of Arts and Theology with St Patrick's College, Maynooth (MU001) if continuing with Theology.

Many students from the local area find the financial benefits of living at home for their first year of college very beneficial. Others from further afield find the smaller numbers on campus very attractive, and opt for Kilkenny as an easier transition from second-level to university. For others, the opportunity to have the first year of their University experience in the vibrant city of Kilkenny has been a selling point, and it has also brought revenue in to the city as many students lodge with local families.

This year St Kieran's College, where the University's Kilkenny Campus is located, also made student accommodation available for students, adding to the appeal of the Kilkenny offering.

The students from last year have given very positive feedback on their experience and have transitioned very well

into their second year on the main Maynooth Campus – there was a 96% transfer rate into second year. At the November Awards Ceremony at Maynooth University, five out of the 49 students from the initial Kilkenny First Arts cohort received awards for academic excellence and student engagement.

Kilkenny students have been performing strongly academically compared to their counterparts on the main campus and they have benefitted greatly from the smaller class sizes, student focused learning environment and the vibrant campus community. They themselves have commented that "we are eased into college life in a friendly environment and we get to know everyone really well", and "smaller classes are better, the lecturers know your name".

The current group of First Year students are also seeing the benefits of the smaller campus experience in their feedback to date. Like their predecessors, they have performed on a par academically with their counterparts on the main campus and they have also formed strong bonds of friendship with each other that they will take with them into their second year. The students have been active in the extracurricular areas of their college experience also, organising soccer matches against the first year team from the main campus and taking part in Anti-racism Day with students from Transition Year at St Kieran's College. One of our students regularly represents the university in intervarsity golf competitions, and we even have a few hurlers in the group!

My English teacher, Mr O'Neill had once mentioned to me that my greatest flaw in writing is the inability to portray my honest opinion. So ironically he had asked me if I wanted to take on the challenging task of writing about St Kieran's College from my own perspective over the six years that I have been here; a task that I would consider to be more daunting than trying to articulate an intelligent response to the poetry of Eiléan Ní Chuilleanáin, but with great honour I decided to take on this challenge.

Having read each of the Sixth Year articles found in previous records in preparation for writing my own perspective, I realised that what I was doing was a completely useless exercise, because as a year we were unique and no previous generalisation would get across the subtlety of being so. Each new cohort that has the privilege of starting their studies at St Kieran's is undoubtedly made up of individuals, who look at their new classmates as strangers and complete aliens; however the magic of this college is so successful at bonding students and bringing out the best of qualities in each and every one of us, that I can proudly say with confidence that the class of 2015 is as diverse as a year can be, yet at the same feels like one big family. It has been a pleasure for me to study in the company of over one hundred lads who are all different and unique, yet who all share a love for St Kieran's College and the experiences that it has provided us with. For that

very reason, even though this piece is directed at my personal experience of studying here, I would like it to be more than simply my story of events but rather a spectacular chronicle that will not only serve us as a reminder of our personal journeys as Kieran's men, but also our journey as a year together.

Probably like everyone else, I remember my first day at St Kieran's College as if it had happened just yesterday. It was Friday afternoon in late August of 2009 when I put on my Kieran's uniform for the very first time in anticipation of starting my scholarly life in this famous College. Feeling a degree of apprehension that day, I walked into Hall 33 as silently as I could so as not to get noticed; yet the first thing that struck me was actually the state of the desks, rather than the uncountable number of eyes staring at me. Those old wooden desks, that we as a year had the privilege of using had clearly stood the test of times, yet it didn't take long for them to be filled with over a hundred small and innocent First Years goggling at the unfamiliar faces around them, in the anticipation of something wonderful about to happen. That something wonderful was probably guidance, by our year-head Mr O'Keeffe and the team of Cairdeas students waiting by his side. His opening line is a phrase



that had latched onto my memory the moment I had first heard it; 'in primary school you were small fish in a small pond, but now men, you are big fish in a large pond.' From that moment onwards I knew that discipline wasn't something to be messed around with in this school and that we were expected to uphold the ethos of St Kieran's College. Just like that our journeys as Kieran's men had begun, whether it was perfecting our shoedrawing techniques up in the freezing art room, learning how to type, the challenge of memorising not only the hundreds of different names around us, but also where everything was or preparing strenuously for the first year hurling league. It was an exciting period of change, but before we knew it first year was over and we were no longer the smallest and youngest in the pecking order.

