Message from the Principal

In the last number of years this school has seen many changes. Successive College Records will have charted developments in the curriculum we offer, the facilities, the grounds, the establishment of an appropriate structure for the development of IT in the school and the embracing of progressive teaching methodologies and practices. The current year has seen the refurbishment of Room 10 in the Glasshall and its transformation into a fit-for-purpose media and conference room to accommodate class and staff groups, our Parents' Association and outside speakers, as an initiative that has proven to be very successful. Heritage collections at St Kieran's College Campus

An eighteenth century portrait study of Ossory bishop and additional historic papers added to the heritage collections at St Kieran's College Campus.

As a result of a visit to Rome by the Ossory clergyman and diocesan archivist/historian, the Rev. Dr Fergus Farrell, a copy of the portrait of Bishop Thomas de Burgo, has made its way to the College, to hang amongst the episcopal collection of portraits, in the dining room. The original remains in Rome at the Italian headquarters of the Dominican Order. Over the centuries the order has provided Ossory with five bishops.

Bishop de Burgo, otherwise the Rev. Thomas Burke, a Dominican priest was elected bishop of Ossory in 1759, an office he held until his death in 1776. This portrait now joins those of Bishops David Rothe (1618-50), John Thomas Troy (1777-86), John Dunne (1787-89), William Kinsella (1829-45), Edward Walshe (1846-72), Patrick Francis Moran (1872-84), Abraham Brownrigg (1884-1928), Patrick Collier (1928-63), Peter Birch (1963-81), Laurence Forristal (1981-2007) and the current occupant, Dr Seamus Freeman (2007). With only two exceptions, Bishops James Lanigan (1789-1812) and Kieran Marum (1815-27), the College now has a full representation of Ossory prelates since 1759, a record which can hardly be equalled by any other Roman Catholic Irish diocese.

In 2011, a photographic copy of Bishop David Rothe's fine portrait of c. 1640 joined the collection through the courtesy of a Rothe descendant now living in Co. Louth. The College has amongst it sacred plate Bishop Rothe's silver rosary beads and his silver-gilt monstrance, as well as a set of vestments. These were gifted to the College c. 1880 by Mrs Bryan of Jenkinstown Park.

On the archival front the historic collections in the care of Kilkenny Archives, continues to grow. Last October, the family papers of the acclaimed Kilkenny writer, Hubert Butler (1900-91) were donated by the Goodwillie and Lenox-Conyngham families (of Lavistown and Anaverna, Co. Louth). This particular collection will in the years ahead attract many researchers to Kilkenny especially those with an interest in Hubert Butler and the Ireland of his years. Glanbia PLC too have added to their deposited papers at Kilkenny Archives, with more to come.

Kilkenny Research & Innovation Centre

The Kilkenny Research & Innovation Centre was opened in May 2012 by An Taoiseach, Mr Enda Kenny, TD, in the refurbished Burrells I Hall building. It is a partnership between St Kieran's College, Kilkenny Local Authorities, and the Institutes of Technology in Waterford and Carlow. Since then, activity at the centre has been growing rapidly.

The Telecommunications Software and Systems Group from WIT now has 15 researchers working on a range of EU-funded applied research initiatives, along with several commercialisation projects. This group is currently recruiting for several software engineering positions to meet the growing demand for its services. Other WIT research groups based at the Centre includes three staff from RIKON, which provides business development services to SMEs.

A team from Carlow Institute of Technology are running a programme for local SME's called "INSPIRE". The programme consists of mentoring and seminars aimed at inspiring creativity and helping SMEs to develop ideas for new products and services. Additional supports such as hot-desks and oneto-one mentoring can also be accessed during the programme.

WIT and ITC are jointly delivering the "New Frontiers" programme for entrepreneurs in the South East and have been holding workshops at the Centre over the past six months. Two start-up companies have joined the Centre and we look forward to supporting many more new businesses in the coming year.

For the past number of years they have been working to assist people in their journey of faith. Its members Olivia Maher, Kieran O'Shea, Michael Hogan, Eadaoin Brennan, Declan Murphy, Derek Dooley and Dermot Ryan, along with its secretary Martina Lawlor, work together to try and offer to parishes, groups and individuals resources and aids to help people deepen their understanding of God.

Since its foundation the AFD group has hosted some major workshops and weekends on topical issues such as the weekend on Catholic Involvement in Education and one on the contribution of Cardinal Newman at the time of his beatification. This year has proven to be no different. Last October they hosted a conference to mark the fiftieth anniversary of the opening of the Second Vatican Council and were fortunate enough to secure American Theologian Richard Gaillardetz to be the keynote speaker at this event and just recently a festival to mark the year of Faith in the Diocese: Faith Fest 2013: Celebrating Faith in Ossory, about which you can read more in this section. But it is the everyday task of this group that is the mainstay of its work. Offering resources to parishes and groups to mark different periods of the Church's year and days or nights of training for parish and diocesan groups. Most noticeably over this past year initiatives such as the text service for Advent and Lent saw nearly 2500 people receiving daily messages on their phones with a line of scripture, a thought for the day or a suggested task to help them journey together during those seasons. Moreover the group has continued to produce the very

popular CDs and booklets which guide people in reflecting on and praying the scriptures.

