

A native of Tullamore, Co.Offaly, Bernie graduated from the Science faculty in University College Limerick and spent the first year of her working life close to home in Birr where she was involved in setting up an Ecology/Field Study programme in the community activities centre there. Following this she began her teaching career proper in Roscrea College.

On her arrival to St Kieran's, she quickly immersed herself in the Science department teaching Biology and Ag. Science at Leaving Cert. level and general Science to Junior Cycle students. A firm believer in learning through experience, Bernie ensured that her pupilswere exposed to many scientific experiments, oftentimes outside the classroom, where they could investigate and research their topics in the natural world. Bernie further promoted this type of learning by inviting guest educators like Eanna Ni Lamhna - the renowned biologist, environmentalist wildlife consultant - to St Kieran's on numerous occasions. This, coupled with other initiatives like the TY World







of Science module, the educational excursions to Dublin Zoo to learn about wildlife conservation and endangered species, not to mention the many trips to the boglands of her native Offaly, accounted for Science becoming a very enjoyable and popular subject. This was particularly evident in the large numbers opting to study it at senior level.

Away from the Science Lab, Bernie always found time to get involved in many of the social activities on offer. For many years she played on the staff volleyball teams and was an avid supporter of the sporting activities of the students. The Delphi trips in particular come to mind here.

Bernie was also a regular on several of the school tours abroad, Barcelona and Prague to name but a few. She has shared many interesting stories about her travels to various destinations and I'm sure she's looking forward to travelling a great deal more in her retirement. One thing I think we can be sure of is that we won't find her on the golf course like many of her retired friends. I'm thinking here of one of our past golf outings where a memory comes to mind of Bernie handing out some sweet treats on the putting green and having little interest in the golf ball! student and later joined the teaching staff in 1991. Tom taught many things: Computers, History, Geography and Irish. Tom's rapport and caring nature with the student body was second to none over his teaching career. He would often be seen with an arm around the shoulder discussing all important aspects of school life with students.

Tom's tenure as ICT coordinator began during a period of rapid change in the IT industry in Ireland, and at a time when the application of technology began to create new opportunities, challenges, and changes in traditional teaching and learning models. Starting from a primitive base, the fruits of Tom's vision and commitment can be seen in the quality of the IT infrastructure that supports student learning in St Kieran's College today. During the COVID-19 pandemic, the school already had Google Classroom and an effective hybrid learning model in place for at least a year beforehand, meaning we were already prepared to face the challenges that were presented during that difficult time.

Tom thoroughly enjoyed the extracurricular aspect of school life. He loved cross country running and lunchtime runs with students and colleagues. Hail, rain or snow you would see Tom out running with the students down to the Castle Park. He simply did not miss a run. The chats and good natured crack while on the run are memories that many teachers will look back on fondly.

Since Tom joined the teaching staff in 1991 he was involved in training one of the schools hurling teams every year. Many people saw Tom coming in off of Fennessy's Field wearing his wellies in the dark, wet and cold winter nights after another training session. It is rare to see such selfless willingness to give of one's time. Tom was a serial winner in the school's hurling front. He won it all, multiple times!. Tom created a winning mentality between all his panels. Whether it be training or a challenge match the sheer desire and will to win is certainly characteristics that filter down to his players. No wonder the school has won so much in the recent past with Tom at the helm.

Tom's quiet style of leadership, openness and empathy made him such a great teacher, colleague and friend to many in the St Kieran's College community. His modesty and understated approach is a mark of a complete gentleman. And on that note we wish Tom a long, happy and most of all healthy retirement for many, many years to come.

Séamus was a graduate of Queens University, Belfast, where he majored in Maths. He had a particular interest in students who had learning difficulties. When the Department of Education assigned teaching hours to such students, Séamus volunteered to undergo training in that area. Under his direction, remedial education became an integral part of the school programme.

An Armagh man by birth, Séamus retained his northern accent all his life, despite living in Africa for many years. On arrival in Kilkenny he got involved in local affairs. He played golf for a number of years and was an active member of the Kilkenny Archaeological Society, being a member of the committee for many years.

His greatest form of relaxation was probably music and signing. He was with the Unity Singers during their halcyon days. He was also a loyal member of the St John's Parish choir.

