Ruairí joins with Cathal O'Reilly and Eoin Everard in this elite club. James Brennan and Robbie Sheehan represented Ireland in showjumping, Michael O'Keeffe who won the national award in the Student Enterprise Programme for his business idea... as well as the now usual successes in cross-country, swimming, debating, young scientist, chess, badminton, basketball, football, the school play with the Loreto, variety shows, trad bands and so much more.

Our past pupils also amaze as they continue to pursue the tradition of excellence, we hope building on the foundations received here. One of them, Fr Michael Shortall has been asked to serve as the President of St Patrick's Pontifical University, Maynooth, the first for a past pupil from here; another Peter Lynch has broken the Irish 10 mile record running an amazing 45:59, surpassing the previous record of 46:25, set by Olympic silver medallist John Treacy in 1993. He also brokethe Irish marathon securing a podium finish in Dusseldorf clocking 2:09:36 to carve six seconds off the previous record. With so many others excelling in work, in sport, in business and in life - the traditions of this College stand proud.

Our desire is to see all in our community excel, in what ever way possible academically, spiritually, physically and emotionally. When they do, and they do it so often, we as their school teachers or formators, you as their parents, those of us in management, those who are Trustees, and Bishop Niall as our Patron, are all rightly proud. We delight to share in their success.

Building that tradition we continue to work towards the realisation of the new school building. It is a slow process but one that will be worth the wait. At present the design team are costing the final plans so that we can get the approval from the Dept to proceed to tender. We open in these months two special education classrooms furthering the care and welcome that we can give at St Kieran's College - a reason for great joy for all in our community. We are working towards a planning application for a full sized Astro-Turf GAA field on our senior hurling field and moving boundaries at Birchfield to get a full sized grass pitch there.

We are building for success in the classroom too - this year, as this Record documents we see the retirement of Jo Staunton, Jean Fitzpatrick, Philip Walsh and Sharon Keyes. Their contribution to the life and tradition that is St Kieran's is greatly appreciated by all - and wonderfully documented here. Like all who have been part of the family that is the College, they will visit us and still enjoy the achievements of the students of which we, and they, are so proud. I thank them, for their selfless service to the College students and our proud tradition, but also for the manner in which they raised the bar for us who follow.

In management I work closest with Adrian Finan, School Principal, Ken Maher and Liam Smith, Deputy Principals. I am humbled by their relentless commitment

to building on the tradition handed to us - their passion for leadership, guidance, and endless commitment to a vision for St Kieran's is a joy to be part of - I am privileged to walk with them in some small way. 

St Kieran's College Priests' Reunion 2024



As is tradition we gathered for the annual College reunion on a bright, warm, August evening - on the first Tuesday after the 15th August. It was wonderful to see so many priests from our own Diocese and men ordained from the College for other dioceses return to come together for this annual gathering. A chance for stories, laughs, memories, prayer and to spend time together.

During the Mass Bishop Niall reflected on his personal connection to the College and this part of Ireland, noting that "I personally felt a connection to St Kieran's College long before I became Bishop here. As a student in Maynooth College in the 1980s, I came here on several occasions to visit my co-diocesan Raphoe students who were studying here. And I recall with great affection my first visits around those times to nearby Jerpoint Abbey and Graiguenamanagh Abbey - gems of the Irish Catholic landscape - surviving testimonies in stone to the long history of Christian witness in these parts, one which deserve a special mention today on the feast of St Bernard, one of the founders of the Cistercian Order." He also thanked the past students and professors of St Kieran's who were his lecturers in Maynooth: Tom Norris memorably taught the very first Theology class that he attended on the day, coincidentally, that he began his long years of service there. The late Martin Drennan taught him Old Testament and Willie Dalton, Canon Law.

He noted that at this reunion we look back with gratitude for the parents and siblings who loved us and helped us discern a vocation to the priesthood. We give thanks too for the fellow students (living and dead) who journeyed with us and later as priests in this Diocese and elsewhere.

It was wonderful to gather for this special tradition and those from our own Diocese and from much further afield were delighted to have time to spend together. The celebrations continued into the evening with the meal and reception hosted by the College President and an opportunity following that to sit together into the night, to once more recall fondly friendships, many of which have lasted generations.

Obituary Mr Michael O'Dwyer

It is with great sadness this year that we acknowledge the passing of retired teacher and former colleague Mr Michael O'Dwyer. Micheal had taught for ten years in Downpatrick, Co Down, before joining the teaching staff in St Kieran's College in 1967 where he taught Physics and Science to many students for the following 34 years, after which he retired in 2001. Michael was a deep believer in the importance of education and his 44 plus years of dedicated service to his students is testament to his belief.

