"Thoroughly understand what it is to understand, and not only will you understand the broad lines of all there is to be understood but also you will possess a fixed base, an invariant pattern, opening upon all further developments of understanding". In recognising this, the Canadian Theologian, Bernard Lonergan points to what is at the heart of a good education – not the teaching of facts or conclusions but the formation of a person who develops a pattern of learning, a manner of enquiry, and a thirst for knowledge and self-improvement that will never stop.

It is what we do in St Kieran's College. To verify this we need only reflect on the continued breadth of achievements of our students which in this past year saw five of them attain the maximum points in their Leaving Certificate, 10% get 550 points or more, 20% get 500 points or more, 40% get 450 points or more and 51% get 400 points or more. Or the other successes of this past year: A Senior Colleges All-Ireland title - our 22nd; the Junior All-Ireland; Juvenile League Championship; defeated finalists All-Ireland soccer; the Marie Fitzpatrick award at the Kilkenny Music festival; winners of overall school in the All-Ireland Cross Country; and individual successes of 800m Gold; the FEI Pony world Jumping Trophy; representing Ireland in the World Junior Science Championship; three Silver National Swimming Championship Medals and so much more... We strive to create here a pattern of learning, a manner of enquiry, a thirst for knowledge and selfimprovement that will never stop - even after we have left the glass hall.

Message from the President

This year we underwent a Department of Education and Skills Whole-School Evaluation - Management, Leadership and Learning inspection. Over a number department inspectors weeks of evaluated what we do and how effective we are in living out our mission - which claims that "academically, spiritually, physically and emotionally our students are encouraged to strive for all that is possible in the relentless pursuit of perfecting their individual gifts and talent". In a wonderful affirmation of our students, teachers, management and families, they concluded that this "mission is lived out in practice".

Thankfully, St Kieran's College still also remains at the heart of the Diocese by being the home for the Diocesan Forum, the Adult Faith Development Group, the Pastoral Plan Coordinator and the Diocesan Retreat Team. These allow us to serve the Gospel and the people of Ossory - far outside the walls of our campus – on a daily basis. Recently it was an honour for a number of our students to be present for the announcement that Dermot Farrell would become the next Bishop of Ossory. As Bishop he becomes Patron of St Kieran's College and thereby central to the ongoing history of this, the oldest Catholic Secondary School in Ireland. We welcome him and look forward to working with him in the years ahead.

This past year also saw the announcement that Maynooth University would discontinue its presence here in Kilkenny and, therefore, in St Kieran's College. This news was received with sadness – the ending of a long number of years of collaboration. Since 1997 Maynooth University has been on our campus offering Third Level education. It is also, however, with a certain pride that we look back on the great number of students who had an opportunity thanks to that collaboration.

In keeping with the spirit that of advancement and progress, that is St Kieran's, the space will not be unoccupied. I am delighted, then, to welcome Lighthouse Studios to St Kieran's College. This joint venture between Cartoon Saloon and Mercury Filmworks will provide high quality children's and family animated content development and end-to-end production services – from script writing, design, storyboard, animation and compositing to post production services – to a global client base. In the creative space it is a perfect fit for our campus – allowing people with immense talent to express themselves.

Great work continues with our Alumni Group following on from the Reunion last year and another Corporate event in Dublin. These pages document that story and I thank all involved for their ongoing commitment to deepening our network of supports and connections among, and for, our past pupils.

Much work continues with the Department of Education and Skills and recently we have been given the design brief for the works to be carried out. Another step on the journey towards a very significant new build on the campus and a refurbishment of our existing iconic buildings. These works will be carried out so that we can continue to best serve our students, who are the very heart of St Kieran's College, into the years ahead.

In my role here I work closest, on a day to day basis, with the school management. In doing so, I get to see first hand the utterly selfless contribution and tireless commitment of Adrian Finan as Principal and Ken Maher and Liam Smith as Deputy Principals. They are Kieran's to their core. Their love for this place, its history, tradition and its people shapes their vision for the atmosphere of education that they facilitate here. It is impossible to quantify the impact that they have on our community but I know, and I know you will agree, that in their hands we can but continue to flourish and our tradition for success will only ever deepen.

If good education is the formation of a person who develops a pattern of learning, a manner of enquiry and a thirst for knowledge and self improvement that will never stop, then – we do good education at St Kieran's College. It is humbling to make that statement and know it to be true, but I do so thanks to all those who make it possible. I have, therefore, a real sense of gratitude to the students and their Council, the parents and their Association, the School and College staff, my colleagues on the Board of Management, the Trustees, Bishop Dermot our Patron, the Alumni Group and all those who add the air to the atmosphere of the relentless life-long learning and humble success that is St Kieran's College.

We are excited by the possibilities that this and other initiatives present for our students as they journey through our school.

This year saw St Kieran's College revive a great tradition of school musicals with the successful production of High School Musical in collaboration with Loreto Secondary School. The show, involving Transition Year students from both schools was an enormous success. Everybody involved, in whatever capacity, can be justifiably proud of their contribution to what was, without doubt, one of the highlights of the school year.

In any given year the achievements of our pupils are many and varied, with this year being no different. I would like to give special mention to our Senior Hurlers who in March were crowned All-Ireland Champions for a record 22nd time, when following an exhilarating campaign and a nail-biting finale, they overcame a gallant Presentation College, Athenry. There are of course many other notable achievements, all documented in these pages, of which we are also extremely proud, including many at national and international level in activities including equestrian, cross country, athletics, badminton, golf and soccer. To all those involved congratulations and well done.

I would like to thank all of those involved in the production of the Record, Tina Lawlor and Eadaoin Maher especially, for the countless hours and energy they give to providing such a fitting testament to the school year in St Kieran's College. We hope that you will enjoy it.

Ossory Adult Faith Development

St Kieran's College exists to serve the Diocese of Ossory. Not only as the Diocesan Secondary School serving students from many of our parishes, but also in many ways, to serve the parishes themselves. From the College, at the heart of our Diocese, services such as Diocesan Communications, the Diocesan Forum and the Diocesan Pastoral Plan Coordinator are run. Among them, so overtly resonate with the mission of the College - given its mandate to teach - is the Diocesan Faith Development Group. The members of this group, Eadaoin Maher, Olivia Maher, Fr Kieran O'Shea, Michael Hogan, Declan Murphy and Fr Dermot Ryan along with Tina Lawlor, endeavour to help the people of our Diocese to deepen their faith. We hope to do this in a variety ways.