St Kieran's College and International Perspectives

- Two Conferences



This past year two exciting conferences were held in St Kieran's College. These conferences were a joint venture collaboration between St Kieran's College and the University of Notre Dame Australia. The first initiatives of, what both institutions hope will be, many more to come. These gatherings were made possible as a result of the work of Prof Eamonn Conway in his capacity as the Inaugural Chair of Integral Human Development at Notre Dame Australia and Rev. Dr Dermot Ryan, President of St Kieran's College.

In welcoming attendees to both conferences we had an opportunity to explore briefly the history of St Kieran's College as the oldest Catholic College in Ireland and the resulting responsibility for all involved in St Kieran's to continue to promote the truly best of the excellence in Catholic education and service of the Gospel in all its forms.

Both Notre Dame Australia and St Kieran's College, then, have, for obvious reasons, a keen interest in Catholic education and as such a logical conference for them to host was International Perspectives on Catholic Educational Leadership. This gathering, which was quickly sold out, saw people from, literally, all corners of the country come to Kilkenny to be part of the various sessions on offer over the three



days. Leaders from many school and leading Catholic education bodies were in attendance to hear contributions from Prof Sally Egan, UNDA, who is the inaugural Senior Director of Strategic Academic Development in Notre Dame Australia; Mr Mike Shorten, CEO of the Bishop Hogart Trust in the UK which is leading and managing nearly 40 Catholic

schools: Prof Eamonn Conway a priest of the Archdiocese of Tuam and the inaugural Chair of Integral Human Development at Notre Dame Australia; and Prof Renée Kohler-Ryan National Head of the School of Philosophy and Theology at Notre Dame Australia. Panel discussions also featured Seamus McMulconry, Gen Sec CPSMA; Alan Hynes CEO of the Catholic Education Partnership; and Angela Mitchell Notre Dame Australia Association for Catholic Education. All attendees also took part in a most interesting keynote lecture on Values Driven Leadership by Brian Cody, the current manager of James Stephens Club and former manager of Kilkenny GAA, proud past pupil and, we would say, the most successful Irish sporting manager of all time.

The second conference was on the topic of International Perspectives Forming Catechists, a timely contribution to this conversation now that Pope Francis has asked all local churches to explore how they can institute this ministry in a stable and permanent capacity. In the service of the Diocese and Church St Kieran's College was delighted to host this timely conference. Addressing various topics at this conference were Prof Leonard Franci Professor of Catholic Education at Notre Dame Australia, Bishop Kevin Doran, Prof Renée Kohler-Ryan National Head of the School of Philosophy and

Theology at Notre Dame Australia, Rev Dr Eamonn Fitzgibbons, Director of the Irish Institute of Pastoral Studies at Mary Immaculate College, and Dr Alex O'Hara, National Director of Catechetics and Executive Secretary to the Council for Catechetics in the Irish Episcopal Conference. A discussion on the impact of Synodality to our Church today was chaired by the College President Rev Dr Rvan, during which he asked guestions of Prof Conway on his experience of the recent Synod in Rome.

Each day was begun with Mass in the College Chapel and both gatherings came together for a moment of prayer on the Thursday evening led by Ms Gemma Mulligan, Diocesan Pastoral Coordinator in Ossory. The College was a hive of activity throughout the conferences. Many side-bar conversations were had by attendees and contributors and it was obvious that new collaborations and synergies were being born in these very days. The mood at both gatherings was very positive and optimistic and the real possibilities available to the Church in this new ministry of Catechists and to Education, by the very best of Catholic Education, came to the fore.

Sadly the gatherings were impacted by bereavements as Bishop Niall, who was due to make a contribution, had to depart as his father took poorly and died in the days that followed, and Linda Rainsberry, who was also to contribute, suffered the loss of her father-in-law. May they both rest in the Peace of Christ.

As these days ended it was obvious to all who attended that this must be merely the first of many similar collaborations between our two wonderful Colleges. In working together we can support the best of each other and then reflect deeply on the questions which impact us.

Ossory Adult Faith Development

At the heart of St Kieran's College is service to the Diocese. This is a mission that we fulfil by means of the education of all our students to the fullest extent in accordance with the Gospel, but we also serve this mission through many diocesan activities for faith development. Since its inception the Ossory Adult Faith Development has had its home, trying to fulfil this latter mission, from St Kieran's College. Catholic education and faith formation has always been at the heart of the College and the activities of the many diocesan groups here ensure that it remains very much so today.



