Recently, on the morning of May 6th, the Kenyan athlete, Eliud Kipchoge, was part of a team of three runners who attempted to break the 2hr barrier for a marathon. Something many believe impossible. He finished, running alone, in a time of 2hrs and 24 seconds. In a sport in which records are set by mere seconds he was an astonishing 2 mins and 33 seconds faster than the current world record. His two hour marathon is something other athletes might only dream about achieving. In the post race interview Paula Radcliffe first asked him if he was already thinking about those 25 seconds and how he could make them up. While Kipchoge was quick to acknowledge that it will be possible for humans, he smiled "for now I am happy to have run a 2 hr marathon". It is not a bad analogy for a school or for our human journey. Our Christian faith allows us to believe that anything is possible and I know given the nature of our students and staff that great things lie ahead. In fact, the College would fail if our students had already achieved their best. We are, after all, in the business of preparing them to go on to greater things - but for now we can enjoy, celebrate and acknowledge the many wonderful achievements that, amazingly, are part of a normal year at St Kieran's: "for now we are happy to have run a 2 hour

Our athletic successes continue to inspire and this year our Intermediate team won bronze in the All-Ireland Cross Country. Our Equestrian Team won the White Cup and finished second in Ireland. We won a Maths All-Ireland and our Juniors came second. Our young scientists were in receipt of a highly commended award in the RDS this year; and our school day continues to be enlightened by innovation and progression - our drama group is going from strength to strength; our Choirs have made a CD; our Jazz band gets stronger and our Traditional band is emerging as a wonderful force. Academic, sporting and personal successes are the fabric of a year in St Kieran's College.

This year saw the College undertake significant work to develop its network and connections. The establishment of the St Kieran's College Alumni brings back to life the links of past pupils with each other and with the College. In fact, under the guidance of Alan Buckely as Alumni Chairman a major event is planned this summer to welcome all past pupils back to the grounds of the College and we await this wonderful day. The College, in collaboration with Kilkenny GAA, also led a significant corporate event in Dublin earlier this year which saw over forty of Ireland's leading companies attend a Leadership in Sport Lessons for Business afternoon. 

Archbishop Tom White 1931-2017



Recently, on the 7th May, Tom White, formerly of Durrow, a Priest of the Diocese of Ossory, a past pupil of the College, Titular Archbishop of Sabiona and former Papal Nuncio to Rwanda, Ethiopia and New Zealand died. Archbishop Tom was born, one of a family of five, on the 12th of August 1931. After his early education at Cullohill National School, Laois, he progressed here to St Kieran's College, Kilkenny. While here Thomas enjoyed outstanding academic and sporting successes and he was part of the College's senior hurling team who won Leinster Championships in 1949 and 1950; he was also chosen for the Leinster interprovincial schools hurling team in 1950. In fact 10 of the starting 15 of that Leinster team were students of St Kieran's.

Archbishop White continued his association with the College as studied for the priesthood first here and then later in Rome until his ordination for the Diocese on 25th February 1956. Released by his Bishop, Rev. Dr Patrick Collier from a commitment to teach Canon Law at St Kieran's, the newly ordained Thomas spent the next two years at the Pontificia Accademia Ecclesiastica in preparation for a career in the diplomatic service of the Holy See.

In 1960, after graduation Monsignor White was sent as Secretary to what was then the Apostolic Delegation of Eastern Africa, covering territory from Kuwait to the Zambezi, headquartered in Nairobi, Kenya to work alongside Archbishop Guido del Mestri. For the next five years much of his time was taken up with preparing for decolonisation in Kenya, Uganda, Tanzania, Zambia, Malawi and the Seychelles, and the eventual establishment of separate Nunciatures in each of these countries after independence.

In 1965 he was transferred to the Nunciature in Guatemala where the Head of Mission was also Nuncio in El Salvador. It was a time of great political upheaval in Central America and the local Church was often in the forefront of the struggle to obtain fairer treatment for the poor campesinos.

From Central America in 1967 Monsignor White moved to Colombia. Most of his first year there was spent on the arrangements for the visit of Pope Paul VI in August 1968 for the Eucharistic Congress in Bogotá and the Plenary Assembly of the Latin American Bishops in Medellín. In 1970 he was posted to Switzerland as Counsellor of the Nunciature in Berne and also acted as Observer of the Holy See at various United Nations and other International Agencies in Geneva.

In 1974, following two years in administration work at the Secretariat of State, he received his first effective Head of Mission appointment as Chargé d'Affaires in the Apostolic Nunciature for China. His appointment coincided with the Cultural Revolution and as the Nunciature had to leave the mainland following the Communist takeover, he fulfilled his responsibilities towards China and the underground Catholic Church there from Taiwan, Hong Kong and Macau. In 1978 he was ordained as Titular Archbishop of Sabiona and returned to Africa, this time as Apostolic Nuncio in Rwanda.