Michael was an avid researcher and historian with a passion for local history. During his retirement, Michael had a very successful career as a local historian, writing many books and articles on a variety of topics. His history of the game of Cricket in Kilkenny was



hugely successful and offers great insight into the development of the GAA in Kilkenny and how our games were influenced by our cultural history. He pioneered many topics such as his research and book "Lady Desart, Otway Cuffe, and Talbot's Inch" which gives a valuable insight into the ascendancy class in Kilkenny. He also produced a book about Coolagh parish and Emly, his own homeplace.

Michael is fondly remembered by the staff and past-pupils of St Kieran's College. Many students who were taught by him, remember him to be a teacher who possessed and displayed a great deal of care, kindness and respect for his pupils. He is remembered by staff and former colleagues as a true gentleman who always had a smile, time for a chat and was professional to the core.

He taught with great passion, wrote with great accuracy and lived his life to the full. A Kieran's man with many parts - a Scientist and a Historian, truly a renaissance man. Rest in Peace Michael.

Celebrating a past pupil - William Canon Carrigan

Canon William Carrigan will forever be synonymous with St Kieran's College and the Diocese of Ossory where he served. The College now proudly names one of its libraries in his honour and is home to the extensive collection of notebooks which formed the basis of his four volume work. On the 12th December this year we marked the 100th anniversary of his death. St Kieran's College was proud, then, to host, on that weekend, a conference to mark that occasion. In recognising the anniversary of Canon Carrigan's death, we needed to honour not only the man himself but also the enduring relevance of his work for scholars today. Carrigan's meticulous attention to the intersection of Church, culture, and history continues to resonate, offering a model for how local history contributes to our understanding of wider cultural and ecclesiastical dynamics and it was important, on this occasion, that the College and Diocese mark that fact.

In line with the conference title "Carrigan: Church, Culture, Context", the weekend sought to place Carrigan's work within the ecclesiastical, cultural, and historical frameworks of his time. Papers, so generously offered by many speakers, explored how Carrigan's scholarship was influenced by the intellectual movements of the late 19th and early 20th centuries, including the growing interest in antiquities, archives, the importance of the Church's role in preserving cultural heritage, and the significance of local history itself in shaping our national identity.

Over the course of two days speakers explored various perspectives feeding into the context of this wonderful historian. In welcoming those who gathered we noted, as Fr Fearghus had once written, that "The chorus of praise that greeted Carrigan's monumental work was thoroughly merited and the appearance of rather intemperate review inordinate length published under the pseudonym GPO did nothing to dampen the enthusiasm for Carrigan's Magnum Opus an enthusiasm that has remained undimmed and indeed has increased in the 100 years since its







publication". It was fitting then that we gathered to continue that recognition on this occasion.


On the opening evening of the conference, Chaired by Bishop Niall, the keynote lecture was delivered by Prof. Tom O'Connor, emeritus Director of Arts & Humanities Institute, Maynooth University, who spoke to the title "Reading archives and writing critical history in the afterglow of religious controversy: William (1860-1924) Carrigan's historical achievement". By means of dividing his thoughts into three sections - the diocesan history as a means to provide unity to places where division was still felt and the hopes of Brownrigg; the Catholic Diocesan History as a Genre with a focus on Meath's early pioneer, Anthony Cogan (1826-1872) who in 1862-70 produced the first dedicated Irish diocesan history; and finally exploring the Post-Cogan Diocesan History era and how it was that Carrigan's sets its own finer tone and strove after a more rigorous standard, Prof. Tom set Carrigan in his rightful context.

Saturday morning saw Prof. Marian Lyons of Maynooth University chair Dr Richard Hyland as he explored the context of a Kilkenny in which Carrigan was formed and into which his history was written before a second session in which Dr Brian Gurrin, the census and population specialist on the Virtual Record Treasury of Ireland Project based at TCD, explored the contribution of the Carrigan Collection to the (partial) reconstruction of the lost census records of County Kilkenny in the Virtual Record Treasury of Ireland. In so doing he shared some startling statistics on how it was that Carrigan's work has contributed so greatly to the restoration of lost data before concluding his piece exploring his theory, with strong evidence, that Carrigan had 171 notebooks and not, as was previously thought, 168. The afternoon sessions were chaired by Prof. Tom O'Connor as Mr Denis Bergin offered a very personal reflection on the merits of context and the imperative honouring history today and into the future before our own Rev. Dr Fearghus Ó Fearghail shared wonderful insights into the details of the life of Canon Carrigan - from the perspective of one who knows him best! Those gathered were delighted

to hear Fr Fearghus speak of him as if of an old friend - with the meticulous attention to detail that the Canon himself would surely appreciate. Concluding the conference all were invited to join for the Memorial Mass which was to take place the following morning in Durrow. This was a fitting tribute to this wonderful son of Ossory and all the more so given many of his family were in attendance.