Most recently, the Faith Development Group offered again the Lenten training courses for the Extraordinary Ministers of the Eucharist. In a change from previous years, when it was offered in several locations, this course was held over two weekends here in St Kieran's College. The change was suggested last year as a means to bring more people together so that a real sense of our being together in ministry could be felt by all participants. With inputs from Michael Shortall and Aoife McGrath of St Patrick's College Maynooth and Ken Maher and Kieran O'Shea from our own Diocese, people were offered an opportunity to reflect upon, and prepare for, this valuable ministry in our communities.

Another aspect of our Lenten journey was a series of talks over five nights at which various topics were explored in a dialogical fashion to help people reflect on the call to all, in our communities, to live out their baptismal promises. Following from last year's very successful course in the Southern Deanery on a similar topic, these nights saw inputs on the Church, the formation of Sacraments, Liturgy, the Scriptures, and service itself.

The Faith Development Group are currently preparing for a pilgrimage to the Holy Land for our diocese and such was the demand for places on this that it filled to capacity within two weeks of being advertised. Later this year then over 60 people from around the Diocese will undertake this pilgrimage to the Holy Land - retracing the footsteps of Jesus.

Parish evenings are now a central aspect to the life of the College. For the past three years the Diocesan Retreat team along with the Faith Development Group have welcomed people into the College to pray. The leadership team of Michelle O'Connor, Peggy Lyons, Aidan Fitzpatrick, Lorraine O'Shea, Gemma Mulligan Dermot Ryan and Kieran O'Shea ensure that the night's prayer is beautifully reflective. In fact this year several retreats were also offered by the team in parishes around the Diocese. These parish-based evenings are intended for parents of Confirmation and First Communion children as part of their journey of preparation. Work is also

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underway to take our "College" Retreats to nursing homes around the Diocese - to share with their residents an opportunity for prayer and reflection - and hopefully a social moment, so much a part of the evenings here, too.

The Ossory Times magazine is now in its sixth year of publication and it continues to be a great success. Each edition sees over 3000 copies distributed throughout our Diocese. The *Times* is an invaluable means of our sharing good news of the life of our parishes and communities a means for sharing resources, and an opportunity to educate on the faith. It is designed to be accessible to all in the Diocese and, in fact, many parishes have this year taken to simply covering the cost of their editions and then making them freely available to people.

Just a few weekends ago we held the Diocesan U9 Hurling and Camogie Blitz here in St Kieran's. Reflecting the changes in age divisions across underage hurling this too has moved from u8 to u9 meaning that many who had competed here last year got the chance to play again. Old losses had to be corrected and a great day's competition saw over 60 teams from the clubs of our Diocese bring over 900 boys and girls and their families to the College to compete. The grounds were awash with colour and laughter and all left exhausted and happy. Hurling for the pride of the parish is important business - and many a long career was no doubt started at this event.

The Faith Development Group continues its now staple offerings of Advent and Lenten texts and Twitter daily thought along with the Advent and Lenten scripture "Thought for the Day" booklets, Sunday Scripture Reflection sheets, Prayer Cards and various lectures throughout the year too. Among those talks was a recent evening of reflection on the upcoming Referendum on the 8th Amendment to our Constitution. Bishop Dermot Farrell chaired an evening of discussion and reflection stimulated by inputs from Dr Kirsten Fuller and Rev Dr Michael Shortall. A packed Chapter House at St Mary's Cathedral was brought to life in lively discussion around this important topic.

Diocesan Pastoral Plan Coordinator



For almost two years now I have been working as pastoral plan coordinator in Ossory with my base in St Kierans College. One of the nicest parts of my day is driving through the arch at the entrance to the College. After spending some time navigating the traffic in the city it is like a breath of fresh air to turn into the beautiful lawns and vast buildings that are steeped in history and tradition and yet are so full of life and youth and energy. St Kierans College is the oldest Catholic school in Ireland and the depth of that history and tradition is not lost on me as I walk through the corridors. The walls are full of faces of young men who have walked these same corridors, some long gone, others friends today.

I began working in august 2016 and the steps of the front of the college were filled with young first year boys being photographed, smiling with relief as they completed their first few hours as new students of St Kierans proudly watched by their parents as the next step in their lives began.

Today these same young men are on the steps again not only for their class photos but also for their achievements in hurling, debating, badminton, mathematics, soccer, choir, athletics, and so much more. As I go about my work each day the break for coffee or lunch is known without having to check the time as the hallways and stairways overflow with youth and energy and laughter, it always brings a smile to my face and reminds me that the work we do in our diocese is very much about them. Their future is what we are preparing for. These young men and lately young women (as I write this final preparations for High School Musical are underway) are a reminder to me of how important it is that we plan and prepare for the church of tomorrow. Most of the young men that pass my office have no idea that all across the diocese of people in parishes give of themselves because they care about young people and want the church in Ossory to be a place where these same young people can fulfil their potential and live faith filled lives.

Liturav, communication, faith formation, nourishing faith, outreach and young people are some of the strands of our Diocesan Pastoral Plan and in parishes throughout the diocese people are striving to bring these strands to life. In St Kierans the pastoral plan for Ossory is being lived out through the many liturgical services throughout the year, through the "Aim High" programme which many students take part in each year, through the pilgrimage to Lourdes and by history, tradition and culture that exists in the college.

In our vision for our Diocesan Pastoral Plan we are told that the future shape of the church in Ossory is in all our hands under the guidance of the Holy Spirit... In St Kierans they are paving the way.

The Ossory Diocesan Forum

St Kieran's College has been home to the Ossory Diocesan Forum since its establishment in 2004.

The Forum Office is located near the main entrance and throughout the year the College hosts most of the Forum meetings, be it the regular meetings of the Ossory Diocesan Pastoral Council, which is the executive body of the Forum, the monthly meetings of the Middle Deanery Pastoral Council, occasional special focus gatherings and assemblies and a myriad of small working groups that meet throughout the year to progress the various pastoral initiatives being undertaken by the Forum. By creating a stable "home" for the Forum, St Kieran's College has facilitated its development over the years and contributed very significantly to its work for the Diocese.

The title "Forum" was chosen for this significant diocesan body at its inception. This was a deliberate choice expressing the vision behind this courageous initiative. The goal of the Ossory Diocesan Forum was to create channels of communication throughout the Diocese that would make it possible for all the people of the Diocese, women and men, clergy and religious, to be actively involved, with the Bishop, in shaping the life of the Church in Ossory in the light of contemporary challenges and opportunities. The channels that have evolved are the pastoral councils that have been created at parish, deanery and diocesan levels and together they form the Ossory Diocesan Forum. The network of pastoral councils makes good communication and dialogue a real possibility at every level.