Another aspect of the work of the AFD group is helping train people to serve in different ministries and activities in the diocese and in their parishes, and during this past year they have offered training and resources for Ministers of the Word, Ministers of the Eucharist, School Boards of Management, Baptismal Teams and Parish Pastoral Councils.

The work of knowing God is never done and hopefully as a committee we

FAITH FEST 2013

St Kieran's College was awash with colour and activities on the weekend of the 10th-12th May as the Ossory Adult Faith Development group, assisted by the students and staff of St Kierans, hosted its Faith Fest 2013: Celebrating Faith in Ossory in the grounds of the College. The weekend began with a concert by Liam Lawton and special guests the Unity Singers on the Friday night in St Mary's Cathedral. The Cathedral provided a wonderful setting for this evening and over five hundred people were there to enjoy the concert. Then from early Saturday morning through to Sunday evening the grounds of St Kieran's College was buzzing with activities.

Many of the Parishes, Religious Congregations and Organisations in Ossory were represented at over seventy display stands located along the glasshall. And while the packed glasshall hummed with people many others took part in some of the nearly forty workshops, talks and lectures that were offered. Speakers such as John Waters, Julie Kavanagh, Dermot McCarthy, Suzanne Mulligan, Mgr Jim Cassin and a host of others offered insights, guidance and entertaining talks to mainly packed lecture rooms all weekend.

The entire weekend was built around families and the on-site catering, activities and games for families, bouncy castles, slides, face painting, clowns for the children all ensured that all who came had an enjoyable day out. The Senior pitch was also full for the weekend as young people were given the opportunity to hurl for the pride of their parishes thanks to a hurling and a camogie blitz for the u8s. Great excitement was ensured by the arrival of many of the county senior players to ref the matches and present the medals. The children were delighted to have the opportunity to show their skills in front of greats such as Tommy Walsh, Jackie Tyrrell, Michael Rice, Lester Ryan, Conor Forgarty, Richie Hogan, and on Sunday Angela Downey was on hand to

watch the camogie unfold and to present medals to all who took part.

In all nearly 5000 people came through the grounds of the College during the weekend for a festival that was, by any standards, a massive success and a wonderful opportunity for people to celebrate together the rich tradition and future of the diocese.

The Ossory Times in over forty pages covers anything that is happening throughout the diocese, from a gathering in Urlingford, the departure of the sisters

from Kilmacow, the novena in St John's to the work in the Cathedral and everything in between.

The Times is available in all the parishes in the diocese and is sold after weekend masses and it has proven to be successful. A print run of three thousand for both the first and second editions sold out. With over forty pages of full cover news and articles the Ossory Times is priced extremely well - it was decided to charge just €2 thereby hoping to make it accessible to all in the diocese. Certificate in Theological Studies

The Certificate in Theological Studies began in September 2011-2012 in St Kieran's College with its first group of 25 students and has continued this year with a further 20 students. This programme was initiated following a recommendation of the Diocesan Forum, which was acted upon by St Kieran's College on behalf of the Diocese of Ossory.

The programme runs for 24 weeks on two evenings each week. The rationale for the programme is to provide for the education and faith formation of those who are actively engaged within their parishes. It also for those who, when provided with the opportunity to deepen their faith, would like to become involved in parish life. Those on the programme have had the opportunity to deepen their faith and their understanding of their faith through participating in modules in Old and New Testament Scripture, Ecclesiastical History, Ecclesiology, Liturgy and Sacramental Theology and Moral Theology.

Students have found that the theological and scriptural formation and education which they have engaged in throughout the programme have been of 'immense value and benefit to them'. In their feedback on their experience of the programme, they have stated that they found the modules to have been 'thoroughly stimulating and enjoyable'. They really enjoyed the many opportunities they received to reflect on and engage in discussion on what they had learned. One student noted that 'the individual modules all connected and fed into each other to give a clearer and deeper understanding of faith'.

Many commented on how the formative nature of the course has helped them in their own lives as they live out their faith in their own families and communities.

Enrolment for next year's programme is now open and application forms are available through your local parish or directly from St Kieran's College, Kilkenny.

The Ossory Diocesan Forum

The Ossory Diocesan Forum, established in 2004, consists of a network of Pastoral Councils at parish, deanery and diocesan levels.

The Pastoral Councils are designed so that the voices of all people of goodwill, priests, religious and lay, are heard and enabled to shape the faith life of the Diocese. The focus of the Forum is to promote the coresponsibility of priests and lay people for the mission of the Church at every level in the Diocese of Ossory.

The Forum Coordinator, Sr Helen Maher, is based at the Forum Office, St Kieran's College.

Kilkenny Campus NUI Maynooth

Since its establishment in 1997, the Kilkenny Campus of NUI Maynooth has been located in a wing of St Kieran's College, and over time has come to occupy considerable space on four floors of this historic building.

A local Steering Committee, representative of a wide range of business, educational and community interests in the region was put in place to ensure local ownership of the project and continues to guide its development up to the present.

The first courses offered through Campus were the the newly developed modular, part-time and inter-disciplinary degree programmes Community Studies and in in These involve nine Local Studies. Departments of NUI Maynooth have continued to be the core programmes at the Campus. Other early offerings included the Diploma in Youth and Community Work, which provided professional training for practitioners in this field, and continuing professional development programmes for teachers and trainers.