There is no doubt but that Canon Carrigan's life and work represent a critical juncture between the past and present in Irish historical scholarship. As a priest and historian, he occupied a unique position where his ecclesial duties intertwined with scholarly inquiry, enabling him to capture the spiritual and material fabric of the Diocese of Ossory with an unparalleled depth. His work remains one of the most comprehensive accounts of a diocese in Ireland, notable for its careful attention to detail, reliance on primary sources, and engagement with the architectural, cultural, and religious artefacts of the region. The workings of this conference, and some associated papers, will be published in 2025.

The College was proud to honour this past pupil and his immense contribution to the Irish history.

Ossory Adult Faith Development

St Kieran's College is located at the centre of the Diocese - both geographically and hopefully in the sense of its mission too. It continues its founding intention - the education of all our students to the fullest extent in accordance with the Gospel - but it also acts as a location for many diocesan activities and for a number of Diocesan Offices: the Forum with Sr Helen Maher and The Diocesan Pastoral Council with the Coordinator of our Pastoral plan, Ms Gemma Mulligan. The Faith development group also has a home here. This group, directed by Fr Dermot, continually attempts to innovate to help all in our parishes and Diocese to deepen their understanding of their faith in old and new ways.

In this past year the group held at the College a year long theology course entitled aptly - Faith Seeking Understanding. This course was designed to allow those who attended, by means a a lecture each Monday night, a full suite of lessons on Christology,

Sacraments, the Old Testament, The New testament, Liturgy, Spirituality and Prayer, Ecclesiology and Mission,

Synodal and Parish Structures and so much more... Staffed so generously by the people and priests of the Diocese, over 40 people journeyed together on this course each week. Not only was there learning but also great friendships made. It was an opportunity for this diverse group to probe their faith in gentle ways and to learn not only from lecturers but also from each other. The course finished just recently when Bishop Niall celebrated a Mass with all participants reflecting on the time spent studying together.

In preparation for the Jubilee Year of Hope in this past year, starting first in Advent, the College also hosted many varied gatherings reflecting on the theme of hope. It started with Bishop Niall leading us to reflect on a theology of hope on a December evening during Advent. He explored the many obvious and subtle ways that our faith brings

hope into our lives - later in that month Fr Sean Maher reflected on the seeds of hope in the bible. Once again, on this evening, small threads



of hope were traced for, and by, all those in attendance. During Lent, just gone, we explored the work of Trócaire with its CEO Caoimhe de Barra in what was a wonderfully intimate and honest gathering. The hope that the work of Trócaire brings to the darkest of situations was inspiring as was their relentless belief in the power of small acts to change our world. We also had a refreshingly honest reflection on the national and international synodal pathway in the company of Julianne Moran the General Secretary for the Irish Synodal Pathway in which we saw the hope that this process has brought to our Church, not only in Ireland but throughout the world. It was empowering to see the comments of the Irish Church reflected in the synodal document that emerged from the sessions in Rome - a hopeful sign of more of this to come as we now continue on that synodal pathway.

The Faith Development Group has continued to lead with the innovative ASPAL faith formation APP and once more this year there were further developments with regard to our Diocesan collaboration with St Patrick's Pontifical University. St Patrick's continued to offer even more ongoing moral formation for all who work in the Bons Secours hospitals here in Ireland and in America. This collaboration the Bons Secours Health System and St Patrick's Pontifical University, Maynooth and by means of the use of the ASPAL platform continues to provide programmes for those in Allied Healthcare, professional and administration roles, and people working in Pastoral Care or Chaplaincy. This working together went from strength to strength and further collaborations are planned.

The Ossory Times is now in its 13th year!! Not bad for a local publication. It continues to serve the people and parishes of our Diocese sharing the good news of how our faith is lived locally. Its wonderful colourful pages and many reflective articles give an insight into the vibrant life of faith that is found in our parishes and many diocesan groups.