Archbishop White was transferred again as Nuncio in Ethiopia in 1983. The six years he spent there and the three terrible famines in that space of time changed him for life. As head of the diplomatic corps he was responsible for coordinating the contributions of many countries and charities to counter the effects of famine. The endless struggle to help the starving people eventually took its toll. Thomas suffered a heart attack in 1988. He was then, in 1989, asked to serve in New Zealand. Attached to this was the Apostolic Delegation for Oceania, involving problems of distance and communication in that vast territory embracing practically all the island states of the Pacific Ocean. Shortly after his arrival in Wellington he presented his credentials to Queen Elizabeth II who was there for the Commonwealth Games and wished to exercise her prerogatives as Queen of New Zealand. Over the next six years he was to repeat the same procedure with the King of Tonga and with the Presidents of Nauru, the Marshall Islands, the Federated States of Micronesia, Western Samoa, Vanuatu and Kiribati.

The Archbishop was only the second Irishman in the history of the Church to have served as a Papal Nuncio in a country where he did not already hold an episcopal rank. After his retirement from the papal diplomatic service in 1996, Archbishop White carried out several important missions for the Vatican Secretariat of State, including liaison work with the church of the Syro-Malabar rite in India.

Following his retirement, Archbishop White lived in Blackrock, where he continued to consult on Church matters. Later again renewed his links to the College as he moved here to be close to his family.

On the evening of the 16th August (the first Tuesday after the 15th) the College was delighted to welcome many men who had been ordained from St Kieran's College for the annual priests Reunion. In all nearly 40 men made the journey to the College.

The evening began with concelebrated Mass of Thanksgiving in the College Chapel. The choir from St Canice's Parish added to the atmosphere and was greatly appreciated by all those in attendance.

After the Mass there was an opportunity for the traditional reunion photo for all celebrating a Jubilee and then a reception for all gathered. The heart of the day is in moments like this - when many old friends come together to recall fondly days and years spent in the College together. College President, Fr Dermot Ryan, noted that of all the reunions in the College calendar this is the most important as those ordained from St Kieran's represent all that is really important for the College: faith and service of others. Fr Gabe Troy, of Boston Diocese who is a golden jubilarian, recalled fondly the time his class spent in St Kieran's and he gave thanks for the formation and preparation they, and countless others, received there. In his words he noted that it is always important to remember where you come from and when that place is St Kieran's – what is important is easy to remember!

Kilkenny Archives at St Kieran's College

Kilkenny Archives has been on the St Kieran's College Campus since the academic year of 2009-2010, working away quietly building up its archives. Recently we received three collections of material from the families of Mrs. Kitty Lanigan (1909-91), Margaret Tynan (1931-2007) and Nin Bligh (1916-2014).

The papers of Margaret Tynan, Kilkenny's first Lady Mayor, a post she held on eight different occasions, were the first of these three papers to arrive. During her political life Margaret was involved in many key issues: poverty in the community, Rights for Women, Keep Kilkenny Beautiful, the acquisition of the KDW shop, workshops and of Butler House for the city of Kilkenny, which led to the establishment of The Kilkenny Civic Trust, the founding of the Watergate Theatre with ongoing financial support from the Kilkenny Civic Trust. She founded the Rape Crisis Centre, Business and Professional Women's Group and helped with the establishment of The Alzheimer Centre (Kilkenny).


Then we have the Bligh family papers of Circular Road and earlier of Maudlin St, Kilkenny. Many of Kilkenny's older citizens will remember Adrian Bligh who in 1952 married as her second husband Nin Clohosey, née Duggan, of the Monster House family. Incidentally, the papers also include material relating to her own family as her father Richard Duggan, was a major business figure not only in Kilkenny but much wider afield throughout Ireland via his wholesale business. These include papers relating to the early years of the Fainna Fail party (Kilkenny branch) as Adrian had been a constituency member. Also too we find papers relating to The Kilkenny Archaeological Society, The Kilkenny Horticultural Society (Eileen Bligh, sister of Adrian was for some years Hon Secretary of this society), The Kilkenny Art Gallery Society, the Ossory Players and much more.

Lastly the papers of Katherine M. Lanigan, née Harte, who was born in Kilkenny in December 1909, the third child of James Harte and his wife Mary A. Harte, née Birch. The Harte home was at 39 Parliament St., almost opposite Rothe House. After school at

Loreto Abbey, Rathfarnham, then one of Ireland's leading schools for girls, Kitty spent a year in France perfecting her French. Then it was back to Ireland where she qualified as a dentist and subsequently set up her own practice in Kilkenny's High Street in 1934. In 1937 she married Thomas Lanigan, a Kilkenny solicitor. The young Lanigan couple set up home at the wisteria-clad Windgap Cottage once the residence of John Banin the Kilkenny author

In 1949 Kitty published the first of her many writings in the Old Kilkenny Review the subject being John Banim. Kitty today is perhaps best remembered for her book Kilkenny: its architecture and history (1977) which she co-wrote with Gerald Tyler of the KWD. Amongst the Lanigan Collection are near 2,000 slides and photographs, many of them of the city and its environs, which was used for this magisterial book, which is still in print many editions and decades

With the preservation of their papers and the placing of them with Kilkenny Archives, these women and their doings will now form part of the collective memory of Kilkenny, for that is what archives are in reality.