The Adult Faith Development Group, which is directed by Fr Dermot, continually strives to help people deepen their understanding of, and love for, their faith. It has done this since the group began by continually exploring new and innovative ways to engage people with their faith. One of the stand-out initiatives in recent years, in this regard, was the creation of the ASPAL platform, as a digital faith formation tool for all the dioceses of Ireland. This past year saw exciting developments with regard to this platform and our Diocesan collaboration with St Patrick's Pontifical University. St Patrick's had secured the contract to provide ongoing moral formation for all who work in the Bons Secours hospitals here in Ireland and in America. Through this collaboration the Bons Secours Health System in partnering with St Patrick's Pontifical University, Maynooth and by means of the use of the ASPAL platform can provide programmes for those in Allied Healthcare, professional and administration roles, and people working in Pastoral Care or Chaplaincy. These NFQ aligned short courses delivered online, via the platform developed here in Ossory, that will allow users to build towards certification and scale to Master's level. It is an exciting development and opens the way for the many other similar innovations that the ASPAL platform can support.

Notably this year also the platform supported many dioceses in offering the training of Extraordinary Ministers of the Eucharist from the comfort of their own home. Again showing the manner in which this innovative platform can have much to offer our parishes and the Irish Church.

This past summer also saw an off-shoot from the ASPAL platform means of the creation of ASPALINTERACTIVE - a new platform created from scratch to offer OR driven tours of sacred spaces. This project, driven largely to in the first instance, offer this in St Mary's Cathedral but in a way that can be scaled and offered freely to other churches, shrines, and parishes, saw the creation of a interactive tour modal that invites people to engage with the art, history and symbols of faith before them in any sacred space. As we write this article the first of a new group of parishes wanted to explore the use of this platform has happened - another way the AFD group, in desiring to serve Ossory, is reaching beyond the confines of the Diocese too.

In this past year, also, the College hosted many varied gatherings during Advent and Lent as the AFD Group offered reflections on various topics that were timely and of interest - we explored Catholic Education in a modern Ireland; the need for parishes and Dioceses to embrace collaboration

and to restructure so that we can better serve the Lord and his people: evenings of training for Ministers of the Word; a city retreat, over three nights, on the topic of Faith, Hope and Love; and exploration of Theology and Ecology; an insight into the Synod as it took place in Rome and so much more. For these evenings we were joined by Prof Eamonn Conway, Mr Alan Hynes, CEO CEP, Fr Billy Swan Ferns, Fr Albert McDonnell Killaloe, Fr Chris Hayden, Ferns, Prof Tobias Winright, Maynooth and many other top class speakers. It is wonderful that here in the College and throughout the Diocese work is undertaken to bring such quality reflections to the people of our parishes.

The Ossory Times is now in its 12th year and it continues to serve the people and parishes of our Diocese sharing the good news of how our faith is lived locally. It is wonderful for parishes and Diocesan groups to share news of their many faith activities - it helps us all realise that we are part of a wider faith community, a community that is alive and a community that will help and support each of us in our faith journey. By means of catechetical and news articles the Ossory Times helps us to share that together.

Has the Faith Development Group succeeded in its work - no. But that work is a lifetime of trying to help deepen the faith of those who are keen; inspire



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

This year Ossory Diocese, keen to develop its youth ministry outreach, is reintroducing The John Paul II Award.

Strand 5 of the Diocesan Pastoral Plan is Young People. This award, is a faith achievement, one for young people between the ages of 16 and 18 with its key goal to encourage and help participants to take an active part in the life of the Church and wider community.

It seeks to do so in ways that are 'non-competitive, inclusive, flexible

and voluntary'. The Award involves candidates committing to one hour per week in their parishes and one hour per week in their communities over eight, fourteen or twenty weeks depending on which Award level they are undertaking.

Thankfully, there are young people in Ossory who are already involved in their parishes and volunteer in their wider community. The John Paul II Award is a means to officially recognise and honour those contributions. For others who are not involved regularly in parish and community, the Award allows an opportunity to become involved and to make a positive contribution to parish and community

The young people who wish to enrol for the Award are asked to register their applications through

their TY coordinator in their schools and it is hoped that those who engage in it will have a positive and enriching experience, and in turn encourage others in the future to participate.