Second year was followed by a new sense of freedom that undoubtedly all Second Years feel at some stage. Being pretentious 'masters of the corridors' with the Junior and Leaving Certificate exams feeling like decades away; what better way was there to enjoy this new sense of liberty than during my year's first sports day ever. That sunny Friday afternoon of late September in Scanlon Park proved to be just the beginning of the 2010/2011 school year that would culminate with a series of fantastic achievements in the field of sport for the school, most notably the clean sweep in GAA. As for me, the moment I took the wrong turn and headed towards Dublin's docklands with a couple of friends during my class' trip to the Dáil is still something that I can't quite get out of my head, but it wasn't nearly as bad as when I managed to get soaked playing golf on St Kieran's Day.

Third year had welcomed us back hostilely with 'study, study, study' echoing through our crammed heads like a mantra with the words 'Junior Cert' stuck somewhere in between. I think it was the first time that any of us had felt the pressure of state exams, but luckily we got through it and Transition Year was just around the corner.

For me and I am sure for many others, TY felt like a deep breath of relief after the pressure of the Junior Cert exams. Without a doubt I have to say that Transition Year was one of the most enjoyable experiences that I have had during my time in this school because only then did I feel the pain than entrepreneurs have to go through. Never before in my life had I considered the difficulty involved in designing a product that would be both profitable and in demand, as the time when we had to submit an idea for the Student Enterprise Awards. For anybody that had wanted to earn a fortune, this was the time to shine, but I have to admit that it doesn't go so well when you start to ignore intellectual property, as my mini-company found out the hard way ! Outdoor trips were my favourite and even though running down Sliabh na mBan wasn't the most comfortable thing one could do; the fun that was had during the Gaisce trip to Jenkinstown Woods is surely a night to remember (if you ignore sleeping on frozen solid ground that is). ECDL, the Enrichment Programme, London, the various projects and workshops that we undertook demonstrated the perks of being in Fourth Year and we were surely going to miss it. Looking back at it, I would probably compare TY to one of those rare, yet beautiful dreams that one may have - exciting and surreal, yet never to repeat again.

Fifth year had sadly come and it took us by surprise. The prospect of actually having to study for the Leaving Cert no longer seemed as if it was a century away; it was closer than we had thought and we were bombarded with work to compensate for our funriddled Transition Year. Those of us doing Spanish were lucky to get away and detox ourselves in Spain but it would be highly ignorant of me to forget about my hardworking, Frenchspeaking friends, but to reassure them that 'vous étiez toujours dans ma tête'!; while those in my year who were on the Senior Hurling panel enjoyed tremendous success in the All-Ireland Senior Hurling Championship against local rivals CBS, in what was described to me as being 'a historic moment' in Nowlan Park, an achievement that I openly congratulate them on. Even though I probably have a greater chance of mastering something peculiar like a dead language than the art of hurling, I have always been fascinated by the passion and dedication of the players, right from my very first weeks of first year. Having went to a primary school where getting hit by a sliotar was as common

as getting something wrong in Irish, I wasn't surprised by the interest in hurling at St Kieran's College; however even the likes of me knew that it was on a completely different level here. I had always wondered what made it attractive to a bunch of lads to run around in horrendous Irish weather, but the victory of the Senior hurlers managed to move my Slavonic heart for the very first time. Having lost to CBS in the Leinster final and then having the courage to pick themselves back up again with a flaming sense of utter passion, dedication and teamspirit and win, is a truly inspiring story and that sense of achievement as a team after much hardship is probably the answer to my own question. If there is anything useful that I managed to learn during Fifth Year, then it is definitely to never give up even when the going gets tough (and also not to write short stories in my Leaving Cert English exam), from my inspiring classmates.