Ossory Diocesan Forum

Since the first meeting of the Ossory Diocesan Forum was held there on 4th December, 2004, St Kieran's College has been home to the Forum. Many meetings and various gatherings of Forum members have been hosted in the College over the years. St Kieran's continues to facilitate these meetings. The executive body of the Forum, the Ossory Diocesan Pastoral Council, meets here regularly, as do smaller groups and working groups. As Forum Coordinator I work from a designated office in the College.

Originally the Forum was a diocesan body consisting of a lay representative of each of the forty-two parishes, a number of elected priests and religious with the Bishop as President. In 2009, following a review by the members it was decided to keep the same membership but divide it into three groups, one in each of the deaneries. Since then, the Forum consists of three Deanery Pastoral Councils and an executive body, the Ossory Diocesan Pastoral Council, the membership of which is drawn largely from the other groups. From the beginning, the establishment of Parish Pastoral Councils in each parish was a primary goal and these parish groups are an integral part of the Forum network.

This year sees the completion of the third four-year term of office of the Forum bodies. At present these groups are involved in an evaluation process to review the work of the last four years and to articulate a vision for the way forward. When a similar evaluation was done in 2013 the result was a clearly expressed need for a Diocesan Pastoral Plan to give focus and direction to pastoral ministry in the Diocese. The development of such a pastoral plan has been a very solid achievement of the last term. From the time work began to shape the Plan it was strongly felt that there needed to be a strategy in place to ensure that the Plan would immediately begin to be implemented. The appointment, last August, by Bishop Freeman of Ms Gemma Mulligan as Coordinator of the Pastoral Plan was seen as a really positive step in the direction of implementation.

Since her appointment Gemma has visited many of the parishes of the Diocese.

She has had conversations with priests, parish pastoral councils and week-end congregations about the Plan. Concrete initiatives are beginning to emerge from these conversations. One such event was a six-week course organised for a few adjoining parishes to prepare lay people to lead prayer services when a priest is not present.

In the light of the challenging words of the Diocesan Pastoral Plan that "the future shape of the Church in Ossory is in our hands" and very conscious of the decreasing number of priests, people have been keen to pursue other ways that lay people can be involved in the pastoral life of their parishes. Through the Diocesan Pastoral Council and the Adult Faith Development Group, Gemma is actively following up these requests.

When the Forum begins a new term in September, the Diocesan Pastoral Plan invites the members to be creatively and collaboratively involved in the mission of the Diocese and provides a framework and guidelines to facilitate their work.

Diocesan Pastoral Plan

In 2013 the Diocesan Pastoral Council in consultation with the Council of Priests, Deanery Pastoral Councils and other Diocesan bodies, began preparing a Pastoral Plan for the Diocese of Ossory. The Plan was identified as an important way to give focus and direction to the work of all pastoral groups in the diocese. Ossory Diocese has a long and rich tradition of vibrant local groups consisting of clergy, religious and lay people, working in many and varied ministries.

The Pastoral Plan which has 9 strands, Co-Responsibility, Re-imagine Parish Leadership, Pastoral care of priests, Liturgy, Young People, Child Safeguarding, Communication, Outreach and Nourishing faith, aims to bring people together in a spirit of collaboration and co-responsibility and also to support and incorporate all existing work in the

The Pastoral Plan also invites us to explore ways in which we can prepare parishes for the changes that are taking place in our diocese and in our Church. It is important that we continue to build strong vibrant faith communities where we can live out the Joy of the Gospel and the Pastoral Plan through Parish Pastoral

Councils, working with the coordinator, can help achieve this goal.

Before his retirement in 2015 Bishop Freeman appointed me as Coordinator of the Diocesan Pastoral Plan and I began my work on August 15th last year. The office of the coordinator is in St Kieran's College which also holds the offices of Adult Faith Development and The Ossory Diocesan Forum Coordinator, Sr.Helen Maher.

During this past year much of the work that has happened around the Diocesan Pastoral Plan has involved meeting with Priests, Parish Pastoral Councils and the wider parish communities. It has been a valuable and important part of the work, hearing what people have to say about the future of their parish and our diocese. While visiting parishes during these past months it struck me the willingness of lay people in some parishes to take on more responsibility and leadership roles as the light of today's reality begins to take

Other parishes have for some years been working in a spirit of collaboration where teams consisting of clergy, religious and lay people are working together in sharing responsibility in taking care of the spiritual and pastoral needs of the parish.