Students from St Kieran's College and other schools in the Diocese travel to Taizé each year with Ossory Youth and many of these students have participated in Taizé Prayer evenings held in the Diocese over the past few months.

Gathering around the Taizé Cross in the Blessed Sacrament Chapel in St Mary's Cathedral in a prayerful atmosphere, the music and chants from Taizé are played and the Word is read. There is an opportunity for silence and personal reflection before the evening ends with a social aspect.

The Ossory Diocesan Forum

From the beginning of his ministry in Ossory Bishop Niall Coll pointed out the importance of developing the full participation of the people in the life of the Church. He met the members of the out-going Ossory Diocesan Pastoral Council (ODPC) in March 2023 to acknowledge their work. In July 2023 Bishop Niall established a working group consisting of priests, religious and lay members to consult widely and make recommendations about the formation of a new Ossory Diocesan Pastoral Council. In August 2023 the working group presented their report to the Bishop. Following this process of consultation, the members of the new Ossory Diocesan Pastoral Council were appointed by the Bishop.

The new Ossory Diocesan Pastoral Council had its first meeting of their four-year term on 19th January 2024. The members of the ODPC are:

Going forward there will be a possibility, as needs arise, of coopting additional members, whilst maintaining a balance of priests and lay people, women and men.

At our first meeting in January Bishop Niall outlined that The Ossory Diocesan Pastoral Council is a consultative group with whom the Bishop explores and discusses pastoral matters. The Ossory Diocesan Pastoral Council will promote, support, and coordinate the work of the Parish Pastoral Councils and the Pastoral Area Councils in the context of the Ossory Diocesan Plan. It will model synodality, collaboration and co-responsibility for

the life of the Diocese between the Bishop, priests, and laity. Finally, the Ossory Diocesan Pastoral Council will invite, receive and consider reports from the various areas of life in which the diocese is engaged.

The Ossory Diocesan Pastoral Council has planned a schedule of monthly meetings across 2024 (including taking a break during the summer months of July and August). Included in these meetings was a training session hosted in St Kieran's College and facilitated by Joe Conroy on Saturday 27th April 2024. The aim of this day, which was rooted in contemplative prayer, was to foster a deeper understanding and commitment to the ODPC's collaborative decision-making, thus furthering the mission of the Church in Ossory and enriching the spiritual journey of its members.

As in the case of Parish Pastoral Councils, there will be many challenges in working as a Diocesan Pastoral Council. These will include adequately communicating what we are doing, drawing on the gifts of volunteers who are often busy people and trusting that we will recognise where the Holy Spirit is leading us. These are the realities we live in.



BT Young Scientist 2024

On September 23rd 2023, I got an email about an opportunity to enter the BT Young Scientist Exhibition 2024. Over the next few days, I was thinking about entering this event, because my interest in sport and my experience with growing up watching my sister suffer from sleep came together to form my idea. On September 30th 2023, I submitted my project - 'Does Sleep have an Effect on the Performance of Sports Athletes?'

Mr Hennessy, our science teacher, called myself and 7 other lads out of class to let us know that our projects had been picked to take part in the BT Young Scientist Exhibition 2024. Alongside my project, there were 2 other groups - Louis Raggett, Luke Lawlor and Larry Phelan with their project on "Investigating the effects of different music genres on athletic performance" and Ivin Sony, Cormac Meegan and Michael O'Shea with their project on "The truth of air to water heating".

The next few weeks were tough for us all. A lot of work had to be put into it on the actual experimentation and the write up. For my project, I had to contact multiple sports teams of different sports, draw up questionnaires to gather information on their sleep, create a fitness test to cover every area of fitness, and meet each sports team to collect my data. This was only the

on-field research. I then had to gather everything together and do statistics on my results. I wrote up what I had found, whether my hypothesis was supported or not, and then created an A0 project sheet, project book, and a project diary.

All of this took me months, right up until the competition, which took place in the RDS from Wednesday 10th - 13th January 2024. When we went in, the crowds in the RDS were massive. There were 100's of projects, with every type of person and project taking part. The arena was split into 5 categories -Health and Wellbeing, Biology, Physics, Social and Behavioural Sciences, and Technology.