That is truly the attitude that I wanted to instil in myself at the beginning of Sixth Year. If anything, I think it would be true to say that your final secondary school year does fly, as most people warn you beforehand; but as a Sixth Year I feel that it's also the most enjoyable as for the first time in our lives teachers have started treating us as young adults rather than as a hoard of primitive school children.

As Sixth Year is slowly coming towards an end, the milkman remains my only hope of grasping Leaving Cert genetics, while the only metaphor that 'Géibheann' could symbolise is the enduring captivity of the Irish education system, or colloquially better known as the Leaving Cert. On the behalf of all my year I would like to say a big thank you to all the staff at St Kieran's College for tolerating our imperfections for more than half a decade and for doing such an amazing job at educating us and supporting us in our journey of becoming young men. I would also like to take this opportunity to wish the very best of luck to my fellow classmates in the upcoming Leaving Cert examinations and I am confident that wherever you end up, you will achieve great success and make St Kieran's College proud of the class of 2015! After all, we can't deny that we're going to miss St Kieran's in the years to come.

## Pastoral Care in St Kieran's

Every year the students of St Kieran's College have a day set aside for retreat. A retreat is a chance for our students to relax, to take some time out of their busy schedules and to spend some time together with their friends. Retreats provide opportunities for the students to reflect on their lives and to perhaps discuss and think about what direction their lives are going in. Retreats can also be spiritual experiences with some time set aside for some prayer or meditation.

#### LITURGIES

Throughout the school year we hold many prayerful liturgies. In September we celebrate our Opening of the School Year mass which welcomes our new First Year students to the school as well as all teachers. staff and students for another school year. During November we remember our deceased loved ones and friends which we marked this year with a mass in the College Chapel. Advent quickly followed, when we prepare for the birth of Christ with class prayers and teaching on the beginning of the Church's liturgical calendar. Before the Christmas exams, all students gathered for the Christmas Carol Service. 2013 saw the introduction of Carols in the College chapel; an atmospheric occasion which was repeated again this year in the lead up to Christmas. A whole school liturgy is celebrated annually for the feast of St Kieran in St Mary's Cathedral on St Kieran's Day. Lenten preparations consist of reflections and prayers for all classes, with pieces of scripture presented on the TV screens around the school. The final school duty for every Leaving Cert student is to attend the Graduation Mass at the very end of the school year where we bid farewell Leaving Certs and pray for a safe, healthy and successful future for all. Our liturgies are an integral part of life in St Kieran's College as it is through our liturgical prayer that we get the opportunity to express our faith and celebrate the important events and moments in our lives together.

### RETREATS

Our First Year students receive their retreat in the school theatre. This is a "Friendship Day" which focuses on the importance of friendship and the importance of not tolerating bullying as a part of our school. This is a day which gives each of the First Years a good opportunity to meet and get to know everyone in their class in a more informal setting. The day begins with a couple of games which encourages the students to speak to others that they haven't yet spoken to. The retreat team spend a good part of the day on their anti-bullying workshop. There is also some time allocated for questions, answers and prayer. In the afternoon, an activity is planned to encourage



First Years to relax, have fun and enjoy each others company.

In Second and Third Year, students visit the Castletown Retreat Centre, Co Laois and go on a walking retreat from Duiske Abbey in Graiguenamanagh, Co Kilkenny to the picturesque village of St Mullins, Co Carlow. This gives class groups a chance to bond, to follow in the foot-steps of our Christian ancestors and to pause for prayer.