Working as Coordinator of the Forum has been a privilege and a challenge. From the beginning to the present, the most encouraging aspect for me has been the willingness and enthusiasm of so many people to become involved in the work of the Forum. Their commitment and dedication has ensured that many pastoral issues have been addressed over the years, most recently the need to develop a Diocesan Pastoral Plan.

As it begins its fourth term of office I believe that the Forum is well placed to continue, in the words of its Constitution, to build "an effective, collaborative Church in Ossory".

Maynooth University



The 1998 edition of the *College Record* carried the headline "St Kieran's becomes a university campus in historic link with NUI Maynooth" thereby marking the beginning of a collaboration that was to last until this summer. It was hoped, then, that the linking of two of Ireland's longest established educational institutions might bring full-scale third level education facilities to Kilkenny City and while this was never realised, the union of these two Colleges certainly did bring about much good in the intervening years.

In the summer of 1996 discussions began with a view to beginning an outreach centre for Maynooth here on the grounds of the College. The initial offering was a modular part-time degree programme to be called a Bachelor of Arts in Local and Community Studies. With agreement reached by December 1996 an initial Steering Committee was put in place to help guide the growth of this early stages. On Friday 24th October 1997 the then Minister for the Environment, Noel Dempsey TD, officially opened the Maynooth University Centre and paid tribute to the Steering Committee Chairman Pat O'Neill and then County Manager PJ Donnelly who had done so much to realise a vision for this collaboration. As it opened it had 54 students - among whom was Dr James Brennan - a priest of the Diocese of Ossory and a former Professor in the Seminary here at St Kieran's College. Since this early beginning, Maynooth University at St Kieran's College had continued to offer many part-time, mainly adult education, courses to students from the south east.

In recent years a concerted effort to explore the possibility of creating a greater footprint for the University here in Kilkenny had been explored. Led by Billy Murphy Chairman of the Steering Committee, Collette Byrne, Chief Executive Kilkenny Co Co and representatives from Maynooth University and the current Steering Committee, avenues were explored to expand what was on offer to students in this region. In fact, since September 2013

post Leaving Certificate students have had the option of taking the first year of their BA Degree in Kilkenny at the St Kieran's College campus before moving to Maynooth University to continue their degree in their second year. This model of education allowed students on the campus here an introduction to university life with smaller class sizes, a close-knit student community, a student focused learning environment and a gentle transition into full-time university life. However, having successfully run this programme for five years, the decision was taken last May to discontinue the offering at the end of this present academic year and, as a result, for Maynooth to withdraw their presence from Kilkenny.

There is obvious sadness from all those involved in trying to grow a university presence here in Kilkenny and from all those who worked, and studied here at the Kilkenny Campus. There is also, however, a real sense of satisfaction that for twenty one years of third level education that was made possible here thanks to the collaboration of these two fine academic institutions. The result of this collaboration was increased educational opportunities for countless students from the region and beyond.

As this phase draws to a close we thank all those who made it possible - the current and past staff of Maynooth University here in Kilkenny, the many members of the Steering Committee throughout the years, the Presidents and Trustees of St Kieran's College and Maynooth University and of course the students who populated these grounds ensuring that learning and creativity continued to be a part of the Kilkenny and St Kieran's story.

As this concludes, however, we note that green shoots are also still emerging. Minister of State Mary Mitchell O'Connor recently made a recommendation for a proposed 1,000-student campus to be located in Kilkenny City which could tie in with plans for the Technological University of the South East (TUSE) that is currently being jointly pursued by Waterford IT and IT Carlow. A report suggesting this, commissioned by Kilkenny County Council, argues there is an educational, social and economic case for locating a higher education campus to cater for students in Kilkenny - a view long held by all on the steering committee. So the dream of Third Level education in Kilkenny continues - and we note too the very positive news of the presence of Lighthouse Studios here in St Kieran's College opening shortly in the space Maynooth occupied - continuing creation and advancement, so much part of the mission of St Kieran's College.

Lighthouse Studios



This summer Lighthouse Studios will establish themselves here in St Kieran's College as a location for part of their operations. Lighthouse Studios is a Joint Venture Collaboration between between Canada's Mercury Filmworks and Kilkenny's Cartoon Saloon. It is an all-new 2D-focused animation studio that will create high-quality children's and family animated content development and end-to-end production services – from scriptwriting, design, storyboard, animation and compositing to post-production services – to a global client base.

Over its 19-year history, Mercury has helped bring to life many of the most memorable modern animated television and film properties, including Disney's Tangled animated series and the Mickey Mouse shorts. Other multi-awardwinning series include: The Lion Guard, Wander Over Yonder, Star v the Forces of Evil, Jake and the Never Land Pirates, Fish Hooks, Toot & Puddle, Gerald McBoing-Boing, and Atomic Puppet.

Kilkenny-based Cartoon Saloon is now a celebrated animation studio formed by Paul Young, Tomm Moore (a past pupil of St Kieran's College) and Nora Twomey in 1999. In 2010, the Studio's first feature film, "The Secret of Kells", was nominated for an Academy Award and in 2015, they received a second nomination for their film "Song of the Sea", and in recently in 2018 received a third nomination for their film "The Breadwinner". Their creative success is a phenomenal story and their gifted artists and many other specialities will now find a home here in St Kieran's College - we wish them well in these hallowed grounds.

Kilimanjaro 2017



On the 8th of July 2017 I set off on my trip to Tanzania. Climbing Mount Kilimanjaro was something that I wanted to do since I was 11 which added more to the anticipation while driving up to the airport that day. A month beforehand I had picked up my flag from both the Emeralds and from Fr Ryan in St Kieran's. There was a sense of pride by representing Kieran's and my club when packing those flags in. It was the first time either would have reached the top of the highest freestanding mountain in the world which is known as the 'Roof of Africa' and I felt a great sense of pride representing both.

We flew through Addis Ababa in Ethiopia on our way to Kilimanjaro Airport in Tanzania. Having never met any of my other trekking companions before, the 14 hour journey was a great help to get to know the 15 other members on the trip. Walking out of the airport at Kilimanjaro we all were immediately reminded of the enormous task at hand as to our right the towering Kibo (as it is known in Swahili), stood at just under 20,000 feet. The stifling heat seemed not

to affect us as we looked up at the snowcapped mountain.