Recently a group of neighbouring parishes came together to participate in training and preparation for leading prayers in a parish. This was organised through Adult Faith Development who are able to provide important and necessary training and formation for all those who wish to take up leadership roles in parishes. It is hoped that this training and similar will be availed of in other parishes in the diocese over the coming months and years. Parishes that are currently without a Parish Pastoral Council or Parish Pastoral Councils that need renewal are also being offered help and support by Adult Faith Development and a team working with the coordinator of the Pastoral Plan.

As working groups in parishes know only too well, the work can be challenging at times and sometimes the fruits of the work are unknown. In our vision for a pastoral plan we are reminded of what Pope Francis tells us in Evangelii Gaudium, encouraging us not to despair or lose hope, because even in the small things that we do, 'Joy is Present'



In fact, in furtherance of this, and in collaboration with Gemma Mulligan as Pastoral Plan Coordinator, the AFD group worked this year to create a course of preparation for people to act as leaders of lay-led liturgies. This initiative was in response to a request from the priests and people of Thomastown and Rosbercon parishes. Over a series of five nights various topics were explored in a dialogical fashion to help those prepare for this important service. Inputs on the Church, the formation of Sacraments, Liturgy, the Scriptures, and service were offered and a strong group of nearly 40 people took part. It was wonderful to experience the energy in the room each week as those who attended asked questions about their Faith, the Church and their role within it.

As part of the celebration of the Year of Mercy the AFD group lead a pilgrimage to Rome. In early September over 50 people from around the Diocese, and a few American friends, headed off on this pilgrimage. Over a week spent together, this group had the opportunity to explore many of Rome's wonderful historical and spiritual locations. Each day was populated with various stops to help the group, under the guidance of the Spiritual Director, Fr Kieran O'Shea, to reflect on the theme of mercy. A highlight of the week might well have been the Papal audience at which the pilgrims had the opportunity to hear Pope Francis remind them that we are all sinners and therefore there is no need for shame; but that we should step out proudly before the Lord who is waiting to embrace us. It was a wonderful message of hope that resonated so clearly with the week's reflections.

We are now in the second year of Parish Evenings and Retreats at St Kieran's College, again a product of the Faith Development Group. The leadership team of Michelle O'Connor, Peggy Lyons, Aidan Fitzpatrick, Lorraine O'Shea, and Gemma Mulligan ensure that the night's prayer is beautifully reflective. Making use of the Dunne Room and the College Chapel these Retreat Evenings are a wonderful success. The number of parishes who came to the College was up on last year and all those in attendance were effusive in praise. It is wonderful to see the College Chapel lit up at night in stilled prayer and reflection and it is great that





the College can make so many people welcome throughout the year. These Retreats are another way of the AFD team helping people to deepen their relationship with God.

Notable again this year was the now annual Diocesan U8 Hurling and Camogie Blitz which took place in St Kieran's. This year saw over 45 teams take part and over 500 families in the grounds of the College. In collaboration, Gemma Mulligan and the committee tasked with guiding Ossory's preparation for the upcoming World Meeting of Families and the AFD group helped prepare a wonderful day's activities for all the families. The highlight of the day was the launch of the diocesan preparation for the WMOF2018 which took place on the steps of the College. All who attended left with a "goodie bag" of diocesan prayers, magazines, and holy water that was blessed on the day by Mgr Michael Ryan who lead the prayer at the launch event. It is hoped that these prayers, and especially the one specific to the World Meeting of Families, will find a place of prominence in the homes of our Diocese for the months ahead.

The Ossory Times magazine is now in its fifth year of publication. It continues to be a great success. Each edition sees nearly 3000 copies distributed throughout the Diocese. Costing just €2, it is accessible to all in the Diocese and, in fact, many parishes have taken to simply covering the cost of their editions and making them freely available to people in their community. The Times is now a wonderful, and established, tool of sharing resources and news throughout the Diocese.

The Faith Development Group continues its usual offerings each year such as the Advent and Lenten daily texts which consistently go out to well over 1,000 people each time. the Advent and Lenten scripture "Thought for the Day" booklets, Sunday Scripture Reflection sheets, Prayer Cards and lectures etc. This year however, in a development of these offerings, the group also offered in Advent a simple thought for the day video through Twitter. A new video each day of about 20 seconds invited people to reflect on a simple thought or line about their faith. The videos which were produced here in St Kieran's featured many of the students of the school and were often recorded on the glass hall or on the fields outside.

The Faith Development Group is always exploring new ways to help people deepen their Faith, so if you have any ideas or suggestions please let us know. We always welcome them...