Our baptism tasks us with sharing the Good News with others and it is in response to this call that this Diocesan publication continues. A sincere thanks to all who contribute to this publication which emerges from the walls of this College and reaches into every parish of our Diocese.

The work of faith development is continual - we will stay learning about God and our faith as we journey through life. Faith is like any relationship - if we stop working on it - it stops working... The Faith Development Group try to offer, in small and creative ways, supports to people as they explore what this faith means to them.

The Ossory Diocesan Pastoral Plan

The Ossory Diocesan Pastoral Plan is a response to the changing needs of the Catholic Church in our time. Rooted in prayer, discernment, and dialogue, it outlines a vision for the future of our diocese—one that is faithful to the Gospel and responsive to the realities of our communities.

The Plan is the fruit of a wide consultation process involving clergy, religious, and lay faithful across the Diocese of Ossory. It reflects a desire to renew the mission of the Church in a way that is inclusive, participatory, and grounded in the life of the local parish. At its heart is the call to be a Church that listens, accompanies, and walks together in faith. There are nine

strands in the Pastoral Plan which focus on encouraging collaborative decisionmaking and active participation at every level of diocesan and parish life, reaching out to the marginalized and making our parishes centres of hospitality, service, and care. The plan also aims to create spaces for young people and families to grow in faith and feel valued within the life of the Church, through the John Paul Il Awards, Taizé Prayer, family fun days and parish family days.

As parishes work more closely together as a Pastoral Area, liturgies and gathering for prayer can draw people into deeper communion with Christ through more vibrant celebrations as resources are shared.

Theplanacknowledgesthechallenges faced by the Church in Ireland today declining vocations to priesthood and religious life, demographic shifts, and a growing secular culture. Rather than retreat, it calls the faithful to renew their commitment to missionary discipleship. includes reimagining structures, supporting new ministries,

and using resources more wisely and collaboratively. It encourages all the baptised to respond to their baptismal calling to missionary discipleship.

The Diocesan Pastoral Plan is a living document—a roadmap that will evolve through ongoing prayer, evaluation, and action. It invites every member of the diocese to play their part in shaping a more hopeful, engaged, and Gospelcentered Church.

As Bishop Niall Coll has said, "This is a time not for fear, but for faith. The Spirit is calling us to be creative and courageous in building the Church of tomorrow, beginning today."

The Ossory Diocesan Pastoral Plan ultimately about people—about renewing faith, deepening relationships, working and journeying together, strengthening the bonds that make us one Body in Christ. As we journey forward together, our hope is that this plan continues to bear fruit in hearts, homes, and parishes throughout the diocese.

The Ossory Diocesan Forum

The Diocesan Pastoral Council, the executive body of the Forum, addressed several pastoral issues important to the Diocese over the past year. One fundamental task undertaken was the revision of the Forum Constitution. The first Constitution was written in 2004 prior to the launch of the Forum. This document outlined the formation of each of the network of Pastoral Councils that make up the Forum. One stipulation of the initial Constitution was that the Constitution would be evaluated and, if necessary, revised within the last six months of each four-year term of office. Such evaluations have taken place in 2008, 2013, 2017 and most recently in 2024. Each revision reflected significant developments in the life of the Forum, for example, the establishment of Deanery Pastoral Councils in 2009 and the change from Deanery Pastoral Councils to Pastoral Area Councils in the most recent edition.

The 2025 Constitution was approved by Bishop Coll in April and launched at the diocesan Chrism Mass during Holy Week this year. In the preface to this edition Bishop Coll writes: Some sixty years following Vatican II, the work of implementing the Council's teaching has lost nothing of its urgency and indeed in Pope Francis's reconfiguration of the notion of 'synodality' there has begun an exciting phase in its reception.

The notion of 'synodality' has been very clearly articulated in the Final Document of the Universal Synod on Synodality which was published last October. That document, which was adopted by Pope Francis as official Church teaching, emphasises the baptismal call of all to participate actively in the life of the Church and considers what it calls "participatory bodies|" essential to ensuring this participation. Parish, Pastoral Area and Diocesan Councils are such bodies. The document goes on to say "A synodal Church is based upon the existence, efficiency and effective vitality of these participatory bodies, not on the merely nominal existence of them."