The Campus programme has since

been augmented by a number of other Certificates and Diplomas which offer stepping stones to the degrees, and progression thereafter to postgraduate studies.

In the past few years the Campus has run short non accredited courses in various areas such as English Literature and Local History, as well as a teg (Teastas Eorpach na Gaeilge) course in the Irish language with optional examinations.

From 2011 the Campus has offered part time postgraduate programmes in Adult and Community Education and in Arts in Healthcare Settings, and this year will offer an MEd in Adult and Community Education.

FIRST ARTS COMES TO KILKENNY CAMPUS SEPTEMBER 2013

In 2012 the Campus launched the Firsts Arts initiative which offers the opportunity of pursuing the first year of the three year, full time Bachelor of Arts degree in Kilkenny with progression on to NUI Maynooth in years two and three. The offering is through the CAO and for the first time the Campus will welcome students directly from Leaving Certificate as well as mature students.

At the NUI Maynooth Campus there are 26 subjects spread over 8 groups to choose from. At the Kilkenny Campus, students can choose from 10 subjects spread over the 8 groups. Although for logistical reasons, the choice is smaller, the range of subjects reflects some of the most popular on offer on the main Campus. These are: English, Sociology, History, Geography, Anthropology, Nua Ghaeilge, Medieval Irish and Celtic Studies, Philosophy, Theology and Economics.

First Year was flying by and we had some great times along the way like the sports day, Kieran's day and the activities that go with it, the mile run which Simon Rafter won, oh no actually it was Cormac Everard! Some lads made the juvenile panel which is a big deal as a First Year, I wasn't as lucky, but maybe it was one of the best things to happen to me because after that I put the head down and trained harder and was fuelled by the pain of not making the panel. I can't stress it enough to any of the vounger lads reading this that by not making a panel it's not the end of the world. Come back next year and earn your spot because there's no greater honour than wearing the black and white of Kieran's.

Just as quickly the holidays were over and we were no longer the lowest in the pecking order. Second Year probably gives you the most freedom because you don't have exams; there isn't the fuss about being a First Year or Fourth Year. I'd like to think we made the most of this freedom. We witnessed history in Oriel Park in Dundalk as Kieran's claimed our first ever soccer All-Ireland. Six of us represented the school in the cross-country All-Ireland in UUJ, Belfast We lost our south-Leinster football final to Enniscorthy no thanks to my own-goal which was a huge blow and devastating, but we bounced back to win the Leinster Juvenile Hurling Championship in Dr Cullen against Dublin South when Willie Dooley whipped on a loose ball in the dying moments to win the match. In the meantime we were getting a solid education, one moment comes to mind in science with Mr Darmody when we were studying genetics like hair colour etc. this got one pupil curious in particular. There

It was a disappointing year for us Senior hurlers in our final year, ending unfortunately without any silverware. It was a great panel of players that all got along great together and were always pushing each other for places in

a great environment to be a part of. Our mentors did a brilliant job and I extend a huge thanks for their endless work and dedication to the cause. We had a great day's bonding session on Kieran's Day up in Clara where we hurled, worked out in the gym and ran through the countryside. For me the highlight was playing against CBS in the Leinster final. Although we lost it was a proud day for me personally getting to play in a Leinster final for Kieran's against our rivals in Nowlan Park which is a dream fixture. Throughout my Kieran's days it's obvious hurling has been a huge interest to me and fellow students in the year and I can personally say its improved me as a hurler, getting to play with and against the best hurlers in the country and follow the proud tradition of St Kieran's. As for the whole experience itself it's been very good to us, especially for me. Coming into Kieran's I had high hopes and the experience itself surpassed expectations and it's been brilliant from day one and it's the best decision I ever made and am proud out to be a Kieran's man and always will be. I got to know some great lads, got a good education, plenty of hurling, had the craic and will definitely miss the place and I'm sure I'm not the only one who feels the same.

TRIP TO CORK CITY PRISON

On September 24th, class 3A1 along with their teachers Mr Morgan and Ms Moran boarded a bus and headed to Cork City Prison as part of our Junior Cert CSPE action project.

WHen we arrived at the prison we were subject to the normal prison security routine just like one would find in an airport. The prison warden then introduced us to the layout of the prison. He told us that the prison has a capacity of 250 inmates, 6 of which were serving life sentences. They spend 17 hours daily in the environs of the their prison cell. During our visit, there was an eerie silence as we toured around the corridors. We were then shown the prison dress code. All prisoners had to wear the same outfit of a red t-shirt, jeans and white sneakers. Throughout the prison names of people who lost their lives to drugs are written on the wall, this in particular was very sad. The inmates learn many useful skills while in prison. Many of them participate in the ECDL computer course, while more learn subjects such as woodwork and metal work. The inmates are allowed one visit a week, two letters a week and one phone call a day. All prisoners must get one hour of exercise a day in the yard. Recreational activities include pool and board game. Dogs are used to stop altercations between prisoners and to search visitors and cells for drugs.

We received a great insight into the penal system from visiting the various parts of the prison. Well done to all the students for organising the visit and many thanks to Mr Morgan and Ms Moran for accompanying us on the visit.