Originally, the programmes were aimed at mature students but since 2013 the focus has shifted to the First Arts programme, open to both mature students and school leavers alike. For the past four years, full-time students have been completing the first year of their Bachelor of Arts Degree (MH901) in Kilkenny before progressing to the main campus in Maynooth to complete their studies. Students have a range of options open to them allowing them to specialise in their chosen field.

The unique learning environment and ambient setting allows students a gentle transition to full-time university life. Smaller class sizes and in particular, the ease at which they can interact with lecturing staff provides students with great advantages.

In September 2016 the fourth group of First Arts students, 68 in total, began their studies at Kilkenny Campus hailing from all over Ireland even as far afield as Donegal. Students were given the opportunity to sample a variety of subjects including English, History, Anthropology, Economics, Sociology, Law, Philosophy and Theology before making their final subject choices.

The introduction of Law to the curriculum in September 2016 garnered lots of interest and in September 2017, Geography will be on offer to students on Kilkenny Campus.

Local students and those commuting experienced significant financial savings. Those wishing to stay in the vibrant city of Kilkenny have the option to lodge with local families or take a place in the on campus student accommodation provided by St Kieran's College.

Feedback from students about their experience on campus has been very positive with them commenting that there are "significant advantages, such as smaller class sizes and more opportunities to engage with lecturers and tutors" and the relationships they form with peers "will make settling into Maynooth easier in second year".

Students who chose to study law saw the benefit of visits to the Court House in Kilkenny for Mock Trials in semester one and subsequently a Moot Court in semester 2. The group also visited the Courts in Dublin and met with senior counsel, fantastic exposure for



any student interested in pursuing law as

Kilkenny Campus actively encourages students in their extra-curricular activities be it becoming part of the Kilkenny Campus Society, exploring social justice or standing up for human rights. This year was one of the campus society's most successful and saw them running bake sales for their chosen charity, Pieta House along with a number of other fun events.

Students also garnered press coverage for their involvement in social justice week in October playing a football match against former Kilkenny Campus students to highlight the plight of Syrians trapped in Aleppo. Their flashmob to mark Human Rights Day in December also featured in local press. Supported by students from Kilkenny Secondary Schools including St Kieran's they braved the cold and rain to make a stand against human rights abuses.

As I begin to write this passage on a calm, sombre night in the middle of April, I find that my mind drifts to the very near and fast approaching future when I will no longer be a current pupil of St Kieran's College. Many of us are now at a stage where we feel we are ready to move on to different heights of education, as well as those who aspire to take alternatives, but by no means lesser routes to their own distinctly unique and individual ambitions. Of course, this is in no way intended as a slight towards the school, but merely something that comes with age. However, I myself imagine that walking out the venerable and seasoned gates of this prestigious school for hopefully the last time come August, I will look back, both in reminiscence and in a literal sense, with profound fondness and immense gratitude at the institution where I spent my much-valued school years. The very essence of this passage is to provide insight, a glimpse through the keyhole of my own personal experience, and that of my colleagues, as a student in this college, of which I am honoured to share with whomever is curious enough to read. Although I will admit that brevity in writing has never been my strongest suit, I will do my best to keep this short and sweet.

Nevertheless, the first time I entered through the aforementioned gates of St Kieran's College, as a buoyant and doeeyed thirteen year old with a haircut that, in retrospect, probably warranted immediate expulsion, I, like many of my contemporaries did not quite know what to think. It has often been suggested to me as to whether a hurley is an extension of our black and grev uniform. and to those who seek to uncover the seeming truth; they may look no further than the corner of a first year classroom. Most likely, what they will find there is a

bin, containing the hurls of each student in said classroom, each inscribed with initials and the eternal S.K.C that implies to whom it may concern that the owner of said hurl is a pupil of the college. This is the constant, year-by-year nature of first year. In this manner, I am not akin to so many of my peers. I am not a hurler, but even I, who despite countless tries cannot successfully hit a sliotar correctly, carried a hurl with me wherever I went. Naturally, the initial months of our maiden year were quite frantic, as we gradually began to accustom ourselves to our timetable, our teachers, our lockers and arguably most importantly, each other. I still remember how we travelled from classroom to classroom in tight, compacted formations of five or six, rarely breaking formation, as if we were surrounded by wolves who sought to isolate us, and one by one, systematically pick us off. Of course, I mean no offence to the Sixth Year graduates of 2011, for I am all too acutely aware of the dishevelled and shaggy look that the Leaving Cert may bring. I'm sure they never meant any harm. Furthermore, first year ended almost as quickly as it had begun.