In Fourth Year the retreat takes on a slightly different dynamic. Students go on some form of pilgrimage for a day. This year the Transition Years journeyed to the monastic site of Glendalough, Co Wicklow. Here, we follow in the footsteps of St Kevin. Our journey begins and ends at the lake. Various thoughts, prayers and readings are given throughout the day and mass is celebrated upon return to the lake. We pray for good weather particularly on this day!

In Fifth Year the students get the opportunity to re-visit Castletown, three years on for a little more time out, discussion and prayer. Finally, in Sixth Year students receive a retreat with a difference. The retreat is held in the school theatre. The theme for the day is "Life After the Leaving Cert" and three guest speakers meet the lads to give them their experience of life after the Leaving. The class of 2015 met two past pupils, Fergal Brennan and Cormac Connolly, who are currently studying in Dublin, Fr Sean Donoghue, Capuchin Friar and Commandant Robert Kearney, past-pupil of St Kieran's and is now studying for his Masters in the Curragh, Co Kildare having served in Liberia, Chad, Syria and Israel in recent years. An opportunity to pray and a good lunch in Langtons helps the lads to enjoy this day, while focusing them on the Leaving and their future lives beyond the gates of St Kieran's.

Retreats offer a break from the hustle and bustle of everyday life. In St Kieran's College we feel that its important for all students to get an opportunity to take time out of their busy lives during the school year. We often hear of things which can happen in life that puts things into perspective for us. May we never lose sight of the real meaning of our lives and give thanks for the many blessings we have.

### MINISTERS OF THE EUCHARIST

When we got to school at 8am the three of us didn't have the expectation that we were going to get any prize, we were delighted to work on our project and participate. There were six other projects from the school and there was great excitement about the exhibition.

When we arrived in WIT we set up our stand and waited for the judges to come around there was one round of judging for us as the judges came around we started to realise they really liked our idea, they were especially impressed with the fact that we surveyed the students in school and made the changes to our prototype.

As there was only one round of judging for our section during the other round of judging we were showing our idea to the other students and to teachers from other schools. Soon after we began to realise that people were really impressed by our invention and that we actually had a chance to win a prize. At 1pm the judges were coming around to the top four and our project was included.

When it came to the prize giving we were hoping for best technology project or best junior project but they had given away all them prizes and we thought we had not won anything but in fact we had actually won runners up of the best overall project, we were delighted and came back to school with a plaque.

## AG SCIENCE TRIP

The 5th year Agricultural Science class accompanied by Mr Darmody went on their annual farm visit to Kildalton Agricultural college in Piltown on March 3rd. Kildalton College is the largest agricultural college in the country. It is a leading provider of training in Equine Studies, Machinery, Agriculture and Horticulture. The farm visit is part of the fulfilment of the practical component of Agricultural Science, which makes up 25% of the overall marks.

We visited ten demonstration stands. Our first visit was to the Irish Dairy Board where we heard about emerging dairy markets in Asia and Africa. In Africa, lumps in the milk are preferred because it shows a visitor that an individual has the wealth to buy powdered milk rather than getting it from the cow in the back field. With new emerging dairy markets, Kerrygold launches sixty new products every year to meet consumer demand across the globe.

In the dairy shed, we received information on the breeding and production of a typical crossbred dairy cow (Jersey cross Holstein Friesian). This type of dairy cow is seen as most profitable because hybrid vigour is maximised. Hybrid vigour is where the performance of the offspring outperforms the average performance of the parents. The Holstein Friesian has high milk yields, poor milk solids and reduced fertility, whereas the Jersey have the opposite. However, the Jersey offspring have very bad conformation and therefore have limited beef value. Since the abolition of the milk quota on March 31st 2015, farmers are not curtailed on their production. This may lead to an oversupply of milk worldwide, which will result in volatile milk prices. High milk solids (protein and butterfat) will be needed in order to obtain a higher milk price.

On our visit, we got to see a soil profile, machinery in use for preparing a field for a tillage crop, a dissection of a ruminant stomach, vegetative propagation in plants, grassland management techniques, calibrating a fertiliser spreader, ewe and lamb management and the beef enterprise in Kildalton.