Student Enterprise Awards

It was only a couple of weeks after the start of Transition Year, when all the TY Business classes were told about the annual Student Enterprise Awards, run and held by the Kilkenny County Enterprise Board. The Student Enterprise Awards provide secondlevel students all across Ireland with the opportunity to set up and run their own business, from the initial stage of brainstorming and coming up with an idea right up to the stage where you get to sell your final product or service to potential customers. Each year, nearly 15,000 students participate, making it one of the biggest second-level competitions out there for students to aet involved in.

Immediately students began to come up with various ideas on possible products to sell. For some it took a matter of days, but in the case of my group, it was only at the start of October when we finalised an idea that we were all happy with and that we all wanted to go along with. The name of our mini-company was 'The Kilkenny Tourist', and our group was, Neil Grogan and Jack Larkin. Our idea was a simple one, but one that wasn't already out there, something important to consider if you want to make your mini-company stand out. It was the creation of a tourist Smartphone application for the Kilkenny area that was to provide tourists with essential travel information regarding Kilkenny.

After much brainstorming, all minicompanies started to carry out their market research – an important stage to find out what exactly your potential customers want. If carried out correctly, the information obtained would have told you exactly what the target market you should aim at was, and at what price your potential product/service should be sold at.

After that came the stage that was to determine the future of your mini-company, and that was the selling stage. Some started selling their products as early as September while in the case of my mini-company it was only January before we could move onto the finance side of things. This stage showed the high level of creativity among the mini-companies created by St Kieran's students. Some of the products sold included bracelets made out of beads, St Kieran's College water bottles, USB wrist bands, personalized Smartphone covers and Christmas log decorations. All of these ideas involved something completely new, were of excellent quality and most importantly, were very popular among potential customers that they each targeted.

It was not long after the Christmas holidays, when we were informed that the school final was approaching. All effort on selling stopped, and instead everyone focused their attention on producing the business report, which was a prerequisite if you had any hope of progressing into the county final. This section is often the part that is most neglected; however it is actually the part that gives the first impressions of your business, an important aspect to consider during the Student Enterprise Awards.

The day of the school final finally arrived and around twenty minicompanies were present. It was a tough competition, and all mini-companies had equal chances of progressing. This stage involved, firstly giving up finalised versions of the business report to either Mr Ryan or Mr Connolly and secondly being interviewed by either one of them. Each interview was around ten minutes long; however, it



was as hard for the students to prepare themselves for this stage as it was for the teachers to pick the best six minicompanies that would represent the school in the county final.

After a number of weeks, the finalists were finally announced. These included 'The Kilkenny Tourist' that two of my friends and I came up with; personalised skins for Smartphones by Seán Lynch, Donagh Mahon and Seán Farrell; USB wrist bands by Alex Lalor, Seán Comerford and John O'Meara; Timber for stoves and fireplaces by Jack and Richard Keoghan; Christmas log decorations by Seán Brennan, Alan Harrison, Pádraig Dunphy and Ronan Tynan and finally dog tags by Declan McCarthy, Terry O'Neill, Tom Cuddihy and Cian Costelloe. All of these ideas were great and deserved to be in the county final.

It was not long after the school final, that the county final grew closer and closer. Up to that point the finalists had the opportunity of selling more of their products and updating key areas of their business report, like the finance section for example.

The 7th of March, which was the day of the county final, finally arrived and was held in the beautiful ballroom of Newpark hotel. There were around 45 mini-companies present on the day, representing 12 schools from all around Kilkenny and each one of them had around two hours to prepare their exhibition stands. Afterwards the judging process began, in which each mini-company was interviewed by three judges. It was hard to know who was and who wasn't a judge at first, and so a pointer in the county final would be to present yourself in the best possible light as possible, as each impression counts, no matter who's asking you about your business as you don't know who's who. The judging process ended shortly after it started, and this was followed by a long period of both anticipation and anxiety for all who had their eyes set on representing Kilkenny in the National final in April. The anxiety heightened right up to the point of the presentation, when all prizes were to be given out. The Kilkenny Tourist achieved the Science/ Technology Award sponsored by IT Carlow while Jack and Richard Keoghan got a special achievement award for all their hard work.

Though it was disappointing

that other mini-companies from St Kieran's didn't win anything, having represented the school was still a very big achievement, and they should be proud no matter what the outcome was. The Student Enterprise Awards taught each one of us what it takes to be an entrepreneur and the skills and dedication that it takes to run a business. The skills learned by all, are invaluable, and will without doubt become useful later in life.

A special word of thanks has to go the Kilkenny County Enterprise Board for hosting such a wonderful competition; Mr Ryan and Mr Connolly for all the hard work that they put in making sure that each mini-company did their best and also Bernie McCoy, a representative from the Kilkenny County Enterprise Board, who regularly visited us to talk about ideas and see what we could do to make them go as far as possible in the competition. I also have to thank greatly my friends and mini-company colleagues Neil Grogan and Jack Larkin for all their input into our mini-company, without whom 'The Kilkenny Tourist' project wouldn't have been a success.