The origins of second year are entirely more commonplace than those of the previous year. And it brings with it an aura of confidence and comfort, in contrast to the initial outlandishness of first year. Nevertheless, the return to school always presents new adaptations, whether it be a timetable or a new social area. I specifically recall that I was burdened with the proverbial "bottom locker", which if anything, it means that I endured several bumps and knocks squatting down to access my books throughout the year. I know, I know, the horror. You may think I'm being sarcastic or dramatic, or indeed both, but I ask you to question any secondary school in Ireland about the subject of the "bottom locker", and trust me; you will be met with a grimace. Anyway, enough about lockers. Throughout my time here, it has and I contend to say, always will be the small things that contribute most significantly to being a student of St Kieran's College. I could fill these pages and paragraphs with the titanic and inspiring victories of the senior hurling team with ease, as well as a wide and vast host of other achievements garnered through the talent and dedication of our students. While these achievements are magnificent and uniquely stimulating in their own right, in my judgement, they do not and cannot portray the unifying sentimentality of each individual student in the precise manner that the minute, constant and shared aspects of the school can. I speak of the sultry summer heat of the glass hall, the vibrancy of the ten-to-eleven break, the patterned idioms of Mr Lynch or the endless, charming ramblings of Mr Kavanagh, the annual excitement that epitomises St Kieran's day and the invigorating and warmongering calls of "TAKE THE STRAIN" and subsequent "HEAVE" of Mr O' Keefe, during the Tug o' War on Sports day. These seemingly inconsequential things are instilled with symbolic sentiment for me, as they are regular, homely and comfortable. I surmise that it will be these sentiments that stay with me as a graduate of this great school, as well as it might be different but nonetheless important memories to another.

Anyway, now that I've demonstrated my talent for long-windedness, (the quotation 'more matter, with less art' comes to mind) I ponder recounts memories of third year. Third year, as with every year, is important for several

reasons; firstly, it is an exam year, the principal state exam year for secondary schools students. In retrospect, although it seemed it then, I cannot compare the Leaving Cert and the Junior Cert on the basis of weight or significance. It's selfevident that they are incomparable in that respect. However, this does not diminish the importance of the Junior Cert. In preparation, students typically develop a work ethic and a hunger to do well, a quality that every academic should strive to maintain and develop throughout their schooling years. Like all exams, a piece of worldly wisdom that I wish to offer is in short; do not think of them as tests, but challenges to consolidate academic potential. As with such exam years, time flies. Time flies when you're having fun, studying, apparently. As utterly depressing as that concept sounds, third year need not be pigeon-holed as simply an exam year, for that assessment is ultimately not true. One of my favourite memories from third year is the breaks between exams in June. Naturally, as it was exam season, perspiration was heavy as the sun baked the stone of the college, as well as the many hurling pitches on campus. Often, we had two hours between exams, and there is only so much that can be revised at that stage. So we took to the fields to play soccer and sunbathe, where we could. These hours provided much relief from the frantic nature of exam season and I would even surmise that this time devoted to relaxation, the proverbial 'calm before the storm' is equally as beneficiary to any last minute study that any of us could have hoped to undertake. I would encourage any younger students who have an interest in what I have to write, as someone who has delved deep into the anxiety and will to fulfil potential; while exams are important, your mental wellbeing is far more essential.

Transition year, or the colloquial 'TY', is a thoroughly unique and distinctive year. If undertaken in the manner in which it demands, every student has the capacity to find it highly rewarding. Emphasis is not placed on academia, but on application in other areas, with the end goal of developing as a person, and maturing before entrance to the Leaving Cert. It requires you to break free from what feels homely, comfortable and safe, to take up a new hobby, be it a musical instrument, a new sport, volunteering, more or less anything that incites you to develop and gain experience in any particular field. As I understand it,

this is the foundation for the Gaisce programme, which I encourage all incoming TY's to take part in. In addition, the Enrichment initiative provides the students with an opportunity to lend a hand in the local community. One of my most prevalent and fondest memories of Transition year is that of a certain walk up Slievenamon in Tipperary, the only noteworthy attraction in Tipperary. Although I'm aware that this walk is undertaken more or less every year by that year's TY students, that, subtle fact, does not diminish its pervading charm. Nevertheless, as we approached the summit, on what started off as a warm and sunny day, we were gradually struck by the rising chill of the wind. Naturally, with all such occasions, it does not take long for competition and pride to seep into the minds of adolescent boys, and so as we neared the summit, the most competitive amongst us attempted to subtly pass out one another. What can we say, we're winners, and winners always want to win. Anyhow, I distinctly recall that once the lads had reached the summit, several t-shirts came off, in spite of the high altitude and teeth-clenching wind, and for seemingly no reason at all. Moving on.