Overall, the farm visit was very worthwhile as we got to see theory being put into practice. We wrote up a report on our farm visit. This report along with our other projects on crops and animals will be examined by our practical examiner next May.







## **BRIGHT IDEAS COMPETITION.**

James Everard and Ben Lanigan, third year students, participated in the bright ideas science competition, organised by Merck, Sharpe and Dome in Clonmel Tipperary. Ben's idea involved a system for recovering rainwater and pumping this into the house to reduce water fees and increase water conservation. James' idea involved developing a rubber sole that fits over football boots enabling the wearer to convert their boots into a pair of trainers, reducing the need to bring trainers in your kit bag.

The lads qualified for the finals whereby Ben finished second and James finished third. Well done to both of them.

## **BT YOUNG SCIENTIST**

The BT Young Scientist and Technology exhibition was held in the RDS in Dublin from the 7th to the 10th of January. The 550 projects that qualified for the exhibition were displayed from the Wednesday to the Saturday for the judges and public to see. The 2015 exhibition was the 51st time the event had been held. The 2015 exhibition received its highest ever entry numbers with 2077 projects applying. Projects, created and perceived by students from all around Ireland, which qualified in October, came together to be judged and viewed by Lecturers and Professors.

Our group consisting of Peter Mullan, Eoin Minnock, and Kieran Lucey qualified with a project based around the expansion of the universe and its relation to the formation stars, and attended the RDS in Dublin. Throughout the three days that the projects were open to public viewing, over 59,000 people came to enjoy the exhibition, while we partook in rigorous and enjoyable judging rounds. There was an unceasing list of events to go to during the day and night like the ice skating, student discos, social gatherings, competitive snow ball fights and water slides. We were accommodated at the nearby Bewley's Hotel where we stayed with other students from over 362 schools. The atmosphere was great around the RDS and the hotel with thousands of students to meet and talk to throughout the event.



The young scientist competition begins at the start of the year when you begin to research your idea, and you continue to work on it until January but in the end the work is well outweighed by the enjoyment and excitement during your four days in Dublin.



On the 14th of November Transition Year students together with their science teachers, Ms Boland, Mr Reddy and Ms Hanrick hosted all of the 6th class students from St Canice's, St John's and St Patrick's Primary Schools for a science workshop in the St Kieran's College Theatre. Over 140 students from the 3 schools took part in the workshop.

The transition year students demonstrated some exciting chemical reactions including "The Lycodium Bomb", "Elephant Toothpaste" and "The Dehydration of Sugar with Acid". The primary school students then circulated the room visiting a number of workstations where the Transition Year students taught them a number of experiments including, how to put a needle through a balloon without it bursting, to getting their hair to stand on end using the Van de Graaff Generator.

The workshops were an enjoyable learning experience for both the primary school students and Transition Year students, many of whom showed great potential as educators!

The European Youth Parliament (EYP) is a non-partisan and independent educational project run by the Schwarzkopf Foundation which is tailored specifically to the needs of young European citizens.

EYP encourages independent thinking and socio-political initiative in young people and facilitates the learning of crucial social and professional skills. Since its inauguration, many tens of thousands of young people have taken part in regional, national and international sessions, formed friendships and made international contacts across and beyond borders. The European Youth Parliament has thus made a vital contribution towards uniting Europe.

EYP Ireland runs five conferences during its calendar year; four Regional and one National conference. The four regionals are open to all Transition Year and 5th year students and it is from these that delegates are selected to attend the National Conference. These conferences take place over a full weekend i.e. Friday afternoon, all-day Saturday and allday Sunday, with the National Conference beginning on a Thursday afternoon and ending on Sunday evening (i.e. 4 days).

This year St Kieran's College took part in EYP for the first time. On Friday the 6th of February 2015 three 5th year students Alan Mooney, Patrick Kennedy and I headed down to cork for the Munster Regional Session.