Business Quiz

The regional quiz was the first round, and in our case it was the South-East Mr Connolly's class (Alan Mooney, Liam Wallace, Michael Ryan and myself) and Mr Fitzgerald's class (Patrick Gannon, Conor Purcell, Eamonn Egan and Duirmuid Minnock) had a team. To decide who would go to the quiz, he gave us a section from the previous year's quiz, and the top four results were chosen.

The South-East regionals took place in November 2012 on the campus of WIT. There were over 20 schools from 5 counties at the event and some other Kilkenny schools as well. The questions were mostly business orientated but a good amount of general knowledge questions appeared also. There were 10 rounds with 8 questions in each round. Both teams did very well with Mr Fitzgerald's class just losing out to third in a tiebreaker. Our team came first which meant we could advance to the All-Ireland finals as well as receiving an iTunes voucher each.

The finals came in April 2013. We headed to the LIT campus in Thurles.

They were run by CIMA (Chartered Institute of Management Accountants) in conjunction with BSTAI (Business StudiesTeachers Association of Ireland). The MC for the day was Olympic boxer and former Kieran's student Darren O'Neill. Unfortunately, that didn't give us any advantage! There were 25 schools who were all finalists from the different regional heats. The quiz began and we could see that the questions were more difficult than before. At half-time we were tied for third with seven other teams. It was clear that it was going to be a close one! A representative from CIMA spoke to us about the work of a management accountant and the routes that can be taken to become one. The second half then began. Unfortunately, we finished fourth, just missing out on placing by a point. The Presentation College Cork were the winners on the day.

I enjoyed the whole experience and the hard work of Mr Connolly was greatly appreciated. It was good to represent the school in the competition and especially the finals.

Sixth Year Ecology Day 2012

On Monday 22nd October we had an Ecology Day for 6th Year Biology students in St Kierans College. Our guest on the day was well known ecologist and broadcaster Eanna Ni Lamhna. We spent the morning studying an area of the college grounds where we examined all practical aspects of the Leaving Cert Biology course. Eanna provided us with interesting anecdotes on many of the species found. An interesting and very educational day was had by all.

Fifth Year Agricultural Science

The Fifth Year Agricultural Science class accompanied by Mr Darmody and Ms Boland went on their annual farm visit to Gurteen Agricultural college in Ballingarry outside Roscrea on April 22nd. Gurteen Agricultural College is a provider of training in machinery and agricultural courses. The farm visit is part of the fulfilment of the practical component of Agricultural Science, which makes up 25% of the overall marks.

On our visit, we got information on the enterprises in the college. The dairy herd is composed of one hundred pedigree Holstein Friesian cows. They are a high yielding herd with an average milk supply of 6800 litres per cow at 4.01% butterfat and 3.37% butterfat. There is a high replacement rate with 18 % infertile cows in 2012. This is attributable to the high yielding Holstein Friesians. The high infertility rate could also be due to high levels of blood urea, which can lead to early embryonic death. This occurs when there is a burst in grass growth resulting in high protein levels in grass. Farmers can reduce the chances of this occurring by spreading artificial fertiliser immediately after grazing to allow enough time for the



nitrogen to be used up before the next grazing. Farmers should aim for a urea concentration in the milk of between 25-35 mg/dL (milligrams per Deciliter).

The suckler herd is made up of seventy five continental cross suckler cows plus replacements. Gurteen Agricultural College aim to make use of hybrid vigour. This is where the performance of the offspring surpasses the average performance of the parents. It is achieved by crossbreeding, which involves mixing breeds so that the good characteristics from both parents appear in the offspring. Charolais, Limousin and Simmental crosses are the breeds used on the farm. Replacements are obtained from the dairy enterprise such as limousin x Friesian. All progeny are reared to beef. The aim is to maximise liveweight gain off grass and minimise winter feed costs. This has been difficult in the previous year given the inclement weather last summer and therefore the poor quality forage conserved.

The sheep flock is comprised of 600 Cheviot X Suffolk ewes, with 160

lambing in January and the rest lambing in March – April. There are 6 Texel and 4 Charollais rams on the farm. Sheep are short day breeders and so to get ewes to lamb in January, they are treated with hormones in July. Early lamb production is a high cost system as the ewes and lambs are fed expensive feeds in order that the lambs will be 40kg for slaughter at the end of March. In the sheep shed, we were shown how to stomach tube a lamb and to tail dock. Crops at Gurteen Agricultural College

are grown for commercial purposes, skills training and variety trials. Tillage crops normally include winter wheat, spring wheat, spring barley, winter oats, oilseed rape, maize and potatoes. Bio-energy crops such as willow and miscanthus are also grown. Overall, the farm visit was very worthwhile as we got to see theory being put into practice. We wrote up a report on our farm visit. This report along with our other projects on crops and animals will be examined by our practical examiner next May.



At 4am on Monday October 29th 2012 35 Fourth Year students from St Kieran's College left the school gates and headed for Dublin airport. There was an exciting and nervous atmosphere on the bus considering it was most people's first trip to London.

We arrived in London at 10 o clock and we checked in to our hotel. We then got the tube to the city centre. We spent a lovely afternoon on a walking tour of London visiting many interesting sights such as Big Ben, The Tower of London, Buckingham Palace and Westminster Abbey. Afterwards we went to an outdoor heated swimming pool. Although it was raining and bitterly cold we soon warmed up as everyone plunged into the pool.