Fifth year is undoubtedly a shock initially. Despite all that Transition year has to offer, it does not demand the maintenance of vigorous, study plans or schedules in any way, shape or form. In these departments, it is lax. However, as long as you are aware of the task at hand, ergo the leaving cert, I contend to say that you will be fine. Nevertheless, it is tough at first. In my fifth year, I was chosen as a Cairdeas, to help the new first years find their feet and adjust to their new surroundings. It is only then when I was made aware of the rapid passing of time, for although it was four years since we were first years, it had not felt it. I enjoyed my experience as a Cairdeas. To some, who wish to have as little distraction as possible from their studies, it may be seen as a hindrance. However, I took the position that as long as it didn't continuously take away from my productivity as a student, I was happy to help. For our fifth year retreat, we were given a talk by a trainee psychologist, Robert Luas, who essentially spoke about his life experiences and what incited him to choose his profession. This retreat resonated with me in particular, for it has long been an ambition of mine to become a psychologist in the not-sodistant future. Regardless of my own personal intrigue, I believe I can say that my fellow students were also interested to hear what he had to say, which was only accentuated by the fact that he was uncannily similar in appearance to a Premier League football player. Nevertheless, certainly in my opinion, the talk was very interactive, inclusive and appealing to many of us.

Finally, the topic of this piece no longer relies on reminiscence, given that I essentially live and breathe Sixth Year every day, however depressing that sounds. As I write this, on what is by my estimations, the first day of exam season, given the outlandish heat and perspired foreheads, I am inclined to write my extended thoughts on St Kieran's college. What has struck me of late, as I routinely glance up at the school TV's to be greeted by a photo of a student, or students, having performed superbly in a recent event, is the deeply-embedded cult of success that surrounds this school. It is no short of commonplace in this school to bring success to the table. Not only in hurling, for those achievements have always garnered praise, and deservedly so, but in almost every competition that the school takes part in. Quite clearly, this school either instils or nurtures talent in a way that is uncommon and unfounded. As leaving cert students, we all have something to contribute, as we round the corner on the last straight of our secondary education, be it the fulfilment of our own academic potential, a wise piece of advice to a younger student, or a sporting victory, it is self-evident to me that success is tradition in St Kieran's college. For the surreal reality is that in just a month and a half, we will no longer be students of this school. I for one, have profound hope and belief that each and every one of my contemporaries has found, or will find their fateful paths in life. The ending of our tenure here is a paradox. It is a beginning as much as it is an end. We strive to pastures new, leaving behind the permanence of school life. However, what will always remain a constant is the bond, the brotherhood, and the fraternity that we developed within these silent-stoned, hallowed walls. So as we approach our end, wherever you may go from here, my friends, in the words of Dylan Thomas; 'Do not go gentle into that good light, rage, rage, against the dying of the light'.

RETREATS

Every year the students of St Kieran's College have a day set aside for retreat. Retreats can also be spiritual experiences with some time set aside for some prayer or meditation.

We look forward to the next successful year of debating with some new members joining the team.












PIE COMPETITION

On the 27th of September, my fellow second year students and I went on our second year History retreat to the Rock of Cashel, Cahir Castle and Swiss Cottage in County Tipperary.

We started off our day by visiting the Rock of Cashel. Our tour guide started of the tour by telling us about the cross outside the castle. She told us that it was made out of Limestone and that many years ago before the limestone was worn away by the rain, that there also used to be a carving of Christ on this to symbolise it was a Catholic Church. Our tour guide then brought us inside the castle. When we went inside our tour guide informed us the castle was built in a style of architecture called Gothic architecture. This was a castle with pointed arches over windows and doors. Also within a Gothic church is a nave which is where a church has thin columns and a narrow isle. Our year then noticed there were little holes in the walls so we asked what they were there for. Our tour guide then told us they were for protection and that the castles soldiers fired arrow through them from inside of the castle. We were then brought outside the castle to look at the graves. Our tour guide told us that back in the 1930's, a reform was held in the town of Cashel for the people to decide whether they want to be buried up beside the castle or not.

After finishing our tour of the Rock of Cashel, we proceeded to get back on our buses and head off to Cahir Castle. This was our second tour of the day. When we arrived at the castle we were immediately greeted by our tour guide. She told us that the Butter family, who owned the Castle Park in Kilkenny, also owned Cahir Castle. This time our tour guide told us about some of the traps and features the castle had. The one I and most of my year found especially interesting though was the portcullis which were two gates that would be lowered over the attacks stepped inside of them. After the defenders had their attackers trapped, they would then proceed to throw heavy stones and boiling hot oil down on them. One thing interesting about this portcullis was the fact the walls were slanted, so when the defenders had their attackers trapped, they would be able to push down very heavy bolders on them. After this we were brought into the main room in the castle. This was the room where all meetings were placed and where all the meals would be

After we finished up in Cahir castle, we then proceeded to go on a forty five minute walk to the Swiss Cottage. When we got there all we could see was a beautifully decorated cottage which would have been designed many years ago. Our tour guide then proceeded to walk us in around the cottage. He told us that this would not have been a place for living, but for leisure. He told is it was the kind of place you would bring your friends for tea.

This was my experience of my second year history tour and its one I will be in no hurry to ever forget it.