The next day we began our 10-day trek. It would be seven days to the top and three days to get back down. The first day and a half of trekking was through hot rain forests and clammy conditions. Despite this we got to see much of Tanzania's vegetation and animals such as Howler monkeys and the Gaboon viper. On the second and third day as we broke away from the dense tree line we began to walk in very rocky and baron landscapes and the temperature began to drop. It went from 30 degrees in the tree line to 15 to 20 degrees which was a lot more comfortable but a little more uncomfortable to sleep in at night with howling winds blowing at the tents as we slept!

As we trekked higher and higher the vegetation began to disappear, and the air began to get thinner, which was noticed with headaches and altitude sickness. By the 6th day of our ascent the landscape was completely baron and consisted of rocks, shingles and dust with many people feeling very sick and lightheaded constantly, including myself. The sixth day's route consisted of the climb of the Branca wall was a more technical climb which was a nice break from the 8-10 hour a day monotonous trekking we had been doing for the previous five days.

On summit night we began our 8-hour trek to the top at midnight through snow and ice. Altitude sickness and exhaustion were now setting in but the desire to see that sunrise at the top of the mountain and the two flags in the bag kept the appetite whet to keep going. When we reached the top the sense of achievement was incredible. Despite the sickness, the group had stayed united and helped each other along the way to get the summit at 19,341 feet. Pulling out those flags on the top and getting the group photo was something that I will never forget. We had all worked together to get each other up there. The feeling of pride representing places that developed me as I grew up is something that I will always remember and a special thank you to Fr Ryan for his support and the opportunity to represent the school again.

Leaving Certs

Congratulations to all of our students on receiving excellent results in their Leaving Certificate examinations in August. Once again, the results were fantastic with 6% getting 600 points or more (5 students the maximum 625 points), 10% obtained 550 points or more, 20% earned 500 points or more, 40% received 450 points or more and 51% got 400 points or more.

It was a remarkable achievement to have five students obtain the maximum 625 points. A reception was held in the College reception rooms for Eamonn Fennelly, Brian Hennessy, Ciarán Lennon, Kieran Lucey, Jack Manning and their families to mark such a wonderful achievement.

The new junior cycle will place the student at the centre of the learning process. It allows for new ways of learning and a broader range of skills to be properly assessed. This leaflet aims to inform parents of post-primary school students about the key changes underway

Principles, Key Skills and Statements of Learning

Underpinning the new junior cycle are a set of principles, key skills and statements of learning. These will ensure that your child receives a rich educational experience that has both breadth and depth. Your child will have access to a varied curriculum of knowledge, understandings, skills and values.

Eight principles underpin the framework for Junior Cycle. These inform the planning for, as well as the development and implementation of, junior cycle programmes in all schools. The eight principles of Junior Cycle are:-

- · Learning to Learn
- Choice and Flexibility
- · Quality
- Creativity and Innovation
- Engagement and Participation Continuity and Development .
- Inclusive Education .
- Wellbeing

Eight key skills permeate across the entire curriculum



Through engaging with the key skills students will:

- · be more actively engaged with learning
- take greater ownership of their learning .
- have a critical engagement with digital technology be encouraged to problem solve and think critically and .

creatively

The twenty-four statements of learning describe what your child should know, understand and value having participated in junior cycle. Schools will ensure that all statements of learning feature in the programme offered to their junior cycle students.

New subject specifications are being implemented in schools on a plused basis



How student achievement at Junior Cycle will be assessed The most significant change in the new Junior Cycle is in the area of assessment. A dual approach to assessment, involving classroom-based assessment across the three years and a final externally-assessed, state-certified examination can enable the appropriate balance between preparing students for examinations and facilitating creative thinking, engaged learning and better outcomes for students. From Autur 2017, junior cycle students will receive a new Junior Cycle Profile of Achievement (JCPA). The JCPA will reflect a much wider range of your child's achievements over the three years of junior cycle. The JCPA will report on a number of areas, including:-

- 1. Subjects (State Examination and Assessment Task) 2. Classroom Based Assessments
- 3. Short courses
- 4. Other Learning Experiences

Subjects

Schools will be able to choose from a total of 21 different subjects for inclusion on their junior cycle programme. All subjects are being revised and each one will have its own specification replacing what was previously known as a syllabus. Each specification describes the learning that takes place as part of the student's study of a subject in junior cycle. By 2019 all new subject specifications will have been introduced. Students can study a maximum of 10 subjects for the JCPA, and if their school offers short courses they can study 9 subjects plus 2 short courses or 8 subjects plus 4 short courses for certification purposes.

The state examination that students sit in their subject at the end of their junior cycle will also be graded differently Instead of A, B, C, D, E, F and NG the following descriptors will now

Classroom Based Assessments

Classroom Based Assessments (CBAs) provide students with opportunities to demonstrate their learning and skills in ways not possible in a pen and paper examination, for example, their verbal communication and investigation skills. CBAs will be undertaken in subjects and short courses and will be facilitated by the classroom teacher.

"Six years that go by way too fast"



The first day of secondary school, for me, was a leap of faith into a new, uncharted world. I was dropped off at the main gate by my father, who bid me farewell on the most important solo journey thus far in my life; the march from the School Gate to the Red Door under the Arch that leads on to the Glass Hall. The cause for my anxiety on that first day was simple: Would I be put in the same class as my primary school mates? As I trudged on, I witnessed the enormous, monstrous building that stood before me. This was St Kieran's College. I reached that narrow, red door under the arch and pulled the door open with all the power and might that a poor little First Year has. There before me, sitting on the windowsill of the Glass Hall (instead of the benches) were my friends. I felt much more at ease with them beside me, my confidence began to rise, and we set off to climb the 58 steps to the Study Hall. Here, the large white study hall welcomed us, and we quickly sat down in the middle row of chairs that were fanning out across the hall. We were welcomed by Mr Curtis, the former principal of the school. Mr O'Keefe rose to the stage and introduced himself as our Year Head. My heart began racing... Was I with my friends or not? Before my concern could be answered, Mr O'Keefe explained to us the difference between two simple words: "Pupils" and "Students". We were pupils in primary school, reliant and dependent on our teachers for almost everything. Now though, we were moving on, starting

to do things for ourselves, we received some autonomy. With this in mind, he began to read the class rosters. When your name was called, you had to stand. "In class 1A1, we have...". He progressed down the list, then my name rang throughout the room. My heart exploded in my chest. I rose, and nervously looked on the rest of the people in the room. Just two seconds later, my friend from primary school was called out. My worries evaporated. A third friend of ours was also put in our class, and I became flooded with relief. We took off cheerfully to the first class, the first of the thousands of classes we were about to sit in in our time at Kieran's.