There we were divided into different committees. Alan was on the Committee on Civil Liberties, Justice and Home Affairs which tackled the problem of migration into the EU. Patrick was on the Committee on Development which focused on the huge task of providing sustainable energy to all. I was on the Committee a way on Development III which was tasked with finding a way for the EU to tackle Ebola and develop healthcare systems abroad.

Friday was spent getting to know the other members in our committee through teambuilding exercises. Saturday was an intense day of committee work where we had to come up with solutions to our problems. On Sunday there was a General Assembly where each committee put forward it's resolution and it was voted on. Thankfully all of our resolutions passed on the day.

### **Senior Hurling**

The senior hurling panel this year included a lot of members from the year previous that tasted All Ireland success. Before their campaign even started 13 members of this year's panel had just won All Ireland Minor medals with Kilkenny. Unfortunately a major setback occurred for two players from last year's winning team, when Darren Mullen and Jason Barcoe both suffered cruciate injuries during the summer. Trials began in October and a panel of 37 was chosen.

The league went very well for Kieran's with comfortable wins over Antrim Schools, Coláiste Eoin and Dublin North. Those wins set up a league semi final against our arch rivals Kilkenny CBS. Both teams fought hard and Kieran's came out the victors 0-14 to 1-6. The League final against Borris came on December 9th in Dr Cullen Park on a wet cold day. Borris played very well and kept up with Kieran's for most of the game. In the end Kieran's ran out deserving winners 2-12 to 0-7. The team would go into the Christmas break with some silverware.

Over the Christmas break, Kieran's played three challenge matches against Thurles CBS (who they would later go on to meet in the All Ireland Final), St Brigid's of Loughrea and Athenry. When they returned from Christmas break it was confirmed that first round of the championship would be against who else but Kilkenny CBS. It would be the end of the year for whoever lost. The training intensified in preparation for the game. Kieran's played another challenge against Tipp minors two weeks before the game. The Leinster Championship began on January 31st in Nowlan Park. CBS started very well with a goal early on from Robbie Murphy. But the team battled back and with a 20 metre free from Jason Cleere, the teams were level 1-3 to 0-6 at half time. In the 2nd half Kieran's dramatically upped their game with point after point along with an excellent goal from Billy Ryan they ran out deserving winners 1-14 to 2-3.

With the win over CBS, they now faced Good Counsel in the Leinster semi final. This one match was one of the best performances of the year as they were 0-14 to 0-2 up at half time.

The game was as good as over in the second half as Ray Lahart put 10 points on the scoreboard and Tadhg O'Dwyer netted a goal from a rebound by Daniel O'Connor. The team were now in the All Ireland series but who they would play would depend on their result in the Leinster Final against St Peter's of Wexford. Peter's proved to be very strong opposition in Dr Cullen Park. At half time Kieran's led 0-5 to 0-4 but when the second half arrived Peter's went straight into the lead from a goal by Billy Dunne son of Wexford manager, Liam Dunne. However, three minutes later midfielder Richie Leahy went on a run through the Peter's defence to score an excellent goal to put Kieran's 1-8 to 1-4 ahead. From then on, Kieran's took control with Jason Byrne scoring a point from a sideline soon after. An 8 point victory ensured that Kieran's won their 53rd Leinster title.

First round v CBS Thurles

The Leinster Final win meant they would play the Harty Cup runners up St Francis College, Rochestown of Cork. The game was played on St Patrick's weekend on a very mucky field in Fraher Field, Dungarvan. With 16 minutes gone, Rochestown were leading by 3 but with points by Seán Morrissey, Liam Blanchfield and a goal from Tadhg O'Dwyer, Kieran's went 1-4 to 0-5 ahead. In the 2nd half, Kieran's were 5 points up with 13 minutes gone, however in the space of ten minutes the rebels got 3 points and brought the lead back to 2 with only 5 minutes remaining. Then another sideline point from Jason Byrne and a goal from substitute Niall Walsh finished the game. The College were now in the All Ireland Semi Final.