Agricultural Science Trip 2016

The Fifth Year Agricultural Science class accompanied by Mr Darmody and Mr Ryan went on their annual farm visit to Kildalton Agricultural College in Piltown on March 3rd. Kildalton College is the largest agricultural college in the country. It is a leading provider of training in Equine Studies, Machinery, Agriculture and Horticulture. The farm visit is part of the fulfilment of the practical component of Agricultural Science, which makes up 25% of the overall marks.

On our visit, we got information on the enterprises in the College. Kildalton College has a one hundred cow spring calving herd. The herd is composed of Jersey and Norwegian Red cross Holstein Friesian cows. This breed of cow has been introduced into the farm to make use of hybrid vigour. Hybrid vigour is where the performance of the offspring outperforms the average performance of the parents. The Holstein Friesian has high milk yields, poor milk solids and reduced fertility, whereas the Jersey and Norweigian Red have the opposite. However, the Jersey offspring have very bad conformation



and therefore have limited beef value. The cows were producing 18 litres at 4.74% butterfat and 3.2% protein on the day of our visit. The low protein content of the milk is due to the cows being housed and fed silage due to the inclement weather in early March.

The suckler herd is made up of sixty continental cross suckler cows plus replacements. All progeny are reared to beef. The aim is to maximise liveweight gain off grass and minimise winter feed costs. We received a talk on grass quality. It was emphasised that grass must be grazed at the three leaf stage of growth because beyond this the older leaves die off resulting in overall lower productivity from the

grass sward. It was also highlighted to us that grass should be cut for silage before the seed head emerges (usually May 20th onwards). This is because the sugars and starches in the plant are converted into fibre (i.e. stem) to support the seed head.

The sheep flock is comprised of two hundred ewes. They are bred for early lamb and for mid-season production. In the sheep shed, we were shown how to stomach tube a lamb and how to tail dock.

Crops at Kildalton are grown for commercial purposes, skills training and variety trials. Tillage crops normally include winter wheat, spring wheat, spring barley, winter oats, oilseed rape, maize and potatoes. Bio-energy crops such as willow and miscanthus are also grown.

Overall, the farm visit was very worthwhile as we got to see theory being put into practice. We wrote up a report on our farm visit. This report along with our other projects on crops and animals will be examined by our practical examiner next May.

CSPE

3A2 CHRISTMAS SHOEBOX APPEAL

In October and November class 3A2 organised a fundraiser for the TEAM HOPE Christmas Shoebox Appeal. TEAM HOPE is an Irish interdenominational Christian development aid charity, working with children, their families and communities in Eastern Europe, former Soviet Union and Africa.

Their Annual Christmas Shoebox Appeal has sent millions of children gift boxes at Christmas and for the majority of children this is the only gift they will get all year round. TEAM HOPE helps children all year round (many families surviving on less than €1 a day) through a variety of community development projects. Class 3A2 did this fundraiser for their CSPE Junior Cert Action Project. These students worked hard collecting items and money from students in the school. In addition, they got sponsorship from shops and businesses and also organised a very successful soccer tournament for first year students to raise money for the shoeboxes. In total they collected enough money to send a remarkable 87 shoeboxes full of gifts to children in orphanages and in poor communities. Well done to all of 3A2 for this exciting and worthwhile project. Thanks so much to everyone who supported it.

TRIP TO MIDLANDS PRISON

My class visited Midlands Prison on 3rd October 2016. It was certainly not what I expected. Rather than being old, grey and dull, Midlands Prison is a modern building with a blue roof. It is surprisingly bright inside with the blue colour again on the doors and on the walls. It did not seem that bad to me. Firstly, there were no prison bars on the cells instead I saw blue doors. However, everyone seemed to have a room of their own. They had their own space containing a bed with a blue mattress, shelves, a desk and even their own T.V! I learned also that the prisoners have three meals each day. I was surprised as my mother always told me they only get bread and water! As well as television, the prisoners have access to books and a well equipped gym. There









are also extra incentives for work and good behaviour where prisoners can get €1 extra per day. €7 per week is not bad! However I learned that every day is the same and prisoners have little choice each day. This is loss of freedom. They are away from family and friends and this must be very lonely. This is the price they pay for their crimes. My conclusion that is it is still better to keep to the straight and narrow and avoid going to prison.

IRISH AID CENTRE



ACCOUNT OF THE MAYOR'S VISIT





The stage was now set for the All Ireland final against Our Lady's Templemore in Thurles on Saturday March 25th. Templemore were very impressive all year and had cantered through the Harty Cup campaign. We knew we faced a huge task but the players relished the challenge and prepared accordingly. Final day was a beautiful sunny day and everyone was in good form. The first half was fiercely contested but a back injury to our centreback Martin Keoghan put us under pressure. But the players responded superbly. Just on halftime we were four points down when Ciarán Brennan, the youngest man on the field, scored an outrageous