Second Year was definitely one of my favourite years. The '79 building was where the first and second years had their social areas, and so now we felt that we owned the building. Up the tight, narrow stairs that are completely jammed between classes, you could find our hallway. It's an image I'll never forget; 140 students packed in every morning, either talking with friends, finishing homework due that morning, or playing games on our phones. At that time, we all played the fad that was 'flappy bird', a simple tapping game. Everyone wanted to be the best, we used every spare minute of the day, between classes, to try improve our own high scores. The game is almost unheard of today, but it feels like only vesterday that we were watching each other almost get a high score, long after the bell had echoed through the hall. We were certainly more mischievous in Second Year. No doubt the teachers were annoyed by our misbehaviour, but our common roque attitude really teamed us together. We created bonds in second year that I hope will survive the individual and diverse paths we take into our own, unique futures.

Third Year was quite different. The year of the Junior Certificate. We had the pressure of an official, (somewhat) important, state exam. In truth, the exam doesn't count for very much in your life on its own, but we must look at it in the larger picture. The Junior Cert allows us to experience the hustle of a state examination, preparing us nicely for the Leaving Cert. That reminds

me of when my Leaving Cert Irish teacher, told us a short time ago, that the Leaving Cert won't count for very much either in our futures. It's certainly a substantial milestone, but we will look back at the Leaving Cert as we do at the Junior Cert now. Similarly, many employers would rather know what qualifications and/or experience you have in their field of work rather than how many H1s, H2s, H3s and so on you got in the Leaving Cert. I don't want you to think that I'm not concerned about my results in the Leaving Cert instead I want to show how the Leaving Cert is just another simple step on our path forwards. To me, this highlights what is really important during our time in school. Our time in Kieran's is much more than academic learning, it's about the community. Six years together with the same people, seeing those same faces day in, day out... it simply becomes one large, extended family. And just like any family, there are disagreements, arguments, or squabbles, but also warmth, laughter, and a sense of belonging. I cannot sum up this family feeling any better than the time we came back from our thirdyear school trip and played a game of 'Bullrush takedown'. We came back to school half an hour too early, but instead of going back to class, we were allowed to go up onto the first-year hurling pitch to play the game, which nearly the whole year took part in. The game started with three lads standing at the halfway line of the pitch, while the rest of us all stood spread out behind the goal line. The aim of the game; to make it to the other side of the pitch without getting tackled to the ground by the lads that were on. I made it through two rounds, then distinctly remember being tackled to the ground. Now I was on, and slowly we caught the rest of the year until only one or two remained. We cooperated so well as a team that day, working hard to catch one of our own, and hurling him to the ground. It was a fine day that I'm sure many of us will remember fondly when we look back at our days in Kieran's.

Our year overcame the Junior Cert, despite the hot, humid temperatures of the exam week in the Summer of 2015. After the exams, I enjoyed a real sense of freedom for the remainder of that Summer. We began back in September in Transition Year, which the vast majority of our year chose to do. If you put yourself out there and get involved in the year, it can prove to be the most exciting, worthwhile year of your life at Kieran's. I did the enrichment programme in TY at the nearby Alzheimer's Centre everv Wednesday for an hour and a half. Playing board games, helping in the garden, serving tea and biscuits to the clients, and simply chatting with the people were just a few of the activities we did. Throughout the year, I got to know the people of my year even better, and also felt I began to know my teachers better too. There's such a difference in the attitudes of the teachers towards the young first years and the mature sixth years. From authoritarian rulers of the classrooms to helpful, approachable, friendly people. I felt this change the most in TY, when we entered the Senior half of the school. Another important aspect of TY is leaving your comfort zone. I did a little bit of debating in fourth year with the school, but I still felt fairly nervous to speak in public. The TY coordinator asked me to do a talk to the parents of the third years about the advantages of TY. That night we were complimented for our hard work and I ended up really enjoying myself. Stepping out of your comfort zone is so important for us as students, TY offers us this chance. I encourage all to seize the opportunity and enjoy the year as much as I did.

Unfortunately, the year of bliss must come to an end. When Fifth Year comes around, you hit the wall of work straight away when you're back in school that September. A towering block of school books gets jammed into a big, heavy bag on your strained back. Mid-term exams are approaching quickly, you have to be back in the swing of homework every night again. But Fifth Year was, for me, a real eye opener. One Sunny, sparsely clouded day, in May of Fifth Year, I was at home in one of the fields of my farm. It's a field far up on a hill with a view of the entire County of Kilkenny and beyond. I travelled up the hill to move some of our cattle into the next field to graze the fresh grass, when suddenly a line from Gerard Manley Hopkins's poetry came to me: "For skies of couple coloured as a brinded cow". I had just been learning the quotes of Hopkins for the Summer Exams that were coming up soon, but it wasn't until now that I finally saw it. The sky truly was as scattered with clouds in the same shapes as the colours of a cow. I looked around me then, and for the first time actually appreciated the magnificent view before me. I felt as if a third eye had finally been opened, I couldn't believe my own blindness and ignorance towards such an imposing and elegant panorama. Family and friends often said how beautiful the view is from our house when they visit, but I had never recognised it for myself. Hopkins's quote had finally awoken an appreciation in me for the scenic views found just outside my doorstep. What would my life have been without the opening of this 'third eye'? I have my English teacher to thank, for offering the poetry of Hopkins to us, and examining his poetry in such excellent precision. Without her, and without the education that is to be received at Kieran's that is so appreciative of the aesthetics, I would have lived my life as one of the poor men in Plato's allegory of the cave, forever unaware of the beauty of reality that laid right before my own two eyes.