From the beginning, the Forum has placed great importance on having Pastoral Councils at every level in the Diocese and has offered guidance and support to parishes about their establishment. Following the launch of the 2025 Constitution this year copies

were circulated to all forty-two parishes in the Dioceses. This Constitution is intended to be a working document which gives clear guidelines about the type of Parish and Pastoral Area Councils envisaged by the Diocese at this time.

While the Constitution concentrates on the formation of effective pastoral structures, the Final Document of the Synod reminds us that "it is relationships that sustain the Church's vitality, animating its structures". It goes on to say


"What emerged throughout the entire synodal journey, and in every place and context, was the call for a Church with a greater capacity to nurture relationships: with the Lord, between men and women, in the family, in the local community, among social groups and religions, with all of creation."

The Constitution is intended to be in service of such a vision of Church.

The hope is, as Bishop Coll expresses it in the Preface that it will be a source of encouragement and blessing to the people, religious and clergy of the Diocese during the years to come as we endeavour to work together with the help of the Holy Spirit, to develop a 'style' of Church and ministry most appropriate go our times.

The Green Schools Committee

At the start of the year, the Green Schools Committee made our plan for what we hoped to achieve. Our main focus was working towards earning our Mobility Flag. This involved encouraging students to walk to school.

We started out by carrying out a mobility survey. We visited classrooms collecting information about students' journeys to and from school. We learned which methods of travel were most common and identified the obstacles that prevent some students from walking to school.

Following the survey, conducted a walkability audit on the routes students commonly take when walking to school. We created a list of issues with the local infrastructure. In the weeks that followed, we used a speed gun to measure how fast cars were travelling on College Road. Both activities gave us useful insight into the safety of walking to school.

Also during the year, we also performed a kick test in the River Breagagh. We collected water samples and identified the different species and counted how many of each we found. This helped us determine the pollution level in the river.

Overall, it was a successful year, and we hope to complete our Mobility Flag in 2026.





We have all been fortunate enough to harbour in such an influential place for a brief period of six years, six years which have seen us grow from immature young boys to considerably less immature young men, six years which will undoubtedly stand as a testament to us in all of life's later voyages.

As I fondly reflect on the days in which I have spent in St Kieran's College, it is the strong culture of success which stands out to me the most. Such success does not simply lie in the genuine victories which can be earned in Kieran's but rather in the continuous bravery to seize opportunities. To put yourself forward in any endeavour is to be celebrated as if you've won, from hurling, running and football to debating, chess, maths and so much more. The school's ability to celebrate each individual's efforts is what I believe makes it stand out from the rest.

As someone who lives in close proximity to Kieran's, my first day of school was not my first time being on its expansive grounds. It was a familiar place, yet on that momentous day I was overcome by a sense of awe which prior sights of the school had never instilled within me. As I nervously made my way through the prominent arch which fronts the college, I was instantly captivated by its sheer scale. As a 12 year old, paying any heed to the intricate architecture of a building is a foreign concept, yet on that late August morning, that's exactly what I did. The towering building which stood before me, commanded an inexplicable form of respect, orchestrated by the fact that my tightly fastened black and white tie meant that I was now a student here.

This day of new beginnings was also our initial exposure to the belief that to be a student of Kieran's is to be inherently exceptional. Fr Ryan shared the idea that from that day forth there would be an element of 'black and white' flowing through our veins, no matter where life took us, having been a student of Kieran's would be something which we would be eternally proud of.

As First Year got underway, the idea of adaptation in order to survive was of paramount significance. We were the smallest fish in the sea and the concept of not needing to carry around every set of books in your bag for the entirety of the day or running full tilt down the Glasshall at the lunchtime bell, in hot pursuit of the canteen's chicken curry, was something which we would in time come to understand.

Whilst there's no denying that from an outside perspective Kieran's appears to be a school solely revolving around hurling, it was in the early stages of First Year that this subconscious belief of mine was demystified. I quickly found great joy in the weekly lunchtime runs around the grounds of the Castle Park led by a rather passionate and often vocal Mr O'Keeffe. The defining moment of such an activity came not in the familiar park but rather the bus bay of Santry Demesne before we were to brave the Leinster Schools Cross-Country Championship. Whilst delivering his familiar moving words to prepare us, his soldiers, from First to Sixth Years, for 'battle', Mr O'Keeffe stated that as fabled 'Kieran's men', the poor weather conditions which were ongoing outside were in our favour, he never failed to instill the belief that we held this unique inner strength, fuelled by challenges.