On Tuesday morning we got the tube to Thorpe Park, London's most famous theme park. There was a funny incident when Mr Darmody decided to ride a rollercoaster, Mr Heffernan had to calm him down. The students all had a great time in Thorpe Park, testing their nerves on the rollercoasters. After the adrenalin rush of Thorpe Park we went on a scary ghost tour of London. The tour guide brought us to London's known ghost sights and we learned about Jack the Ripper and the many executions in London through the centuries.

On Wednesday morning we visited the London eye which was fantastic. When we reached the top, to Ms Moran's delight we were able to see all of London. We then travelled by tube to the science museum which was very interesting and everyone learned new scientific information. After the museum we went to Westfield shopping centre and got to shop and browse for a few hours. We then went bowling and ice skating to celebrate Halloween. Mr Darmody showed us his ice skating skills by falling over numerous times which was quite funny.

Overall we thought the trip was a brilliant experience and it will be a highlight of transition year and a great memory of our time in the school.

On behalf of all the Fourth Year students on the trip we would like to thank Ms Moran, Ms Ring, Mr Heffernan and Mr Darmody for making it a very enjoyable trip.

For those of you who are not familiar of what Transition Year is like, hopefully the articles will give you a good idea of what the year is about and for the current TYs, remind you of the fun that was had and the many memories of the various activities that we were involved in, that will hopefully last a lifetime.

But above all I would like to thank Mr O'Neill for the great opportunity that he has given me with being able to contribute to the school record and leave my own mark on it. Hope you greatly enjoy the articles.

ART TRIP

On January 17th and 22nd, all of the Transition Years headed to Dublin to visit the National Gallery of Ireland and the National Museum of Ireland to view and look at art and to learn more about the history of art. Accompanied by Mr Kelleher on both trips, we set out in the early morning on both of the days, and by 11 am had arrived in Dublin City; however before arriving, each group got an introductory lesson from Mr Kelleher regarding the history of Irish art and craftwork, mentioning the various developments of Irish art and how it had developed at each stage. Upon arrival, we were divided into two groups, with one going to the National Gallery of Ireland, while the other going to the National Museum of Ireland. We were then rotated once we had finished viewing the various exhibitions at each of the museums. At the National Museum we were shown the developments of Irish craftwork and design from the early Neolithic tools to the ornate Celtic brooches and croziers, and from the fashion of the Middle Ages to that of the Industrial Age. All was fascinating, especially the Ardagh Chalice with its ornate, delicate and colourful patterns, that drew in many of us with its beautiful craftsmanship. After that the groups were rotated, and in my case, it was my group's turn to visit the National Gallery of Ireland, located not far from the National Museum. Upon getting there, we were straight away brought by Mr Kelleher to the room with filled with Renaissance paintings. We were given a few pointers on their unique styles and were then shown paintings by some of the other famous names in European art including Caravaggio, Van Gogh and Picasso. Of much interest was also the exhibition of William Turner's watercolour paintings that takes place only in January of each year. Our last stop in the National Gallery of Ireland was the exhibition hall of leading Irish artists, which proved to be a nice finishing point of our day in Dublin before our departure back to Kilkenny. We learned a lot about art and craftwork from the different ages, both European and Irish during the day and also refreshed our knowledge of Junior Cert History. We had a very enjoyable day and much credit to for the day's success has to go to Mr Kelleher, who provided us with such short yet informative accounts on each aspect of art and craftwork that we got an opportunity to witness first hand during the day.

BOWLING

On the 13th and 15th of November last, all of the Transition Year students had an opportunity to go bowling at KBowl. As soon as the students arrived at KBowl, they were seated and soon organised into lanes of six by their accompanying teachers. The games started shortly afterwards. It was seen from early on that some had previous experience at the game, while with others it was not the case; however it didn't take long for everybody to get the hang of it. As the games went on, so did the amount of strikes being hit, but what was of most interest was peoples' attitude towards the game. What was initially planned to be a break from all the hard work of Transition Year soon became a fierce competition to see who was the beSt However, despite the high level of competitiveness and the rather short sessions on the day, everyone immensely enjoyed the day out. Even the teachers had a minigame of their own, to whom we must give our sincere thanks for organising such a fun and 'educational' day out!

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON ACTIVITIES

The Wednesday afternoon activities now form an integral part of the Transition Year programme at St Kieran's College. The afternoon activities take place during the last two classes of each Wednesday. This year there were five groups and as a result five classes of activities, which included: Green Schools, two PE classes, cookery and swimming lessons at the Watershed. Each group got to try out each of the five activities available for a period of six weeks, after which they were then rotated to the next activity assigned to them. This programme allows students to try out certain things that they wouldn't have had a chance to try out otherwise and has been running several years now in the school. Every Transition Year student immensely enjoys these activities, and we have to thank the teachers and Mr O' Neill, the TY Coordinator for its success.