Summer Exams came soon after that, they were a relief to have completed that year. However, the prospect of the year we were about to experience that September had me feeling a bit nauseous already. All too soon, the final year had arrived. This was the Leaving Cert, a year that can be summed up as constantly hearing a gospel of teachers preaching their Holy words: 'study, study, study!' In truth though, the final year is such a rollercoaster of a year. We experience the ups and downs, from week to week, day to day, but continue to rocket on toward the finish line at such an incredible speed. Near the start of the year though, our career guidance teacher told us this; "Sixth Year is a year like none other in your life so far. This is because for the first time in your lives, you don't know where you are going to be one year from now. A world of possibilities is waiting for you to seize the endless opportunities." For me, the possibility to choose anything I want paralysis me. I want to pursue a career that I will enjoy. She went on to say that we must look at life as if we are fishermen. In youth, we can explore the whole pond, trying out all the different locations where we 'catch the most fish'. Then, in later life, we can settle down to the spot where, for us, the fish are most easily caught. This analogy speaks volumes to me. It's almost impossible to know what our 'passion' is at this stage of our lives. Instead, we should go out and get experience with different people, experiment with the different jobs that we would like to do. We don't have to be locked into the one career path in life. Kieran's has opened up the endless possibilities to me, and allowed me to become greedy, in a good way. I don't have to choose just one path in life, I can enjoy as many of them as I want.

In writing this essay, I have written about different episodes I have experienced here in Kieran's, but when I look at the overall picture, my entire six years, I am filled with wonder and bewilderment. How has it all went by so rapidly? It is truly a mystery to me how six years of my life have gone by in a flash. How is it possible that a school day can sometimes stretch out so exhaustingly long, but the school year slips by so fast? I remember my English teacher talking to us at the end of First Year about how fast the year had gone by. He said to us then, that every year goes by faster than the last. This illusion is very accurate for my experience here in Kieran's. Looking back at these past six years, I sometimes wonder if I got the most out of them, did I really seize enough opportunities in what feels like such a short space of time? I must have. Time would not have flown by so quickly if I had not thoroughly enjoyed myself. Kieran's is a proud school, one with countless sporting trophies, academic awards and an excellent record. However, I feel that more important than all these successes is that every student enjoys his time at Kieran's. We are a school of many talents, and are blessed to have such skilled students, but we are just as lucky to have a school with such a pleasant, supporting atmosphere, one in which everyone thrives. I feel I can speak on behalf of the entire First Year class of 2012, that every pupil who arrived through the College gate on their first day will leave through those same gates as a student, with six of the most enjoyable years of our lives behind us.

LITURGIES / RETREATS

Every year the students of St Kieran's College receive either a group or a class retreat and attended numerous liturgies celebrating our faith. CAIRDEAS:

During the summer, Ms Loughnane and Mr Brennan contacted twenty-four students asking if they were interested in taking part in the Cairdeas programme. The group met with the chaplaincy team prior to the First Years entering St Kieran's College.

The Cairdeas Programme aims to provide support for our First Year students – individually and as a group, to help them settle in, make progress and to achieve their full potential within St Kieran's College. Each year approximately twenty-five to thirty of our Fifth Year students take part in the Cairdeas programme. Each Fifth Year is assigned approximately five students to look after. They meet each of their students on their first day and at regular intervals throughout the year particularly during the first term. The beginning of secondary school can be difficult for First Years with so many new subjects and new faces to get used to.

Mentors will provide individual and group support from the initial stages of the First Year's life within St Kieran's College. They will be selected and given training to ensure that they have the skills necessary to support young people who might be daunted by some of the obstacles they face during their transition from primary to secondary school. The Cairdeas Programme encourages Fifth Year students to play a responsible role in the school community and to ensure that new students are secure in the knowledge that there are always older pupils available and willing to help them.

The process of recruiting students with similar skills has already begun for next year. Any student who is interested in the programme is now expected to answer a series of questions based on why they may be suitable to fulfill the role of a friend to our incoming First Years. The students interested will then be interviewed by Ms Loughnane and Mr Brennan. Overall, this is an excellent initiative with the sole focus of aiding First Years to settle in our school.

CATHOLIC SCHOOLS WEEK 2018

Catholic Schools Week is an annual celebration that invites schools to give expression in an exceptional way to the ethos of Catholic education. It acknowledges the tremendous contribution that our Catholic primary



and post-primary schools make, not just to Irish society, but to the mission of the church. This year's theme is Catholic Schools: Called to be a Family of Families.

Whole School Evaluation

Following the Department inspection of St Kieran's College the Board of Management are invited to submit a formal response to the report published by the inspectorate. Given the very positive and affirming nature of the report this was an easy and welcome task. Here below, then, is the formal response to that inspection.



PART A

Please comment on the content of the inspection report (approximately 100-150 words)

The Board of Management welcomes this very positive report following the recent WSE MLL. Our mission states that academically, spiritually, physically and emotionally our students are encouraged to strive for all that is possible in the relentless pursuit of perfecting their individual gifts and talents. It was heartening to see that the inspectorate saw that this "mission is lived out in practice". In particular we welcome recognition of the fact that "the board and senior management promote excellence in teaching and learning", that we "promote a culture of learning" in St Kieran's, that "very well-organised student support structures are in place"and that as a result our "students were very focused and able to work purposefully". Finally an appreciation of the manner in which "in all lessons, there was a good atmosphere for learning, students were motivated to learn and showed high levels of respect towards their teachers and each other" is very affirming of the dedication and commitment of our students, staff, management and parents who all work so closely together to create this positive school environment.

PART B

Please indicate the actions that the school has taken or plans to take to address each of the recommendations in the report (approximately 350-400 words)

In observing "since a culture of review, improvement and selfevaluation has been established by school management in collaboration teachers" the inspectorate with notes that "the school's capacity for improvement is good". In continuance, therefore, of this ongoing selfevaluation all recommendations will be integrated into the regular development and improvement so much part of the fabric of daily life in St Kieran's College.

Work, which was already begun, is ongoing in the reviewing and updating of our posts of responsibility to continue to ensure they best promote leadership in learning. We are heartened by the ongoing response and enthusiasm of staff in this area. This is resonate with the approach, recognised by the inspectorate, of management who "empowers staff to take on leadership roles and is willing to distribute significant leadership responsibilities".

The Board will continue its pursuit, now many years in progress, for even better facilities on behalf of our students. We welcome, therefore, the inclusion of the school on the list of those who are to be in receipt of significant capital projects in the more immediate future and we look forward to working with the Department of Education ands Skills in realising this long held dream. In the short term any and all works possible will, as always, be carried out on the science facilities.

The report recognises that "the principal and other school leaders are committed to junior cycle reform and have taken measures to help ensure [its] successful implementation". Work is, therefore, ongoing, and collaboration taking place, to ensure that all subject plans best reflect the framework for the New Junior Cycle.