Unfortunately, our First Year in Kieran's ended in a fashion in which no one could have ever anticipated. On March 12th, 2020 the entire student body was instructed to empty their lockers and leave the school on a

gloomy Thursday afternoon, a reality which I will always struggle to grasp. What first began as quiet murmurs of an illness which hailed all the way from China, quickly transcended into a beast which rapidly changed our first year lives as we knew them. Covid-19 birthed a whirlwind of virtual classes and an ever building 'to do' list on Google Classroom in its wake. The locked gates and empty college were an eerie reality of our early secondary school days.

As Second Year came upon us, the College was accompanied by rather unpopular regulations, 'covid restrictions'. Upon re-entering the grounds of Kieran's, sporting some little to be desired DIY haircuts, the time in which we had previously spent mastering student life felt as if it was null and void. We no longer travelled from class to class but rather waited attentively, within the same four walls, for a teacher to come to us.

The camaraderie between different year groups in the hallways was now a distant memory, it was as if Kieran's was a shell of its former self. In spite of this, it was still embedded into our nature to make the most of what we had. Lads took a liking for the new 'outdoor' canteen which saw hundreds line up during lunchtime and wait for their turn to buy a chicken roll from a designated window, a fairly simple source of excitement, a reflection of the irregularity which was cast upon the school.

A standout memory of mine from a relatively non-eventful year was an unsupervised free class which resulted in around twenty lads carefully engineering and launching paper airplanes towards the permanently open window at the far side of the room, eventual success resulting in an eruption of cheers, quickly drawing Mr Smith's attention. Kieran's may have temporarily changed yet novelties such as a free class still allowed us to experience what once was.

As normality eventually resumed its position it was welcomed with open arms by the community of St.Kieran's College. Our minds were no longer tormented by the necessity to wear a mask and stick to our confinements of the school but rather the ever approaching threat that was 'The Junior Cert'. It would be unjust of me to

class Third Year as one of unwavering success and happiness for our school. The untimely passing of fellow student Harry Byrne in November 2021 has left an indelible mark on our time in Kieran's. This tragedy greatly impacted all members of the school, an incident which was very difficult to come to terms with. An air of sadness was felt throughout the hallways, marked by the fact that regardless of how well you knew Harry, he was a student of Kieran's just like the rest of us, he wore the same uniform, possessed the same Kieran's spirit. Yet, in due course, the entire school community came back together, in a way, stronger than it had been before, and Harry will live on in all of our memories.

For me, Third Year reached its pinnacle at the senior hurling match in late February, against our neighbours the CBS, a local derby. A plethora of parent signatures were forged on absence notes as word spread throughout the school that all were to leave the grounds at one o'clock and head towards O'Loughlin's. Led by a few nameless sixth years, all students proudly marched through towards the pitch, spirits flying as high as the black and white flags which accompanied us and an array of chants being belted out by all.

As quickly as Third Year began, it soon too came to an end. The Junior Cert was merely a stepping stone, a chance to experience State Exam nerves in a set of tests which ultimately rendered little real importance, something which teachers would undeniably contest. I can still recall the sense of relief that I was overcome with as I wandered through the gates on my first day of Transition Year, not a care in the world. We were free from the burden of study and set to embark on the 'Dolce Vita', a year packed with real life opportunities that books would simply never be able to teach us. The beauty of TY, in my eyes, was that it was nothing more than a blank canvas, a year which allowed every student to paint it however they wished. As the year got underway we were presented with a variety of activities which would allow us to pass the time, from putting ourselves forward to receive various awards such as the 'Gaisce' and 'Hiems Transiit', to volunteering or taking part in the musical. It was a rare day that we were completely idle. The best decision that I made in TY was to partake in the musical 'All Shook Up', something which definitely wouldn't have been on my secondary school bingo card when I started Kieran's. Before I knew it, I was queuing up outside of the canteen with at least thirty other similarly pale-faced lads, waiting to do singing auditions for a board of self-proclaimed 'singing expert' teachers in order to see if we would make the cut for the Watergate stage. Needless to say, 'Riptide' will never sound the same.

Whilst sitting here, deep in thought about what to include in this piece—my Irish oral notes retired for good and an abundance of study ahead of me—it has dawned upon me that you truly don't realise what you have until it's gone. Transition Year was one of ease and new experiences, arguably my favourite in Kieran's. And yet, it's not something you tend to appreciate at the time—not when you're leisurely strolling the halls in search of a teacher who might have a spare 'job' up for grabs as opposed to going to class, or trudging through the Comeragh Mountains on the overnight Gaisce trip, spending the night in a community hall which had certainly seen better days, all on the verge of exhaustion after a day of giving Bear Grylls a run for his money. At the time, it simply felt like normality but now I'd have no objection to being back in that time of bliss.