The All Ireland Semi Final was against Presentation College Athenry a week later. Nice weather was provided for the game in Banagher, County Offaly. This game would be without a doubt the toughest battle of the year. The sides were level 11 times throughout the game which included half time as both teams scored 0-9 a piece. Athenry's Evan Niland and captain Brian Burke proved to be quite hard to keep quiet for the Galway men with 15 points between them out of 17. In the 57th minute, the teams were still leading, it looked like extra time was coming until Captain Seán Morrissey reacted to a breaking ball and got the point that put the men in black and white in the lead. Joe Connolly followed up with a free and the All Ireland champions went up by 2 points into additional time. The Athenry men didn't stop playing and with seconds remaining a high ball from Burke was driven into the Kieran's half and snatched by Niland. Athenry needed a goal and substitute Eamonn Egan wasn't allowing it when he intercepted Niland's handpass attempt to one of his teammates. Jason Cleere collected the ball and the match was over on a scoreline of 0-19 to 0-17.

There was a slight problem with the team going into the All-Ireland final. After Morrissey hit that crucial point he was hit with a belt and was a serious doubt for the match. However Morrissey got the cast removed and decided to line out for his school one last time.

The day of the final was April 4th in Thurles against the Harty Cup champions Thurles CBS on their home turf in Semple Stadium. The bus was very quiet on the way up to the game and when arriving in Thurles a bit of life was put on to the team when past pupils and present pupils came out the door of Hayes Hotel and saluted the team on the way to the stadium. The support from the past and present pupils were fantastic on the day amongst the attendance of 3,852.

Kieran's started well leading 0-4 to 0-1 with 14 minutes gone until Thurles forward Michael Connors scored a goal which put them level. But the team were very quick to reply when 3 minutes later Ray Lahart gave a pass from his own 65 to Billy Ryan. Ryan ran out to the side gave a pass back to Lahart who ran all the way to the 21 and replied with a well worked goal. At the break, the College were up 1-10 to 1-7. Thurles came back into

it fast in the second half with points from Jack Skehan and Niall Heffernan to bring the deficit to one point. The men in black and white came back with 4 unanswered points, one hard worked, one from Richie Leahy, two from Lahart who would end up with a total of 1-5 and the fourth from the other midfielder Jason Byrne. Thurles struck back with 2 more points to make it 1-11 to 1-14 with 10 minutes left. Just before that corner back Johnny Barron went off injured and a few minutes later while trying to stop one of Thurles's best players Billy McCarthy, Tommy Walsh and Eoin Walsh got bundled up in a challenge but continued playing. In the 59th minute Morrissey scored Kieran's final score to put them 4 ahead into additional time. However the Tipp men were not stopping playing yet and back up the field the ball went and corner forward Robbie Long nearly struck a ball but it went over the bar, back to the a 3 point game. With 40 seconds remaining Thurles were awarded a free in which they needed a goal. The ball was dropped in and won by substitute Eoghan Kearney who ran right beside the referee as the final whistle was blown. St Kieran's College were All Ireland Champions for the 20th time. Seán Morrissey lifted the cup which was presented to him, by a Kerry man, may I add. Reflecting back on the year, this was one of the most successful years in the history of hurling in St Kieran's College. They did not lose a league game and they did

not lose a game in Leinster or in the All Ireland Championship.

Mr Smith and Fr Ryan spoke about the team's dedication this year. Their discipline on and off the field, turning up to training three times a week, taking time off their Christmas break to go play challenge matches in Galway and Tipperary. A special thanks must go the men on the sideline, Mr Liam Smith, Mr Ken Maher and Mr Ger Flood and of course to Robbie O'Flynn and the TY helpers who helped prepare the team during different matches this year. Hopefully next year, Kieran's could win 3 in a row for the first time since 1990.