After we all set up our stations, the judging commenced on the first day of the competition, at about 3pm. In between, other people in the

venue would walk around, viewing our projects, asking us questions on what we did and how we did it. The judging stopped Friday morning, with 3 rounds of judging taking place. Each time, 1 judge would come up and ask questions based on my findings and my experimental research. The award ceremony then took place that Friday night.

On the first day of the competition, KCLR invited us to take part in an interview. We all spoke about our projects to the presenter, Brian Redmond.

Without doubt, would а recommend everybody to submit an idea to the BT Young Scientist Exhibition. It was an experience I definitely enjoyed and I'm sure the other lads would agree with me.

Sixth Year Memories

St Kieran's, 242 years of history, of victories and defeats, of studying and shenanigans, and there even seems to be a few teachers from back then still hanging around. Throughout history in Kilkenny, many things have changed, but Kierans has always remained constant. It has stood the test of time, educating some of the best, like Eddie Keher, Henry Shefflin, Phil Hogan, Thomas Kilroy, and other leading lights in every realm of society.

For our year group, the journey through Kierans started in August 2018. We could feel the significance of the buildings, as we lined up for our photo that first day on the front steps. We plodded around the labyrinth of corridors, with bags the same size as ourselves. Unfamiliar faces soon became friends as we navigated the changes brought about by the transition to secondary school. We quickly adapted to our new lives in Kierans, with new subjects, teachers, classmates and longer school days with extra homework.

During the year, we were lucky enough to qualify for the cross country schools All-Ireland. Come hail, rain or shine, Mondays and Wednesdays were spent running around the castle park, spurred on by words of wisdom from our year head Mr.O'Keefe. We capped off the year with our retreat to Jerpoint Abbey, before being let out to pasture for three months of well deserved freedom.

Returning back for 2nd year was a bit different of an experience, we were no longer herded into Hall 33 as our base classroom, but instead commanded the entirety of the upstairs of the '79 building. I suppose it'd be fair to say that a lot of lads came out of their shells around that time and we probably felt a lot more at home in Kierans by that point. We had tasted success as a year with winning hurling, soccer, Gaelic, and running teams, which probably earned us some recognition and respect as a worthy year group from the rest of the school. We still may have been small in stature, but the second years ruled the roost over our pitch with a much greater degree of authority than the puny first years, who had to carve out a corner to share amongst themselves.

After a number of weeks in 2nd year we went on our retreat to Duiske Abbey in Graiguenamanagh. Whilst I cannot recall much about the actual abbey itself, my abiding memory of that trip was the insanely long walk we went on along the River Barrow. I have only since found out that it's Ireland's second longest river, but I remember after that trip feeling like we had walked all 192km of it. I remember when the announcement came through about schools closing on that Thursday in March, I was delighted because it meant we had Gold Cup Day in Cheltenham off on that Friday. I'd say within a week we knew things were going to change for the long term. Sport had stopped and we all tuned in to hear Leo Varadkar's speech from Washington telling us to stay at home. For the rest of the year, we moved our schooling online and whilst I'm sure every student's experience of that year is different, I felt online classes took on a more well rounded approach to teaching. The breaks between classes gave you a chance to relax and you could fit in a walk or a run within your 5k during the day. Exams were dispensed with and both the students and staff watched on for signs that we'd be returning to normal the following year.

Things calmed down Covid wise over the summer and we were back in classes that August for the start of 3rd year. I'd say a lot of lads were checked out by that point as far as sitting the Junior Cert was concerned. 3rd year was spent mostly in "pods" and segregated classes, so there probably wasn't as much of a chance for lads from different classes to mix. When we went into lockdown again after Christmas in 3rd year, we were back to the same structure of online classes and assignments. For this lockdown, we were a lot less confined and travel restrictions weren't as severe, so we didn't have as much adjusting to do in those early weeks. I remember every day you'd be waiting around to see if they'd finally announce they were calling off the Junior Cert for that year. When news finally broke of its cancellation, it was a great relief, but it also made it hard to be motivated for those last few weeks of the year when we returned to school. When we finally did reach the end of that term, it did seem strange that unlike almost every other previous 3rd year group, we were free. We had evaded the tradition of being tormented by sitting state exams in the intense heat of June.