Within no time our bags quickly filled from the Transition Year essentials of a singular pen and crumpled piece of paper to an array of Leaving Cert books as we began Fifth Year. In a way we resumed the position of our former first year selves, we embarked on a new chapter in our schooling lives which we were not yet sure exactly how to tackle. My father's words in relation to the Leaving Cert still rest in the back of my mind as we're only a few weeks out from 'D-Day'. He frequently reminded me throughout the course of fifth and subsequently sixth year that 'the only way to eat an elephant is one bite at a time'. Whilst such an idea may not be particularly appetising these words were crucial when it came to remaining level headed while facing the abundance of work which stood before me.

The widespread recognition that the only person who would reap the rewards of your continued efforts would be yourself could be seen in the quickly growing numbers of lads attending after school study. Meticulously supervised under the watchful eyes of PJ, whose daily 'alright lads study has ended' at 6:15 is still nothing short of music to my

Alongside such a rigorous new workload was the opportunity to become a 'Cairdeas Leader' for the incoming First Years. The definition of a full circle moment. We could now seize the opportunity to guide the new 'smallest fish in the sea' in adapting to the Kieran's lifestyle. A great portrayal of the strong caring ethos promoted within the school, something which stood to all of us in our early days.

As our Leaving Cert Year beckoned, it was with great anticipation that we responded. In the opening days and weeks, there wasn't a single teacher that failed to focus on the astonishing speed of such a year. To be blatant, I initially disregarded this, viewing Sixth Year as a long and monotonous road, yet as I now sit here, having the privilege of writing on behalf of the Leaving Cert students of 2024/2025, attempting to define an almost undefinable experience, it is with great confidence that I can confirm their comments about such haste were correct. In the dying embers of my time in Kieran's, it's the poetry of Patrick Kavanagh which resonates with me the greatest. The predominant message of many of Kavanagh's poems are that of finding the extraordinary within the ordinary and I can say that my time in Kieran's has granted me such an ability. For me, the unassuming hallways, lined with black and white photographs of students gone by are elevated by the continuous success moulded by the school community, by the friendships which over six years have flourished, by the constant support that all members of the staff have given us and by the realisation that no singular moment is sufficient in summing up such a memorable time in our lives.

As our ships prepare to disembark from the safe harbour of St.Kieran's, to test the waters of college or the working world, it is with a sense of great pride and confidence that we can do so. Our masts will differ from the rest, embellished with black and white stitching from a time gone by, all too quickly. To my fellow classmates, I wish you the very best of luck in the Leaving Cert and irrespective of the outcome, may you happily reminisce on your time in the harbour of St.Kieran's College, a harbour in which we've all had the honour of sharing.





CAIRDEAS

The Cairdeas Programme aims to provide support for our First Year students - individually and as a group, to help them settle in, make progress and to achieve their full potential within St Kieran's College. Each year approximately twenty-five to thirty of our fifth year students take part in the Cairdeas programme. This year, each Fifth Year student underwent training and was assigned to be a mentor to six First year students. The Amber flag is an initiative by Pieta House which recognises the individual efforts of schools to create







healthy, inclusive environments that support mental wellbeing. The amber flag enables schools across the country to raise awareness of the stigmas which exist across the country.

Intercambio a Madrid

I went on an exchange to Madrid at the start of October. For the first week, I was with my parents and we stayed in a hotel. We explored Madrid, learned how to use the public transport and bought some essentials. My parents went back to Ireland and then I went to a small village in Madrid called Galapagar where I stayed with a Spanish local in an apartment in the village. The population was about 30,000. There wasn't much there but there was a very good football team which I joined for a while. I also went to the bilingual school in my village called Cañada Real. It was a normal secondary school so I had the opportunity to see what school life was like for people my age in Spain. It was a small enough school with about 300 students. It was very different to school in Ireland, mainly because of the timetable. Class started at 8 and finished at either 2pm or 3pm, depending on the day.

November was when I felt I began to settle in and started to go places with my friends from school. We used to go to the city centre mostly and



transport was so easy to use and so cheap if you had a transport card. The centre of Madrid had every shop that you could think of.

School in Madrid is much tougher than it is in Ireland. Even though I couldn't speak Spanish fluently it didn't mean that they let me skip any of the work.