CAR SAFETY DEMONSTRATION

On Thursday 10th of January, all Transition Years had an opportunity to learn about car safety in a car safety demonstration provided by Michael Gleeson, a professional car safety instructor. Each class group spent two classes at the demonstration during which students learned about the workings of a car and the safety precautions that should be taken when on the road. Michael told us how to properly wear safety-belts, how airbags work. He then described the workings of an engine, the gearbox and the breaking system. Although he had a humorous side, he soon showed his seriousness when he told us about what can happen when a car driven by an unbelted driver hits a solid object at 55mph. The demonstration came to an end at that point and students soon afterwards realised the seriousness of drunk and careless driving and how important it is to follow all safetyprecautions when on the road. The demonstration proved to be of great educational value, which hopefully has made students much more informed on the matter.

ALCOHOLICS ANONYMOUS

One of the earliest activities for this year's Transition Year students was a talk organised by Alcoholics Anonymous that happened on Tuesday 17th September. Two people came in, Stephen and Tracy, both of whom were alcoholics, but who are now trying to rehabilitate. Each of them told us their life story and then showed us a video on the harmful effects of alcohol, especially on adolescents. For the most part, the talk was a not a laughing matter, but instead a very serious one, filled with sad and affecting stories. Even though the talk proved to be somewhat sad and depressing, it was informative and showed each one of us the potential consequences of the abuse of alcohol. A word of thanks has to go to Mr O'Neill for organising this talk, which was enjoyed by all.

CHINESE

This year St Kieran's took a new initiative in extra-curricular activities by providing a small group of Transition Year students with the opportunity











to learn Mandarin Chinese and discover the beauty of the Chinese culture for the year. This is a programme specifically created for Transition Year students by the UCD Confucius Institute of Chinese language and Culture in collaboration with the National Council for Curriculum and Assessment (NCCA). At the start of the year, four students from each of the four classes were chosen to take part in this programme. The students were mainly chosen on the basis of their academic and language-learning abilities and when the selection process of the students finally ended, we were given the opportunity to start our course and meet our teacher, Ms O'Mahony. She herself used to be a professor of international relations in Beijing University and spent over six years working and travelling all around China, from Shanghai to Hong Kong and to even the most rural parts of the Tibetan plateau. But now, she teaches Chinese at UCD. In our first class, we were given an overview of the topics that we would be covering as part of the course, which included a variety of topics on Chinese culture such as Chinese history, food, tea, school life and of course grasping the basics of the Chinese language. Not only did we practice our language skills and learn about Chinese culture, we were also told various stories by our teacher on the massive differences between the Chinese and Western-world lifestyles, which she considered to be rather shocking when experiencing them first-hand and for us rather unusual and surprising.

One of the highlights of the Chinese programme was actually a visit to Ming-Court restaurant on 14th March. Following our double Chinese class, we assembled under the arch and accompanied by our teacher and Mr Quane, we made our way to the restaurant for two o'clock. Having arrived there, students were already ordering traditional dishes like Chow Mein and chicken in Szechuan sauce. However, our visit to a Chinese food restaurant wouldn't have been complete if we didn't try out chopsticks. It proved to be a real challenge for many at the very beginning, but by the end of it all, we could have easily said that we weren't far from being experts!

Overall, everybody involved found the course in the Chinese language and culture to be amazing, it not only taught us about the basics of the language but also showed us how different and yet simple the Chinese way of life is, something that many of us wouldn't have known much about before the course. A big thank you goes to our teacher Ms. Helen O'Mahony for providing us with such an enjoyable and invaluable experience and her great efforts in teaching us the Chinese language. We also thank our principal Mr Curtis who signed up the school to the course.

CINEMA

Like in previous years, the teachers decided to bring the current group of Transition Years down to the cinema at the end of November as a 'treat' for all of our hard work. This happened on two different days, with two classes going at a time. There were many films to choose from; however the one that appealed to me most was the new James Bond film 'Skyfall', while a small group of students decided to see Argo, a film about the rescue of six U.S. diplomats from Tehran, Iran, during the 1979 Iran hostage crisis. In the end, everybody enjoyed the films that they decided to see, and a sincere thanks goes to the teachers involved.

ENRICHMENT PROGRAMME

As part of this year's Transition Year programme, students were given the opportunity to get involved and participate in the Enrichment Programme. This was run and organised by Ms Wemyss and those who wanted to take part in it had to give their names to her at the start of the year. The programme was a voluntary one, where students had to spend one period of classes every Wednesday throughout the year, in a voluntary organisation that was assigned to them. Some groups that students went to as part of the programme included: the Irish Wheelchair Association, the Alzheimer's Association, Oxfam to name but a few. Overall, around half of the Transition Year group got involved in this programme. Apart from it acting as a new experience for many, the students also got encouraged to develop various skills during the time spent at the various organisations such as communication skills, research skills and in some cases even artistic skills. Along with self-development, the students greatly helped the people they were volunteering for. The programme was a fantastic experience for every student involved in it and a special word of thanks goes to the programme's coordinator Ms. Wemyss for providing such an invaluable opportunity to this year's TY group.