TY is remembered fondly for the vast range of opportunities it affords to students. For our year, TY was ably coordinated by Ms Moran. During the year, the musical was a big hit, as well as many great trips, such as the Bennettsbridge River Walk. Another memorable trip in TY would have to be climbing Sliabh na mBan on a particularly wet and windy day in March. The age-old tradition of a tenner to the lad who reaches the summit first, developed into a titanic battle, like horses storming up the hill at Cheltenham each year. I would say the highlight of TY for many people was getting the opportunity to do work experience and seeing what life outside of school could be like. I did one of my work experiences with Deputy John Paul (JP) Phelan, which I really enjoyed, as I got to write various political speeches and accompany Minister O'Donovan to Carlow Castle. The highlight for me was amidst myself and JPs speculation about when the next general election might be, Taoiseach Micheál Martin called by and I got to meet him.

Transition year however not without its low points also. That November we said goodbye to Harry Byrne after his tragic death. Harry was the epitome of what it means to be a good person - hardworking, kind, honest, and always a friendly face to everyone. He is still fondly remembered by the entire Kieran's community and his family remains in our thoughts.

When 5th year rolled around we were back with a bang, back to studying and dusting off the books for what we were told would be two very intense years. Every teacher seemed to have the same speech about how we had to hit the ground running and for the most part, I'd say lads took that on board. The year was dotted with a number of great successes, the most notable of which has to be bringing home the school's All-Ireland for the first time since Covid. There were still times for trips and activities though

and the end of year retreat would be one that springs to mind.

We spent the day being coached by members of the Defence Forces and some great tug of war battles separated the true warriors from the weak.

Then finally there was the last hurrah of 6th year, a year dreaded by most, but undoubtedly an important landmark in everyone's life. It is a year ruled by the institution of the Leaving Cert and the obsession with the points race. With that being said however, it would be unfair to say there wasn't still time for other things. Winning the school's All-Ireland was a great achievement, as every year going up the school, you'd usually see the 6th years delivering the title and we felt proud to add our year to that list. The activities of students however did not fill all the headlines from Kieran's this year.

For our 2024 year group though, being students of Kierans is coming towards its conclusion. We will all remember our time here with fondness and use the lessons we have learned in the classrooms and from our fellow students and teachers as we navigate through life.

Post leaving cert we will all be starting from a blank slate, which can oftentimes seem daunting. However, we have all done it before, having originally started in Kierans knowing no one and nothing way back in first year. As one chapter ends, a new chapter begins and as we finish in Kierans and head off in our separate directions, we will all go down different roads and be faced with different opportunities and challenges. Like lost little first years finding our way around Kieran's endless corridors, we don't know where we're going, but we're all on our way.


































FIRST YEAR FRIENDSHIP DAY







The 5th year agricultural science students attended a practical day in Kildalton College on Thursday March Kildalton College is in the village of Piltown in south Kilkenny. It is a leading provider of training in agriculture, horticulture and equine studies in Ireland with over 1,400 students attending courses every year

On arrival to the farm, we were instructed to be very aware of biosecurity measures on the farm. These are measures to prevent disease entering the farm so we thoroughly washed and disinfected our footwear. On the farm, we got a detailed tour of the dairy, beef, sheep and tillage enterprises.

On the tour, there was a big emphasis placed on sustainability in agriculture. Examples of sustainable practices are;

- the use of low emission spreading systems (LESS), instead of splash plate slurry spreading,
- the use of protected urea,
- lowering the crude protein content of concentrates
- incorporating clover into swards
- and making maximum use of the economic breeding index (EBI)

The aim of these measures is to reduce carbon dioxide, nitrous oxide and methane emissions into the atmosphere, which are greenhouse gases. The target for agriculture is to reduce its emissions by 30% by 2030. No doubt there will be higher targets to be met in the future.

There are many more sustainable practices to maintain natural resources in agriculture. We deal with these in our individual investigative studies (IIS), where we explore a hypothesis through scientific investigations on our own enterprises at home. We type up our investigations, which include a literature review, our investigative process, analysis of results obtained and finally conclusions in a scientific report. This report is worth 25% of our final grade in agricultural science.

Overall, the trip to Kildalton connected the theory in the classroom to agriculture on the ground and furthermore it showed us that agricultural science is a live subject.

We would like to wish all our 6th years the very best in the upcoming Leaving Cert and all the best in their future careers.

























This victory was very sweet as our backs were to the wall and it tested us both mentally and physically. The celebrations with all our teachers, classmates, family and friends were spectacular.