As was recognised by the inspectorate a review of study periods as part of the timetable structure has already begun and before the inspection was over all those study periods in the teachers timetables had been removed and the remaining work will be brought to a completion by the end of this academic year.

In endeavouring to extend the "very effective teaching, learning and assessment" observed by the inspectorate, work will be undertaken to continually promote more active methodologies, assessment for learning practices and formative developmental written feedback on assignments all undertaken within the framework of our ongoing SSE. This remains part of the observed "definite focus on improving teaching and learning" so much a part of St Kieran's College.

Review of Macbeth by William Shakespeare produced by Icarus Theatre

Macbeth (a.k.a. full title "The Tragedy of Macbeth) is a tragedy written by William Shakespeare and is thought that it was first performed in 1606. It is the story of how a brave Scottish general named Macbeth receives a prophecy from a trio of witches (weird sisters) that one day he will become King of Scotland. Consumed by ambition and spurred to action by his wife, Macbeth murders King Duncan and takes the Scottish throne for himself. He is then wracked with guilt and paranoia which lead him to commit more and more murders to protect himself from enmity(conflict) and suspicion, he soon becomes a tyrannical ruler. His confidence in the prophecies eventually lead to his downfall and he is overthrown and killed by those he has wronged.

My review of this production of Macbeth by Icarus Theatre Collective is positive in parts and negative in others. I thought the props, costumes, sound, lighting, projections and special effects were absolutely brilliant. All were simple yet striking as a whole. I very much enjoyed how the sound effects such as the clashing of swords between characters were perfectly in sync with the choreography. The costumes were extremely detailed, showing true appreciation of Macbeth's era.The lighting and cyclorama used in this production were superb, the transition from scene to scene was seamless and really gave the production that sense of impending tragedy and haunting atmosphere, Macbeth is known for.

This is where I talk negative about the play's production, specifically the acting. All the actors I think played their individual parts very well but when it came to transitioning from character to character I felt the play became a bit confusing and misrepresented. For example, characters that died in the scenes previous, that actor was playing different roles later on and Macduff, being played by an actress, by the name of Rowan Winter. Even though she played the role of Macduff very well, Macduff's lines coming from a woman's mouth I deemed a bit strange since there were male actors that could've done the role instead of Rowan Winter. Overall, I thought the acting/co-ordination of the play was poor.

Especially when the main actor of the production, Lawrence Stubbings who was meant to play Macbeth couldn't partake due to illness (Macbeth curse) being replaced by James Heatlie, who was meant to play Banquo but since you require both Macbeth and Banquo in a scene together, Jay Wilson took on the part using a script as a prompt which he used the majority of the play for most of his speaking roles, this ruined my immersion and many others. But, at least he made a joke out of it during the play by throwing the script onto the stage as he entered through a trapdoor beneath, whether it was deliberate or not. The interaction the actors had with the audience was funny and kept the play alive, but it shouldn't have been necessary, especially for a production of Macbeth.

To conclude, this production of the play was both good and bad and even though there were catastrophic faults in the play's production most of them on another day mightn't be present in the play. So, I would highly recommend this play just make sure that the actors do the remedy of getting rid of Macbeth's curse (offender must step outside, turn around x3 times, spit, and say the foulest word he/she can think of) and lcarus organise the next production more carefully for example, making sure understudies know their lines, just in case.

So, because of this I would give this production of Macbeth a 3/5 stars.

Kildalton Trip 2018



The Fifth Year Agricultural Science class went to Kildalton Agricultural College on Thursday, March 8th. The purpose of the trip was to fulfil the requirements for the practical component for Agricultural Science in the leaving certificate. We were accompanied by Mr Darmody and Ms Mulcahy.

We got a tour of the college farm and attended twelve stands. At each stand a lecturer gave a presentation. We were informed about the benefits of growing catch crops on the farm, which include; less leaching, less soil erosion, retention of soil nutrients and a fodder source. We also received information on grassland management, fertiliser use and calibration of the fertiliser spreader.

Farm deaths were highlighted to us and that 48% of farm deaths have occurred from tractors and farm machinery. In order to avoid becoming a statistic it's important that

 all farm vehicles and machinery are in good working order,



- operators are competent using the machinery,
- not to take short cuts,
- no distractions (mobile phones),
- avoid tiredness,
- no loose clothing and
- to slow down.

We got to visit the dairy shed, beef house and sheep shed. It was emphasised to us that 90% of beef produced in Ireland is exported and that half of that goes to the U.K. Trade deal agreements under Brexit will therefore have huge implications for Irish Agriculture. Most of the animals were still indoors at the time of our visit because of the poor spring weather. Silage and concentrates were being fed to all livestock, which are costly feeds compared to grass. There was lost productivity such as reduced milk yields and milk solids, reduced liveweight gains and a higher labour load from the extended housing of animals.

Overall, the trip was very worthwhile to see theory being put into practice. We wrote up a report on the farm visit, which will be presented to the state examiner in May 2019.

Eoin Morgan Represented Ireland in the World Junior Science Olympiad

Eoin Morgan, Transition Year student from St Kieran's College, was selected to represent Ireland in The International Junior Science Olympiad (IJSO) in the Netherlands.

This is a phenomenal achievement for Eoin, as he joined only five other students from around Ireland to make up the Irish team. Eoin qualified for the Irish team when he received a silver medal in the Irish Junior Science Olympiad (IrJSO) which was held on 21st October in DCU. The top 1% of Maths and Science students (based on their Junior Cert results 2017) were invited to this prestigious exam. The exam lasted for over two hours, during which, Eoin had to answer over sixty multiple choice questions. To achieve a silver medal in such an examination, when pitted against the best students in Ireland, requires great knowledge, skill and understanding.

Eoin then joined the Irish Team consisting of six of the top students in

BT Young Scientist

For our project this year we studied Domestic Anerobic Digestion. During the months of September and October we came up with our project idea and formulated our entry. We learned just after the Mid Term Break that our entry had been successful and now the real work began!