EUROPEAN DAY OF LANGUAGE

Each year on the 26th of September European Day of Languages is held which is aimed at promoting bilingualism and the appreciation of other languages. This year, the Transition Years were very active in promoting other languages around the school by means of placing various posters around the school, learning more about foreign languages and even preparing food from other countries' cuisines. LAW DAY

On Thursday 21st and 28th of February, a Law Day was organised for Transition Years, by Kate Hedigan, she is a Kilkenny born solicitor who now works in Limerick city. The day started off with her asking each group what they define law to be and how we have used law in the past hour, week, month and year. After giving us some time to answer the questions Kate discussed the answers that were given and then started off with a general introduction on what law is. She then slowly started to navigate towards the legal system in Ireland. She introduced us to important laws which we should be aware of, and of much interest to us were the internet and privacy laws that are for most part neglected by adolescents. For each of these topics she gave short and concise points which proved both informative and at times even entertaining. However, the highlight of the day were the mock trials that students had to participate in. There were three groups of six students, that each had a different scenario to act out. Each group member was given a different role and after a short period of preparation time, the groups were ready to perform. Even though it was evident who really put in the effort in rehearsing the scenarios and who didn't, it was still very entertaining to watch these mock trials, and for most of it, everyone was laughing and having a great time. It proved to be a really enjoyable day, while also being educational and informative.

WORK EXPERIENCE

Work Experience is an integral part of any Transition Year programme and thousands of students participate in it around the country each year. Like in previous years, this year's students had four weeks of work experiences divided into two, two week blocks, one in mid-October and the other at the end of January and start of February. Even though it is seen as an important part of each Transition Year programme, it is often neglected and many find that the most challenging part of the year is actually obtaining work experience placements. After much hard work in seeking work placements, each student got accommodated across a diverse range of professions and industries, ranging from medical to retail and from financial to artistic. Students had the option of choosing to spend a single week or two weeks at a particular company; however the most popular option was to spend a single week in

a given place. Our experience of work experience had to be recorded in the form of a diary and also an evaluation project. Each student evaluated the time they spent in each place that they chose, and hopefully each one of them gained a great insight into the particular careers that they ever thought of doing. Apart from assisting each student on the career path to take, students also improved on a number of skills during the time they spent on work experience including communication, research and in some cases even presentation skills, where students were required to present certain assignments to their bosses! A word of great thanks goes to the Transition Year Work Experience Co-Ordinator Mr Connolly, who provided us with help and support regarding work experience and also Mr Quane who visited us during our work experience placements.

TRIP TO DUNDRUM SHOPPING CENTRE

Organised by the teachers, this trip served as their kind gesture, for all the hard work that the TYs put in since they started the year. TRANSITION YEAR PHOTOGRAPHY FESTIVAL

On 1st October 2012, 25 students from Transition Year were chosen by the school to represent St Kieran's College at the annual Transition Year Photography Festival, organised by the Kilkenny Photographic Society in collaboration with the Kilkenny Education Centre. 23 of the students were from TYB, while the remaining two were the two school photographers-Michael Cotter and Mark Doyle. This event took place over a period of three days, where each day, four different secondary schools were represented. The group, accompanied by Ms Ahern made their way in the morning of the first day to the Education Centre and found themselves in the company of the Loreto Secondary School, Coláiste Éamann Rís Callan and Coláiste Pobail Osraí. Upon arrival the group got divided up and was sorted out into four separate groups which were all composed of a mixture of students from each school represented on the day. The groups were divided according to the coloured-sticker that you got. The workshops were specifically aimed at raising the student's awareness of all the different aspects to photography and to help students appreciate and improve on their artistic, photographic and visual skills. The presentations were given by experienced photographers and presenters that included: Hugo Reidy, who taught us about the importance of composition and lighting in photography; Fiona Power and Amanda Burke who gave us lessons on the basics of Photoshop; Seamus Costelloe who showed us various slideshows

of his works and told us how much variety a photographer experiences and is exposed to on a daily basis and Ben Power who gave us a couple of hints and tips on portraiture. There were also several guest speakers on the day, including Emer Foley, chairperson of Kilkenny Arts Festival who talked to us about the growing importance of photography and its aesthetic values in the modern world and contemporary art. After the official opening, students continued with their workshops and finally finished up for the day at 3:20.

As part of the festival, each student from every school represented during the three day period, had to submit one photograph for entry to the Transition Year Photography Competition. Each school then selected their three best finalists to represent them in the county final that took place in the St Patrick's Community Centre, Loughboy, on Thursday, 18th April 2013. The photographs selected to represent St Kieran's on the day were taken by Vladyslav Medvensky, Michael Cotter and Mark Doyle respectively. On the day of the county final, St Kieran's did not find itself in the top three places that were available; however Michael Cotter did receive an honourable mention for his beautiful composition that highly impressed the judges.



TENNIS DAY

This year an outing to the Kilkenny Tennis Club was organised for Transition Years by the PE teachers. TYB and TYC went on 8th October while TYA and TYD went the following day on 9th October. Both groups were accompanied by Mr Flood and Mr McCormack.

The groups made their way to the tennis club in the mornings of their respective days and after a short tutorial and introduction to the game and its rules by the teachers, the games began. Due to the number of students on the day no individual matches were held and instead all games played were doubles. There were six groups overall with four teams in each group. The morning games acted as a knockout stage for all teams, with the top three teams in each group advancing to the 'Cup' while the teams in fourth place advanced to the 'Shield'. After the knockout games were played and some snacks were eaten, each team prepared for the tournament games that they were in. Students were allowed to submit their works in one of the following categories: News, Feature, Comment/Analysis, Sport and Photo Journalism.