In December, I was lucky andn got the chance to play with a professional football club. I was able to leave school and play full time football for around 3 weeks. We trained 4 times a week and sometimes twice a day. If you play for a professional team in Spain you don't have to go to school, you just have to do a little bit of course work. Unfortunately, I had to come back to Ireland and didn't get to finish the full month with the team. Overall, I had a great experience and I would recommend it to anyone who has an interest in doing Spanish or if you want a cool new experience to do an exchange.



Erasmus Integration Program



Agricultural Science Trip 2025

The Fifth Year agricultural science students attended a practical day in Kildalton College on Friday March 14th. Kildalton College is located in the village of Piltown in south Kilkenny. It is a leading provider of training in agriculture, horticulture and equine studies in Ireland with over 1,400 students attending courses every year

On arrival to the farm, we were instructed to be very aware of biosecurity measures on the farm. These are measures to prevent disease entering the farm so we thoroughly washed and disinfected our footwear. On the farm, we got a detailed tour of the dairy, beef, sheep, tillage, equine and horticultural enterprises.

On the tour, there was a big emphasis placed on sustainability and technology in agriculture. Examples of such practices are;

- the use of collar system on cows for heat detection and health status,
- · the use of protected urea,
- correct calibration of fertiliser spreaders,
- · incorporating clover into swards,
- use of Euro Star Rating in beef production to produce higher grade animals,
- improving soil fertility through maximum use of organic manures
- and
- making maximum use of the economic breeding index (EBI)

There are many more sustainable and advanced technological practices to maintain natural resources and to support Irelands future agricultural competitiveness. We deal with these in our individual investigative studies (IIS), where we explore a hypothesis through scientific investigations on an agricultural enterprise. We type up our investigations, which include a literature review, our investigative process, analysis of results obtained and finally conclusions in a scientific report. This report is worth 25% of our final grade in agricultural science.

Overall, the trip to Kildalton connected the theory in the classroom to agriculture on the ground and furthermore it showed us that agricultural science is a live subject.

A key part of the curriculum, the trip contributes 20% to students' final grade through the completion of a Geography investigation project. Students travelled to Tramore beach to explore the processes of coastal deposition and transport. During the trip, they engaged in hands-on activities such as measuring the effects of longshore drift and analysing beach fabric, all aimed at investigating the impact of natural coastal processes on the area. This year also marks a change in how students submit their projects. For the first time, the writeup must be completed and submitted using Microsoft Word. While this adds a modern twist to the traditional field study, it also brings new challenges for students as they adapt to the digital format. Overall, the trip provided a valuable learning experience and an opportunity to apply classroom theory in a real-world setting.

Geography Week 2025 Brings Learning to Life

Geography Week 2025 was a lively and engaging celebration of all things geographical. First-year students kicked off the week with a fun and competitive Geography Quiz held in the study hall. The event tested their knowledge on topics ranging from continents and capitals to flags and landmarks, all while promoting teamwork and enthusiasm for the subject. Meanwhile, second and third years took their revision outdoors by making use of the school's active walkway. This creative approach allowed students to combine physical activity with learning, as they reviewed key concepts and challenged each other by answering questions placed along the route. Our Transition Year students have been busy all year promoting a love for Geography and History through their weekly updates. Their updates showed how both subjects play a role in our daily lives, often without us even realising









it. From natural disasters and global news to anniversaries of key historical moments, the TYs kept the school community informed and engaged. Their work has not only boosted awareness of these subjects but also reminded us just how deeply Geography and History are woven into the fabric of everyday life. The week was a great success, blending education with energy and giving students across all junior year groups a fresh way to connect with Geography.

School Joins ESB WeatherWatch **Programme**

We are delighted to have been selected as part of the ESB WeatherWatch programme, an exciting initiative that brings real-world weather monitoring right to our school grounds. As part of the programme, a digital weather station was installed on-site, giving students access to real-time weather data that they can observe and analyse. This live data will play a key role in helping students deepen their understanding of weather forecasting and its importance in our daily lives. The station can be viewed online by scanning the QR code displayed here and on the weather station. As part of the programme, Transition Year students also explored the link between weather patterns and the generation of renewable energy. They took part in a national competition by creating videos to showcase this connection, blending science, creativity, and technology. 




The squad traveled to Nova Scotia, Canada to take part in the coveted SEDMHA tournament (the largest minor hockey tournament in all of Canada).