We decided to visit Ormonde Organics in Portlaw, Co Waterford to gain a deeper insight into recyclable waste. Ormonde Organics are the people who take organic waste from companies within every industry and municipal authorities and use it to generate green energy (biogas, electricity, heat) and nutrient-rich soil amendment products (compost). This helps to significantly reduce our carbon footprint. We found this very useful as the basis of our project was looking at how food waste could be used to make electricity. Our experiments consisted of giving twelve families small bins for



the country and trained with them to prepare for the IJSO, which was held in The Netherlands last December. Over fifty countries were represented at the IJSO, the main focus being a number of exams focusing on the theme of "Water and Sustainability". Following a week away in the Netherlands, Eoin returned home from Amsterdam with an International Junior Science Olympiad bronze medal for his efforts, so concluding a very challenging but rewarding experience for Eoin.



food waste. Whenever that bin was full, we weighed it, and using the plant in Portlaw, we were able to work out how much energy that waste could produce. We discovered that it isn't viable for household waste but if you upscaled it to commercial waste it would be worthwhile investing in a digester and there could be a viable business in this area. The BT Young Scientist Exhibition lasted three days with judging on each of the days. It was a great experience that we'll remember for a long time to come. It was a lot of hard work but very enjoyable and we certainly learned a lot in the process.

We'd like to thank Mr Hennessy for all of his work in helping us to prepare for the exhibition.

Maher added his own point from play a minute later. Thurles scored the next three scores from free taker Ferncombe before a Devon Ryan score brought the game to the minimum. St Kieran's responded like champions with Jack Doyle scoring from the sideline while on the run in the 11th minute. Jack had a great chance to raise a green flag but for heroic Thurles defending. Senior Hurling



The hurling year started in October with the usual ritual of trials on the senior pitch to choose a panel for the upcoming Leinster league.

After a lot of good hurling we had to settle on our panel, which left a good many lads disappointed at not making the cut. Daithí Barron was appointed captain and Tommy Ronan vice-captain.

We were in the fortunate position of having a good number of the previous year's panel available and this experience was to stand to the team during the year.

Our league campaign started against Offaly schools on October 25th where we had a good win. Two more victories followed in November against Dublin North and St. Peter's College, Wexford. On November 22nd we had a great battle against Borris Vocational School under lights in Fenagh. This was the league final which we won on a scoreline of 3-5 to 0-7. There was a new format to the championship this year with teams being organised into groups of three, with the first game fixed for December 13th which was about six weeks earlier than normal.

We faced Castlecomer Community School in Jenkinstown on a bitterly cold Wednesday afternoon in December. The biggest problem for both teams was trying to stay warm in the driving sleet and rain. After a tough, hard battle the teams finished level and extra time was played. We took control in extra time and won by 1-12 to 0-9 with the game blown up early because of the fading light.

We had to hit the ground running when the championship resumed after Christmas as we had a meeting with Kilkenny CBS on January 11th in Dunmore. We played WIT freshers

and Thurles CBS in challenge games before Christmas and trained a number of times over the holidays. In a dour struggle, with scores hard to come by and a man down for the last quarter, we managed to hold out for a draw and the now familiar extra time followed. We put in a strong performance in that extra time and won by 0-16 to 0-12. The extra physical training put in by the lads under the expert eye of Mr. Michael Walsh was beginning to bear fruit. Next up was St. Peter's in the Leinster semi-final, who we had already beaten in the league. This time, however, it was knock-out championship and we had to travel to Enniscorthy on February 10th for the fixture. The pitch in St Patrick's Park was in very good condition considering the weather at the time. The team played well and we won by 2-13 to 2-08, conceding a goal late on.

The Leinster final pitted us against Dublin North in Network Dr Cullen Park in Carlow. Again, we had beaten them in the league but a different Dublin team turned up on February 22nd. They were big, physical and very skilful and they deservedly beat us by three points on a scoreline of 1-14 to 1-11. We had our chances but had to bow the knee to the better team on the day. Everyone was very disappointed after this defeat but we decided we were going to make amends in the All Ireland series.

First up was an All Ireland quarter final against Gort Community School on March 10th. Believe it or not, and most probably a first for St Kieran's, we had to travel to County Roscommon and the Pádraig Pearses club to play Gort because of the scarcity of pitches. We were not overly impressive in beating Gort by 1-10 to 0-5. The prize was a chance to play against the Croke Cup favourites and Dr Harty Cup champions, Ardscoil Rís from Limerick. fixture whetted everyone's This appetite and the venue was much closer to home in the Sportsfield, Clonmel. This was the big one and a large crowd turned out to support both teams on the day. The lads put in their best performance to date and never let Ardscoil get on top. We led by five points with about ten minutes to go but conceded a goal which put us under pressure, but we managed to hold on by 0-19 to 1-14 for a famous win.

We had now qualified for the All Ireland final in Thurles on Saturday March 31st against Presentation College Athenry. There was a quiet build up to the final because we were on our Easter holidays in the week preceding the final. The Leaving Cert students on the panel were kept busy with revision and study and it was a helpful

distraction. Saturday arrived and we headed for Thurles for a 5 pm start with the Limerick / Tipperary League semifinal as the main event to follow at 7 pm. Presentation Athenry had been impressive Connacht champions and turned a ten point deficit in the semifinal against CBS Kilkenny into a great victory. We were forewarned, and, as with all our opponents, we gave them our utmost respect. We dominated the first ten minutes of the game and led by four but the concession of frees left us a point behind. The battle was on and it took a moment of inspiration from our captain Daithí Barron to drive us forward. He won a ball about fifty metres from the Athenry goal and went on a solo run before blasting the ball to the net. This was quickly followed by a goal each from Ciaran Brennan and David O'Carroll. We began the second half ten points up and held this lead until the 54th minute when we





conceded a goal. We began to defend our lead, and as often happens, we invited the opposition onto us. Two more goals were conceded and when the final whistle was blown after 65 minutes we were somehow level: 3-12 a piece. Twenty minutes of extra time was to follow. The depth, mental strength and fitness of our panel now came into play. We used six subs over the eighty minutes. A goal by Jamie Young in the first half of extra time proved crucial and from there to the end we dominated to win by 5-19 to 3-17. Great credit must go to Presentation Athenry for the way they fought to the end and played no small part in making this a very memorable All Ireland final.

It was a great journey for players, parents, mentors and supporters from both inside and outside our school. The players brought great credit on themselves, their families ,their school and their clubs for their dedication to training, their exemplary behaviour both on and off the field and the contribution that every single player made to the cause. A special word of thanks to our Transition Year students who helped out at every training session and every game since last October. This group was made up of Mikey Lewis, Laurence Mahon, Stephen Keoghan, Ciaran Mullen, Jason Butler and Luke Campion.

This year we were joined on the backroom staff by Conor Ryan and we want to thank him for his positivity and good humour with all the players and staff during the year. We also want to acknowledge the contribution of DJ Carey and Grace McCormack to the preparation of the team during the year.
